# October Fish Landings Worth \$4,000,000

HALIFAX — Total fish landings in the Maritimes during October, 1965, amounted to 80,200,000 pounds valued at \$4,000,000. These totals included 42,600,000 pounds of groundfish valued at \$1,800,000, 33,400,000 pounds of pelagic and estuarial species valued at \$764,000 and 4,200,000 pounds of shellfish valued at \$1,436,000.

In comparison with the average October catch during the years 1962 to 1964, the month's total catch was above average by 13,300,000 pounds and \$600,000. Groundfish landings for October were above the average October catch during the years 1962 to 1964 by 5,700,000 pounds and \$282,000. The month's pelagic catch was above the three year October average by 6,300,000 pounds but below the average landed value during the same period by \$14,000. Shellfish landings for October were 232,000 pounds and \$241,000 thousand dollars above the October 1962 to 1964 average.

### BIGGER LANDINGS

The increased groundfish catch during October was due to the larger than normal landings

of pollock and flatfishes. The larger than normal pelagic landings for October were the result of increased herring landings during the month, however, the

regions will experience low temperatures.

## Committee Considers Project For Centennial

GEORGETOWN — The Georgetown Centennial Committee, under the chairmanship of Alex Arsenault, and a number of interested citizens, met in the Council Chambers on Thursday night.

In attendance was William L. Meggison, a member of the Provincial Centennial Grants Committee. Mr. Meggison briefed the committee on a number of phases relative to the obtaining of a Centennial grant for their project which is the reclaiming

and developing of Kent Square to make it a public park.

It is necessary for the local committee to prepare and forward a sketch of the proposed park, including size, the use it is to be put to; facilities to be eventually installed, such as swings, picnic tables, benches and other aids to beautification such as trees, shrubs and walk.

Within the next several days, a sufficient quantity of sketches of the area will be available to members so that they can fill in on the sketches, their ideas of what should be done. In this way it is hoped to receive a variety of ideas and suggestions eventually leading to the adoption of the most suitable and practicable plan for the project.

A government engineer looked over the site of Thursday and estimated the amount of clay fill that would be needed to build the present square up to the desired height. The services of a drainage engineer is required and a committee are to make the necessary arrangements to endeavour to obtain those services. From earlier representations made by the committee, the meeting was informed that sufficient clay fill for the project will be available from land owned by the Prince Edward Island Industrial Corporation, which was former Town Commons land.

### ADD TO GRANT

The town council is the initiating agency for the Centennial project and the residents of the Georgetown School District living outside the town and those residing in the Georgetown Royal School District are being taken into the project, with their written permission, which will add to the number of persons on which the per capita grant may be based.

The local Centennial committee is committed to assume the responsibility of looking after the maintenance of the park site.

The grant available for the project is based on an equal contribution of one dollar per capita from each of the federal, provincial and municipal governments. Labour performed on such a project may come under the Winter Works plan, but the total contribution of the federal government, including its grant and contribution for labour under winter works must not exceed 50 per cent of the cost of the project.

Kent square is situated in the center of the town and over the years since the town's incorporation it was never utilized for the purpose for which the planners intended, due to the fact that it is a low-lying area that requires filling and draining. The eventual success and finalization of the project plan will be more definitely assured if more citizens interest themselves in it by their attendance at future meetings of the Centennial committee, to which they are always welcome.



### NEW STAMPS

The Hon. Rene Tremblay, Postmaster General, designated January 19, 1966, as being the release date for two new stamps featuring the floral emblems and armorial bearings of the Provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta. These large size 5c stamps will be the ninth and tenth in the floral emblem series which began in May, 1964. The prairie lily was chosen as Saskatchewan's floral emblem in 1941. This stamp is printed in brown, green and orange. Alberta adopted the wild rose as its official emblem in 1930. Tones of red and green were used to print this stamp.
