John Mullally To Seek Lib. Nomination, Aug. 9

John Mullally, Souris accountant and school teacher, will definitely be a candidate for the Liberal nomination to contest Kings County at the next federal election, he said Saturday.

The Liberal convention for Kings County has been called for Aug. 9 at Georgetown by Major Reid, Rollo Bay, president of the Kings County Liberal Association.

Mr. Mullally told the party nomination in the last election, by a narrow margin, to veteran Thomas J. Kichham, who was defeated last June by James A. Macdonald.

It could not be learned whether Mr. Mullally will encounter any opposition in the forthcoming convention.

When last year's convention was held, Mr. Kichham stated on the convention platform that it was the last time he would come before the party at the nomination. Following his defeat last June, he publicly re-

STEELETON, Pa. (AP) — At least 19 persons were killed Saturday when three cars of a speeding Pennsylvania railroad baseball special left the tracks and plunged into the shallow Susquehanna River. About 116 were reported injured.

A track out of alignment may have caused the derailment of the nine-car train which was travelling at nearly 70 miles an hour, railroad said Sunday.

Hospital officials identified 17 victims, and there were two more bodies in Harrisburg hospitals. Many bodies were disfigured and mangled, making an accurate count difficult.

The crash was the worst American rail disaster since Sept. 15, 1958, when 46 died as a train plunged through an open draw bridge at Bayonne, N.J., into Newark Bay.

BOUND FOR GAME The train was carrying fans to a National League baseball game between Pittsburgh Pirates and Philadelphia Phillies.

The train had left a few minutes earlier from the Pennsylvania State Penitentiary where all the passengers boarded. Many of them were fathers and sons, mothers and daughters carrying pennants and peanuts for the game.

Some of the pennants floated down the river after the crash. After tumbling down the 40-foot river embankment two of the shattered cars came to rest on their sides. The third, its roof shredded, remained upright in about three feet of

Tomboy Features Quebec Track Meet

MONTREAL (CP) — A curly haired tomboy who once played hockey on a boys' team showed her prowess for track and field during the weekend by winning two events and cracking a Quebec open record at the Eastern Canada senior track championships in suburban St. Lambert.

Abigail Hoffman, a blonde 15-year old representing Toronto Olympic Club, placed first in the women's 220 yards and set a provincial open record of 2:15.5 in the women's 800 yards. The old Quebec open record was 2:37.

It was one of six records broken or tied in the two-day meet. Hike van der Val of Hamilton Olympic Club topped the list, setting a Canadian open and a new record of 1:05.5 in the grueling 3,000-metre steeplechase. Van der Val rounded the track-studded, with three-foot hurdles and a water jump—led a minutes ahead of Toronto Olympic's Ron Wallington, who set his own provincial active record, 2:24.4 at the 1960 Olympic trials in Saskatoon.

Well behind Baxter was teammate Maurice d'Anjou with 18 feet 3 inches. Juris Teraudis of the Eastern Townships Track Club was third.

Toronto Olympic competitors figured prominently in other track events. Hurdles specialist John Passmore won both the 120 and 440-yard hurdles by a wide margin, and Jim Irons won just as handily in the men's 800 yards and mile.

Bob Fisher-Smith of Ottawa topped both sprint events, the 100 yards in 8.5 seconds and the 200 in 22.2. The pole vaulter went to Jon Morse of France Arnis who cleared 18 feet. Alfred Groom of Summerside was second.
