Government Plan Of Assistance To School Construction Outlined

Dr. George Dewar, minister of education, said yesterday the department of education will pay towards construction of consolidated elementary schools, \$6,000 for a completed furnished classroom and a library room of classroom size, if the building is new and of permanent construction.

"Provision is also made," he said, "to pay assistance of \$6,000 for a completed furnished assembly room of classroom size, or \$9,000 for a completed furnished assembly room of the size of one and one half to two classrooms, if the building is new and of permanent construction."

The minister said \$5,000 in assistance will be paid for a completed furnished assembly room of classroom size, and \$7,500 for an assembly room of one and one half to two classroom size if the building is not of permanent construction.

"In addition," the minister said, "40 per cent of the cost of a site, architect's fees, bond discount, paving and landscaping will be paid by the government."

NON MEMBERS
According to Dr. Dewar, "if a rural district is not a member of an elementary consolidated unit, the assistance for new construction will not exceed \$2,500 for a completed furnished classroom, or \$1,500 for an improved and remodelled classroom, provided that where the school building shall be of permanent construction, additional assistance of \$1,000 may be granted for each completed and furnished classroom."

The new plan of assistance has been approved by the provincial cabinet and went into effect the first of May. The new scheme of financial assistance replaces one that has been in effect since 1959 when the department of education assisted rural school districts, outside of regional high school units, up to \$3,500 per classroom if the school was of permanent construction and up to \$2,500 per classroom for schools of non-permanent construction.

According to Dr. Dewar, "a grant of 40 per cent may be paid on the cost of the following approved projects for rural schools, other than regional high schools: major renovations to buildings, insulation, enlarging and landscaping of school grounds, approved toilets and sewer-and-water-supply, new chalkboards and classroom furniture, approved heating and electrical wiring installations, major playground equipment, painting of the exterior and interior of school buildings and on the cost of major items of school equipment."

ASSISTANCE LIMITED
Dr. Dewar said permanent construction means "concrete foundations, concrete floors supported by either steel joists, or reinforced concrete walls, of masonry construction, roofs of either steel frame and concrete deck or a pitched roof, one-hour fire resistance between top floor and roof."

According to Dr. Dewar, assistance on new construction

shall be limited to districts where the installation of flush toilets is practical. "Assistance," he concluded, "will not be payable for general repairs to buildings, furniture or equipment, nor for replacement of stoves or other equipment which constitutes a renewal rather than an improvement of school property."

Lobster Results Known Monday

The lobster fishing season finally opened Friday morning after a week's delay caused by ice conditions.

Reports from Rustico said the lobster fleet left at 9 a.m. Friday to set traps. There was little ice in the area but ice floes could be seen far to the west.

Alberton reported that fine clear weather and smooth seas enabled Tignish and Alberton fishermen to put out approximately three quarters of their lobster gear.

From nine a.m. on, the boats shuttled back and forth from the wharves to the fishing grounds
