Yearlings Bring Great Prices.

The annual sale of the famous Belle Meade yearlings commenced on Monday, about 1,000 horsemen being in attendance, at the stud farm near Nashville. The highest priced colts are a full brother to Reporter by Enquirer—Bonnie Meade, whom J. M. Brown, Texas, bought for \$3,700; a brown colt by Iroquois—Bonnette, which went to the same stables, for \$3,500, and a chestnut by Lake Blackburn and Tullahoma, bought for \$3,100 by the enterprising Brown. The highest-priced filly was a brown by Iroquois—Castilla, which sold for an even \$2,000. Forty-four head were sold altogether the first day, bringing \$47,276, an average of \$1,084 per animal. The Enquirer colts brought the most money, four selling for \$3,800. The Iroquois filles led, six being sold for \$3,800. The Iroquois filles led, at an average of \$1,014, the Enquirer fillies averaging \$833.

Maritime Province Club

A NEW SOCIAL ORGANIZATION FORMED IN BOSTON.

The "Maritime Province club" is fairly launched on the sea of Boston social life. An enthusiastic meeting was held on the evening of the 7th inst. at Social Hall, Tremont Temple. Dr. R. Upham presided.

A constitution was adopted which provides that natives of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island and their descendants shall be eligible to membership; that the objects of the club shall be for "literary, social and charitable purposes;" that ladies shall be admitted, but shall not be called upon for money, or permitted to hold office or vote. No religious or political subject, foreign to the purpose of the club, will be discussed at its meetings.
It is the purpose to push the club during the next three months, and to have addresses from the distinguished men of the provinces who will pass through Boston during the summer months. By fall the organizers expect to have a good club room which will be open every evening in the week. Another meeting will be held on next Thursday evening.

Movements of the Fish.

(Fisheries Intelligence Bureau.)
HALIFAX, May 9.—The reports received at the Fisheries Bureau to-night are as below: Lobsters reported plentiful at Perce and Grand River, Que., but none at Paspébie. Great hauls were also taken at Minitigash, P. E. I., where it is reported fishing has not been so good since 1881. Lobsters also reported good at Port La Tour and fair at Lockport and Digby, N. S. Herring reported plentiful at Perce, Que., but poor at Grand River; fair at Paspébie, Que., and very plentiful all round in the vicinity of Alberton, P. E. I. Cod-fishing reported good of Scatterie and Liscomb Ridges, C. B., and at Lockport, N. S.; poor at Port La Tour and Digby. Haddock fishing fair at Dover Bay and Digby, N. S. Bankers are getting baited quickly in Bras D'Or Lake. Herring still plentiful at St. Ann's, C. B., but none taken to-day at the Magdalens. Ice obtainable at Canso, White Head, Lockport and Digby, N. S.

How to Breathe.

"Our young people do not know how to breathe," said an old doctor to an anxious mother whose daughter, a young girl of 17, had for some time a severe cold that had slightly affected the upper air passages of her lungs. "When the child inflates her lungs as I direct her you can hear the cracking of all the dissolved air cells that for the first time have been brought into play this winter. You see," he went on, "the tendency of all persons is to use only the upper portions of the lungs. It is only after the fatigue and exertion consequent on unusual exercise that the lower part is utilized at all. And just as people can live for years with only one sound lung, so can everyone use only the upper portion and feel well enough at the time. Girls, therefore, draw their corset strings and say it doesn't hurt in the least to wear their strings a little tight; and apparently they are right. They play tennis and ride and row and even swim in their well-pulled-in stays; but let illness attend them, let them need their lung power to provide pure blood or breathing room to resist disease, or let the cares of maternity come upon them, they may regret that they wilfully sinned against nature.
"But many err, too, simply through laziness, a lack of knowledge, or through bad habits of partial breathing contracted in youth; but be that as it may, not one person in 10, or even 20, knows how to breathe. If I had my way I should teach breathing in every school in the country. Here is an exercise I want your daughter to practice right at morning; and so excellent are its effects that I have known it even cure incipient consumption. While you count 15 slowly, let her take a long breath, so that she can feel it inflating all air cells of the lower part of her lungs. When you reach 15 let her begin slowly to expel the air from her lungs and keep on until another 15 are counted. A few times will tire her much at first, and bring on fits of coughing; but let her persevere and she will soon be able to do it 10 or 12 times at each exercise. And I think I can promise you material benefit."—N. Y. Tribune.
