Rudy Pilous Ousted

PERISTENT rumors in recent weeks that Rudy Pilous would not be around as coach of Chicago Black Hawks next season weren't unfounded. The Chicago organization made the announcement yesterday and said that a replacement for Pilous would not be made until after the June league draft meeting.

The rumors that Rudy was through as coach started following the collapse of the Black Hawks at the end of the past season and every so often since then the rumor kept cropping up.

Asked about his chances of remaining as pilot of the Hawks for the 1963-64 season following this year's playoffs, smiling Rudy answered "I'm not worried. I am in with 'big J' and little 'R' (meaning owner Jim Norris and general manager Tommy Ivan). His position was more precarious than he had anticipated, as yesterday's announcement showed.

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Wouldn't Confirm Story

WHEN a story appeared in the papers late last week that Pilous was on his way out the St. Kit native refused to comment one way or another.

"It is true, all I can say is that I do coach but have been hired and fired since the first day they tied a dollar back to a pack."

"I spent 5½ pleasant years in Chicago and enjoyed every minute of it. I was well treated by the Hawks and by the press, radio and television people there. Regardless of their decision, I have the warmest feeling towards Mr. Norris, Mr. Ivan and the players, many of whom I coached since they were juveniles or juniors."

"If I'm out," he added, "then I will wish the Hawks every success."

The rumors appear to be in the running for the now-vacant position. Billy Rey, former star with Montreal, Habs, ex-Maple Leaf pilot and present coach of farm club Bloomington, seems to have the edge. He is run for the job. Gus Kyle, the ex-omnibus who once starred with St. John as a defenseman in Maritime hockey before taking over with the Hawks in 1957, also has a slim chance of getting the job. Reports are that Tommy Ivan likes him.

"I know one member of the hockey fraternity put it, 'whoever gets the job won't find it a soft touch as those Chicago players are hard to handle'."

The aunt, Mrs. Angeline McLeay, said she was uncertain as to whether Ernie knew he was dying. "If he did, we didn't know about it," she said. "But I think he must have known something. It was something between him and his lawyer. He didn't tell his mother to know but I think he and his lawyer knew."

Davis' former coach at Syracuse University, Ben Schwartzwalder, called Davis the perfect athlete. Schwartzwalder said, "Ernie was talented, dedicated and selfless. He was one of those who you set a fine example for youngsters every day."

A former teammate at Syracuse, Morrie Loumans, said "he looked in excellent condition when I saw him two weeks ago."

We said last week not to be surprised if little N.B. Jockey Ron Turcotte appeared in rich U.S. races in the not too distant future.

He appears to have made a major step toward that goal. Jockey Lounesque, multi-millionaire track and horse owner and SUDU graduate, has chosen him to ride his Royal Maple in the Queen's Plate classic June 15. Yesterday Turcotte scored his first win in the meet aboard the well-regarded Levesque colt.

PE Rifle Assn Stages 2 Events

Two full afternoons comprised the opening program of the Prince Edward Island Rifle Association's 1963 events held over the holiday weekend at Squaw Point range.

Both ranges, one Saturday afternoon and the other Monday afternoon are contained in the series of matches. The events were arranged as qualifying shoots for the eight-man team which will represent the province at Sussex, N.B. on June 15.

Over 200 marksmen turned out and the matches were conducted in almost ideal weather conditions, and the resulting scores were indicative of this.

On Saturday, the match consisted of seven shots at each of the 300, 500 and 600 yards, this gave a possible total of 140 points.

NO REPLACEMENT NAMED

Black Hawks Announce Firing Of Rudy Pilous

CHICAGO (AP) — Chicago Black Hawks announced Tuesday that Rudy Pilous will not be rehired and a new coach will be made until after the June league draft meeting.

"Owing to the absence of Jim Norris, Black Hawks owner who is in Europe," General Manager Tommy Ivan said, "no decision on a new coach will be made until after the June league draft meeting."

