NAVY DENIES RED FISHERMEN
Could Take Over Maritimes

HALIFAX (CP)—A naval spokesman said here a statement issued in a sudden outbreak of hostilities Communist fishermen could occupy the Atlantic coast of Nova Scotia in a few hours is not valid.

The statement was contained in an article by Terence Robertson in Weekend magazine, published March 27.

The article said "Red trawlers, fishing boats and submarines numbering 500 ignore all territorial limits. About 300 of these vessels are constantly off the coasts of Labrador, Nova Scotia and Newfoundland."

"No department of national defence authority would deny that in a sudden outbreak of hostilities the Communist fishermen could occupy the Atlantic coast of the province within a few hours."

The navy spokesman said "The navy spokesman said 'an invasion to occupy the territory would require air cover and a fleet of military transport ships and would have to be made in the face of considerable army and RCAF opposition within a few days of the navy.'"

The Chronicle-Herald says Chief of Defence Robert Gordon MacDermid said the Soviet fish transport ships are about four Russian factory ships from Baltic ports off the coast of Canada.

The two Russian vessels were quoted as saying Soviet vessels fish only in international waters.

The Russians said one company controls all Soviet fishing vessels operating out of Halifax ports. They said the company carries about 30 trawlers, each carrying a crew of about 25.

They said the company also has six or seven factory-trawlers which carry crews of 50 to 100.

OUTSPOKEN CANADIAN ARTIST
Keeps Eye Out for Market

WINNIPEG (CP)—An outspoken young artist who says abstract art is a farce uses the hard sell to make money with brush and canvas.

"You've got to be a businessman these days," says 19-year-old Barry Burdury. Artists don't have to starve."

Tall, lanky and talkative, Barry began painting at six "when I got into my father's paints," and sold his first work at 11.

That year he made \$200 in the summer selling water-color landscapes done on homemade wooden plaques to motels and stores in rural Manitoba.

Landscape art is still his forte. All told the bespectacled youth has done 200 oil paintings and 150 poster-like sketches.

He has a certain fondness for industrial sketches "because they sell so well" but hopes in time to reach the stage where he can avoid strictly commercial work because "I don't want people to tell me how to paint."

He recently sold eight sketches of the Pool-Richard oil company gas processing station in Manitoba to the firm for \$1,000. The \$20,000 plant is at Falcon Lake, a resort community 70 miles east of Winnipeg where Burdury lives with his parents.

 An only son, Barry accompanies his father, a contractor, on building jobs through Manitoba, painting and drawing on the way.

Always with an eye for a market, Burdury in 1961 sold four oil landscapes to an insurance firm for \$800 for wall decoration.

A 30-square-foot mural he did hangs in a Gypsumville beer parlor. He net \$500 for that one.

He's "treasure" by coincidence this winter to complete Grade 12 so he can enrol next fall at the university of Manitoba next September.

Subjects of his paintings are always recognizable, although he does not aim for absolute photographic likeness. In college he "tried to stay away from that abstract stuff" which, he says, offends the eye with an "array of sticky colors."

FORMER BRITISH COLONIAL MINISTER
Dies in London

LONDON (Reuters)—John Dugdale, 57-year-old former minister of state for the colonies and a lifelong opponent of the color bar in colonial territories, died Tuesday night.

Dugdale, an opposition Liberal MP, collapsed Monday night while speaking in a debate in the House of Commons and was taken to hospital.

Cause of death was not disclosed.

CARTHAGE, Mo. (AP)—Muggs, an 19½-year-old half Boston terrier, has suffered from arthritis since his left shoulder was fractured by a car about four years ago.

Dr. E. L. Millenbruck, the veterinarian, says Muggs has been showing up about every three weeks for the last three years.
