Keel Shipped For Atlantic Pavilion Schooner At Expo

The 7,500-pound lead and oak keel, stern post and sterna post that will be used in the construction of the schooner at the Atlantic Provinces Pavilion at Expo 67 next year have been shipped from Lunenburg, N.S. to Montreal for storage.

The oak in the keel has been described by boatbuilder David Stevens of Second Peninsula, Lunenburg County, "as the best piece of native oak" he has ever seen during his career.

Mr. Stevens and a ship building team will construct the 47-schooner in front of the Atlantic Pavilion.

The general manager of the Atlantic Pavilion, Rear Admiral Hugh F. Pullen, recently told a Montreal press briefing that the schooner-building project will be one of the most unique attractions at Expo 67, as visitors will be able to follow construction of

the vessel from keel-laying to launching.

The two-masted schooner has a strong identification with the Atlantic Provinces. For more than 200 years it contributed to the economy as a fishing vessel, trading vessel and passenger vessel.

"It is therefore fitting that in choosing to display the creativity and craftsmanship of the people that the Atlantic Provinces decided to have a schooner built," Admiral Pullen said.

The schooner project will be the main outdoor attraction at the Atlantic Pavilion, a joint venture of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland. Officials of the four-province pavilion planning committee have spared no effort to ensure that the project will be an overwhelming success.

that has taken place to date, Mr. Stevens and his team have built a prototype of the schooner which will be launched shortly at Second Peninsula. Construction on the prototype started this summer and the vessel is now being fitted out.

start construction on the Atlantic Pavilion schooner following the opening of Expo on April 28. With the keel, stern post, sterna post and other main timbers already at the pavilion, there will be activity in the boat pit from the day the exhibition opens until the vessel is launched later in the summer.

In the first stage of construction, the lead and oak keel will be set up and the stern post, stern post and main timbers erected and bolted in place. The builder will then place his moulds on the keel, the shape of the moulds having been taken off full size from the builder's half model of the hull.

The moulds will be held by longitudinal batons and after this the oak frames will be steamed and bent to shape. Mahogany will be used to plank the vessel and all fastenings will be either copper or bronze.

The vessel's accommodation will comprise a two-berth owner's cabin forward. There will be a three-berth main salon with provisions for an additional pull-out berth. Aft there will be a stainless steel galley unit complete with refrigerator, two quarter berths and a chart table.

The vessel will have a 50 horsepower diesel auxiliary and will carry 100 gallons of fuel and a similar supply of water. The cabin will be of oak and mahogany with natural finish inside.

The design committee of the N.S. Schooner Association, under the chairmanship of Mr. Robert McQuinn, has worked closely with the builder in striving to achieve the best possible interior layout.

Most of the material and equipment used in the building of the vessel will be obtained in the Atlantic Provinces: paint from Newfoundland, refrigerator and galley unit from New Brunswick, batteries, sails, deck fittings from Nova Scotia.

The vessel, which will carry a two-way radio, a D-F set and echo sounder, has more than 1,300 square feet of sail: a 47-foot mainmast, a 15-foot main topmast and a 34-foot foremast.