Rumors persisted last week that Pilous, Black Hawks coach since Jan. 1, 1958, would be dismissed and replaced by Billy Rey, coach of Buffalo in the American Hockey League.

Rey's Buffalo team won its first league title and American League playoff championship last season.

Support Given Surprise Move

BERLIN (AP) — A surprise move developed Tuesday to award the 1968 Olympic Games to divided Berlin. The idea drew immediate support from leading Olympic officials here.

Success of the project hinged on the co-operation of the Communist East Germans, which in effect would mean opening the Berlin Wall.

"This would be a great triumph for amateur sports and the Olympic movement, and it would not political wrangling and shame," said Brandt, president of the International Olympic Committee.

"It would be a victory of sport over politics," Otto Mayer, chairman of the IOC, said in Lausanne, Switzerland. He added that the IOC welcomed the proposal.

"The suggestion was made by Willy Brandt, mayor of West Berlin, earlier this year but it was kept a secret while waiting for word from the East Germans. There has been no official response from them, although West Berlin sources say East Berlin officials have reacted favorably to the plan."

Decision on the site is scheduled to be made at a meeting Oct. 19 of the 64-member IOC at Nairobi, Kenya.

Five other cities have applied formally for the right to hold the Games—Mexico City, Detroit, Buenos Aires, Vienna and Lyons, France. Until the surprise, last-minute move by Berlin, Detroit and Lyons were rated favorites.

The Games were last held in Berlin in 1936 when Adolf Hitler was in power. Facilities used in the 1936 Games are on both sides of the Berlin Wall. Meyer said it would be impossible to hold the Games in Berlin unless both sides cooperated.

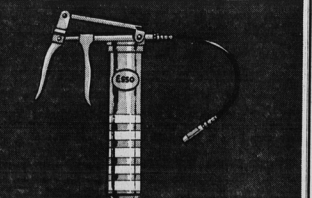

NO PLACE FOR CAT

CHELTENHAM, England (CP)—About 2,000 dogs were waiting to be judged in the West of England championships when a cat jumped into the show ring, jumped a ginger tomato, to a cacophony of barking and shouting in the ring before a hasty retreat.

Delegates at the CAHA annual meeting referred the question to the executive for further study.

The referral decision followed rejection of a British Columbia proposal suggesting that the CAHA push for a program to give university scholarships for hockey players.

Secretary Manager Gordon Juckes warned that the question of scholarships has many implications.

For one thing, it's up to the universities to work out their needs out if the proposal was passed in view of the university's physical fitness program be set aside for scholarships in all competitive sports.

The idea would be to develop Canadian athletes and encourage competition between our university athletes.

Also asked for was a CAHA program for the federal government to pay for scholarships for outstanding Canadian athletes.

Mantle Slams Two Homers

NEW YORK (AP)—Mickey Vernon smacked two homers, bating across five runs, and powered New York Yankees to a 7-4 victory over Kansas City Athletics Tuesday night.

Mantle belted long Orlando Pena for a three-run homer in the first inning and connected with one on the fifth against Diego Segui. The switch-hitting slugger now has eight homers this year and 412 for his career.

Mantle, the other half of the Yanks' M and M power team, followed Mantle's second homer with his fifth of the season for New York's final run.

Twins Crush Red Sox 8-2

BOSTON (AP)—Surgling Minnesota clobbered Boston 8-2 Tuesday night, putting together its biggest inning of the year in a seven-run third inning outburst for the Twins fifth victory in six games.

Winning pitcher Jim Perry, Vic Power and Rich Rollins each drove in a pair of runs as the Twins sent 10 men to the plate in the third and a wild pitch during the Minnesota spree.

Lee May opened the Milwaukee ninth with a walk. Hank Aaron struck out, Eddie Mathers walked and Henry came in when Maloney went to a count of two balls and wild strikes on Norm Larker. Punched out, Frank Torre grounded out, ending the game.

Frank Robinson knocked in both Cincinnati runs against Leon Ber Herman.

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
