

Yanks Sweep Twin Bill; Detroit, Cleveland Split

NEW YORK (AP)—Tom Tresh hit a grand-slam home run in the first game and a pinch-hit solo shot in the second in New York swept a doubleheader from California 8-1 and 1-1 Sunday.

Tresh's home-loaded homer in the opener came off Lew Burdette after Mickey Mantle hit his 20th homer of the season in the first inning. It was Mantle's 13th career homer, tying him with Lou Gehrig for sixth on the all-time home list.

Joe Pepitone added his 23rd second-inning homer in the sixth inning as Mel Stottlemyre, R.H., held the Angels in check.

Tresh came off the bench in the sixth inning of the nightcap and got the Yankees' first run off Dean Chance, who had retired the first 13 batters he

faced. The homers were Tresh's 12th and 13th of the season.

CLEVELAND (AP)—Mickey Stanley's run-scoring single in the 10th inning gave Detroit Tigers a 2-1 victory over Cleveland Sunday after the Indians won the opener 3-0 behind the hitting of Joe Altobelli.

Norm Cash started the Tigers' winning rally in the second game with a one-out single. Tom Kelley then walked off andlando McFarlane and Stanley followed with a single to left field.

McFarlane broke a scoreless tie in the fifth inning when he slammed a home run over the left field fence off Kelley's Del Crandall. He tied it in the bottom of the fifth with a homer off Detroit starter Johnny Podres.

The game was delayed 39 minutes by rain in the eighth.

BALTIMORE (AP)—J. C. Martin knocked in two runs with a misjudged triple and broken-bat single as Chicago edged Baltimore 4-0 Sunday and ended the seven-game winning streak of the American League-leading Orioles.

Bruce Howard allowed only four hits, giving up leadoff singles to Luis Aparicio and Brooks Robinson in the first two innings. Vic Roznosky opened the Oriole third with a double and Russ Snyder singled in the ninth.

Howard retired 20 batters in a row between Roznosky's and Snyder's hits and struck out.

BOSTON (AP)—A run-run homer by Cesar Tovar sparked Minnesota Twins to a 4-2 victory over Boston Sunday as pitcher Jim Perry got his 20th career victory over the Red Sox.

Tovar's blast in the second came after a walk to Don Mincher, giving the Twins a 3-2 lead the Red Sox could not overcome.

Tony Oliva drove in the first Minnesota run with a double in the opening inning and scored after another double in the seventh.

Perry earned his fifth victory of the year and now has a 20-7 lifetime mark against Boston although he needed relief help from Al Worthington in the seventh.

A spectacular fielding play by shortstop Zoilo Versalles helped Worthington end a Boston rally in the seventh. With two runners on base, Carl Yastrzemski drilled a slow bouncer through the box for an apparent hit, but Versalles went to the right of second base to make the stop and threw Yastrzemski out on a half Mincher had to dig out.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Washington Senators climbed out of the American League cellar by sweeping a doubleheader from Kansas City Athletics Sunday, winning the second 7-4 on homers by Ken Harrelson and Paul Casanova after taking the opener 6-2.

The Athletics jumped off to a 4-0 lead in the second game as Phil Cryer, but Harrelson tied it with a three-run pinch homer against his former teammates in the fourth. Casanova put the Senators ahead with a leadoff homer in the sixth.

The senators had the best of the recent Harrelson-Jim Duckworth trade, for the day at least. Duckworth gave up four hits, three walks, hit a batter, and added a wild pitch and error in 1-1-3 innings in losing the nightcap.

Riders, Eskies Cop CFL Matches

OTTAWA (CP)—Although plagued by fumbles and interceptions, Ottawa Rough Riders still managed a 16-10 win over British Columbia Lions Saturday night in a Canadian Football League exhibition game watched by 13,000 fans.

The Eastern Conference team fumbled four times and had three passes intercepted in winning their third straight preseason game, all against Western Conference clubs.

Lions, without first- and second-string quarterbacks Joe Kapp and Steve Shafer, now have lost their only two exhibition games. They fumbled twice and had two passes intercepted.

