Returns From Attending Older Boys' Parliament

The privilege of being able to attend the Older Boys' Parliament can result in a big influence on the life of a young man, said David MacDonald, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Gordon MacDonald, Charlottetown. David, who attended the 33rd Boys' Parliament which was recently held at Mount Allison University, was appointed to the post of Minister of Social Affairs for the coming year. His position requires that he, through a committee, ensure that activities in connection with boys' work throughout the Maritimes be constantly maintained.

The idea of the Parliament, which was founded by the late Dr. Waldo C. Machum in 1919, is to bring together boys from all parts of the Maritimes, to gain experience through discussion and fellowship, also to obtain a realistic view of parliamentary procedure, and to bring them into closer contact with religious truths.

These parliaments have frequently been the starting point for prominent political and business leaders, one of those who was Boys' Premier twenty-one years ago, is the present Premier Henry Hicks of Nova Scotia. Many others have entered the legal field and Christian theology.

To be able to participate each of the boys must be nominated by a Christian or church organization, and be recommended by their own minister.

The agenda for this year's session covered such subjects as corporal punishment, sex education for young people, the practice of private and family devotions, the vocation of the Christian ministry, the promotion of Christian sponsored programs such as camps, tuxis groups, sigma-c and tyro, religious toleration and mercy killing.

During the five days, one period each forenoon was devoted to instruction in leadership, conducted by the director of Boy's Parliament, Rev. A. G. Sherwood, Saint John Boy's Work Secretary for the N. R. E. C. and Rev. E. L. Don Davidson, field secretary for the United Church of Canada.

The sessions closed with a watch-night service, conducted by the boys themselves. At this service each boy was given the opportunity to tell the assembly what the parliament had done and meant to him.

Remove Starfish To Save Bras d' Or Oyster Crop

OTTAWA (CP)—More than 500,000 starfish have been removed from the Bras d'Or lakes of Cape Breton island, in an effort to save the oyster crop, the annual meeting of the fisheries research board was told Wednesday.

Scientists of the board's Atlantic biological station at St. Andrew's, N. B. reported they removed the starfish from a six-acre test area during the last two summers. Starfish kill the oysters by prying open their shells to feed on the succulent meat inside.

There are millions of starfish in the lakes, the report says, but they are small in size and harmless to larger oysters. Large oysters reared in trays for one year now are being planted in the test area as a solution to the problem.
