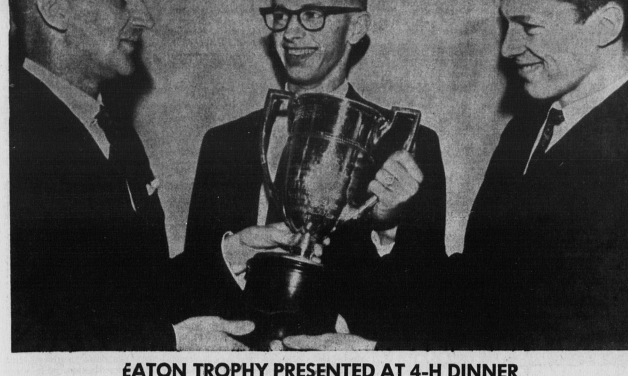

Alberton Ratepayers Approve Loan For Rink

Approval for the Town of Alberton to guarantee a loan from the municipal loan fund for construction of a community rink was given unanimously at a public meeting here last night. About 30 ratepayers were in attendance.

The building under consideration will be of all steel construction by a mainland firm and is estimated to cost \$60,000. Mayor Roy Leard opened the meeting and Rev. David MacDonald, a member of the building committee, presented details of the proposed building and the financial arrangements.

An \$8,000 grant has been promised from the provincial government and other expected sources of revenue include sale of shares, donations, subscriptions and donations from several groups to be named later. Labor costs will be under the winter works program.

Although the town is being called upon to back a loan of approximately \$15,000, Mr. MacDonald emphasized that the community centre will be a community project involving the 19 school districts in the Charlottetown District Regional High School area.

Vocational Education Plan Is Outlined To Parkdale H&S

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O'Leary Branch Gets Certificate

O'LEARY — The Canadian Legion branch here was presented with a certificate honoring its increase in membership at a West Prince zone rally last night. The event was held in the Legion home here.

This branch increased its membership from 58 to 78, a 23.3 per cent increase in the year since November, 1962. Presentation of the certificate was made by Pius Smith of Charlottetown, first vice-president of the Provincial Command.

Mr. Smith said other branches in the province showing substantial increases in membership included the Georgetown branches from 20 to 45, a 140 per cent increase; and Charlottetown from 108 to 127, a 25.8 per cent increase.

The Dominion Command awards certificates to branches making a six per cent or more increase in a year. The Dominion Command also has a trophy which will be awarded to the branch with the highest percentage increase for a year. Mr. Smith said he would be surprised if the award came to Prince Edward Island.

The West Prince Legion zone federation meeting, in 1964, was brought up by Hector Bogue of Tignish. He asked for suggestions.

Later Provincial Command secretary Edgar Hogan of Charlottetown said in connection with the 1964 observance, Legion members could use a Red Ensign stamp on the back of letters and the Red Ensign should be present at all Legion meetings and shows at Legion branches.

He urged members have proper Legion dress and to adopt as a membership slogan "It's all got one more for '64."

Other speakers included Provincial command president Merilee Collins of Summerside and Frank Rush of Charlottetown. The latter said the Provincial Command is trying to promote a Maritime tournament of indoor sports for Legion members.

'Biculturalism' Brief Urged On National H & S Federation

The executive of the Prince Edward Island Home and School Federation has decided against submitting a brief to the royal commission on bilingualism and biculturalism but has recommended that the national federation do so.

The executive meeting felt that the national organization should approach the French-speaking federation in an endeavor to work out differences and find general areas of agreement in the hope of presenting a joint brief.

If this is not possible, then separate presentations should be made, it was stated. The provincial executive also believed that the terms of reference of the royal commission should be more clearly defined. The term "bilingualism" was considered to be in order, but instead of "biculturalism," the term "Canadian culturalism" might be more appropriate since Canada is enriched by many cultures.

Mrs. Peter Gleeson was designated to attend the mid-term meeting of the Canadian federation to be held in Toronto, Jan. 2 and 4, at which arrangements will be finalized for the national convention to take place in Charlottetown July 12-18.

The meeting held yesterday in Charlottetown was presided over by M. F. Hagan, president.

Reports Said Lagging On United Fund Appeal

Though the results of the P.E.I. United Fund are regarded as good, there is some disappointment about the slowness of returns.

The fund now stands at \$168,075.79, about 71 per cent of the objective of \$238,000.00 was learned yesterday.

In the matter of payroll deductions it was felt that the fund would receive quite a lift when a number of firms yet to be heard from complete their reports.

The annual meeting of the United Fund is scheduled for January 28, the president is Frank Curtis and general chairman of the campaign is Orla Simons.