Russ Jackson, veteran Ottawa quarterback, tossed a 35-yard and zone-pass to flanker Why Tucker for the winning margin midway through the final quarter.

Riders got their other points on two field goals and two singles by Moe Racine and a safety touch. Lions conceded in order to move the ball from within the shadow of their goal posts.

EDMONTON (CP)—Tommy Joe Coffey kicked a 32-yard field goal with eight seconds remaining Saturday to give Edmonton Eskimos a 9-7 victory over Toronto Argonauts in a Canadian Football League exhibition game before about 7,500 fans.

Coffey's kick followed a fine display of short passing by Bill Redell, who came off the bench in the second half to settle down a sporadic offense.

A fumble recovery at the Edmonton 20 started Eskimos on the road-to-the-field game which salvaged the club's first exhibition victory after defeats by Calgary Stampeders and Winnipeg Blue Bombers.

Redell's first loss after the fumble recovery was incomplete. Then he threw six completions in a row — three to Randy Kerbow and one each to Mike Haffner, Wayne Davis and Thomas.

For Edmonton fans, the late surge wiped out memory of what was essentially a dull display. Jim Thomas took a pass from Redell for an Edmonton touchdown and Rob Taylor took a pass from Wally Gahler for an Argos touchdown.

Edmonton tallied 14 first downs on a total offense of 283 yards, compared with Argos' 12 first downs on 238 yards gained. Redell and Kerbow teamed for 175 yards through the air on 14 completions in 25 attempts and Gahler combined with Bill Van Burkleo completed 11 passes in 19 attempts.

Edmonton gained 108 yards rushing and Toronto 93.

Al Geiberger Grabs PGA Championships

AKRON, Ohio (AP)—Al Geiberger coolly braked an impending early collapse with two mighty birdie putts Sunday and then ran away to a record four-stroke victory in the golden anniversary Professional Golfers Association championship.

Refusing to be shaken by going three over par on the first four holes, the 28-year-old stringbean finished with a 72 for 280, even par for 72 holes over the back-breaking par-70 Firestone Country Club course.

Runner-up was Dudley Wysong, 27, who once moved within two shots of the lead but could never close the gap. Wysong had to birdie the 17th for a final 72 and 284.

Strung out in the rear of this pair were the greatest names in pro golf, including pre-tournament favorites Arnold Palmer and Jack Nicklaus, who never got their thunderbolt games in the groove.

Palmer mustered one of his familiar late charges with a final 68, matching the best round of the day, but that put him at 287, seven shots back of the poised young champion.

Nicklaus, the reigning Masters and British Open champion, never harnessed his awesome power and settled for a 71 and 292.

MATCHED PAR
Geiberger was the only player in the original field of 165 able to match the 35-35-70 par of the rugged, sun-baked Firestone course, long and demanding and called by Gary Player, "the toughest in the world."

Player finished with a 73 for 286. He tied Bill Casper, the new U.S. Open title-holder, and Gene Littler, a former Open champion, for third.

But the loudest applause of the thousands gathered around the fuchsia-green waters of the 54-year-old Sam Snead Dog Tired, limping badly from a muscle pull in his left hip. Snead knocked in a birdie put of 15 feet on the final hole for a 287.

George Knudson of Toronto, only Canadian in the tournament, finished with 297 after shooting a 74 Sunday. He began the tournament with a 72, went to 74, ballooned to 77 Saturday then came back down Sunday.

Giants Top Philadelphia; Pirates Overcome Astros

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Willie Mays cracked his 22nd homer of the season and 327th lifetime homer Sunday as San Francisco Giants beat Philadelphia 4-1.

Mays moved to within seven of second-place Jimmy Fox with his two-run blast in the third inning that increased the Giants' lead to 4-0.

It followed a single by Tito Francona and chased starter and loser Bob Buhl 55.

Francona started a two-run first inning with a single, moved to third on Tom Haller's single and scored on a wild pitch. Mays blooped a single to center and Haller came across as Willie McCovey grounded out.

Bill White singled with one out in the sixth and came all the way around on a double by Tony Gonzalez for the Phils' run.

HOUSTON (AP)—Pinch hitter Willie Stargell hit the opener then Joe Mauer and Phil Regan hurried a five-inning snapping a tie and sending the National League-leading Pittsburgh Pirates to a 1-0 victory over Houston Sunday.

Stargell's blast off Yalber Ron Taylor sailed into the regular field service ramp, a blow of more than 406 feet, and broke a 5-5 deadlock.

On base at the time were Mays, Alvin who had doubled, and Mauer. Mays, who had singled, the Pirates added their fourth run of the inning on Dion Clendon's double and a single by Jose Pagan.

Stargell's homer, his 24th, was the fourth of the day for Pittsburgh. Earlier, Jim Rigbo and Bob Bailey and Roberto Clemente homered for four of the Pirates' first five runs.

Four European Squads Enter World Cup Finals

LONDON (CP)—England, Portugal, Russia and West Germany turned the world soccer tournament into an all-European semi-final windup for the first time in 32 years Saturday when all four countries won their quarter-final matches.

Substitute Geoff Hurst scored the goal that gave England a 1-0 victory over Argentina before 85,000 persons at Wembley; Eusebio Ferreira scored four goals, a Cup record, as Portugal rallied from a 3-0 deficit to defeat North Korea 5-3 at Liverpool; Russia got a goal in each half to nip Hungary 2-1; and West Germany beat Uruguay 4-0 at Sheffield.

Russia plays West Germany in the first semi-final today at Liverpool. England meets Portugal in the second semi-final Tuesday at Wembley.

Both games start at 2.30 p.m. EDT.

The quarter-finals had a bit of everything—dirty play that led to three South American players being tossed out, stormy scenes as the South Americans refused to leave the field until police were called, and as exciting a game as anyone would want to see when Portugal scored five goals in a row to win.

The defeats of both Argentina and Uruguay brought an end to the South American dominance in world soccer.

Brazil, holder of the world title for the last eight years, was eliminated Wednesday.

The Uruguayans took their loss with good grace and team officials said the players who were tossed out of the game against the Germans deserved such punishment.

CHANGE TACTICS
After a promising start, in which the Uruguayans abandoned their usual tight defensive tactics and came near to scoring three goals in the first 20 minutes, play degenerated into a scrappy match, with foul, following foul.

West Germany, still a big power in the championship, led Uruguay 1-0 at halftime on Sargried Held's goal. Then disaster hit the Uruguayans, winners of the Cup in 1930 and 1950, when Troche and Silva were sent off.

With the South Americans down to nine men, the Germans quickly took advantage. Franz Beckenbauer scored in the 70th minute, Uwe Seeler in the 77th and Helmut Haller in the 84th.

Russia, also playing the semi-finals for the first time, knocked out the highly-regarded Hungarians.

Igor Chislenko scored for Russia in the fifth minute and Valeriy Prokudin got the second Soviet goal in the 46th minute. Ferenc Bene scored for Hungary in the 58th minute.

Soviet manager Nikolai Morozov felt his side had been lucky to beat the Hungarians. "I must admit that I was slightly worried in the second half after the Hungarians scored and kept hammering at our net," Morozov said.

Some 40,000 fans watched Portugal come from behind against North Korea.

TONY LEMA KILLED

SUMMERSIDE — A good crowd saw two race records set and at least two persons in that crowd enjoyed a couple of three-figure pays at the Summerside Raceway Saturday evening, as the two exactors on races five and nine, respectively paid \$115.70 and \$147.20. There were no double-dash winners, but some very exciting finishes, especially in race six, the second half of what was billed as the feature event, when Runway and Ripover finished in a dead heat for third, the two horses very close behind Port Hill Boy and Meadow Day, who finished one-two.

The new records were set by Highland Spirit, a seven-year-old chestnut gelding which won the first dash of the night, also the fastest, in a time of 2:11.4, lowering its record by a full second, and Rustico Bay in the fifth, winning in 2:14.4 and lowering its record from 2:16. Rustico Bay is owned by R. Carr, Charlottetown.

The other special pays also returned excellent interest in the lucky ones, with the daily double on races one and two paying \$98.90 to bettors on Highland Spirit and Runway, and the quinella on the seventh race paying \$29.90 on a combination of Name The Price and Just Nancy.
