

Suspended Sentence Given For Assault

A two-year suspended sentence was handed down to William Bruce MacCallum, Charlottetown, on an assault charge by Magistrate A.J. Haslam, QC, in city police court yesterday.

The case of William Alfred MacLeod, Charlottetown, accused of illegally selling liquor, was adjourned until Nov. 3.

Two persons appeared on drunk and disorderly charges. Edward R. Rice, Charlottetown, was fined \$20 and costs or 20 days and Ronald Woodgate, Mermaid, was remanded until Oct. 31.

Also adjourned until Oct. 31 was the case of Malcolm J. MacMillan, Charlottetown, charged with operating a motor vehicle with defective brakes.

One person charged with driving a bicycle without due care and attention and another charged with being drunk and incapable were each fined \$5 and costs or two days.

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'Side Boys' Club Project Approved For Winter Works

OTAWA — The project for a boys' club at Summerside has been approved under the federal-provincial municipal winter-works program, Solicitor General Watson MacNaught announced here yesterday.

The club will cater to about 200 boys in the Summerside area and the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce has donated a building, formerly Palmer's Garage, which will be moved to a site opposite the home on Notre Dame Street.

Total amount of the project is \$16,044 and a labor cost of \$6,383 will be provided by the federal government. It will mean 676 days of work for 16 men, Mr. MacNaught said. The provincial government will contribute \$3,194 and Summerside takes care of 10 per cent of the labor cost and cost of material.

Under the winter works program, which runs from Nov. 1 to April 30, work cannot be started until Nov. 15 and for the incentive payments.

Mr. MacNaught said the project was an example of how speedily the department of labour works in such cases. The Summerside application was received on Monday, along with several hundred other applications, and was approved on the same day.

Selling Liquor Charge Laid After Husband Is Dismissed

SUMMERSIDE — A charge of selling liquor to minors was laid against Mrs. Cecil William Skerry of MacNeil's Mills by the RCMP Tuesday.

Magistrate W. Chester S. Macdonald dismissed a charge of selling liquor to minors against Mr. Skerry in Prince County Court.

Hearing of the charge against Mrs. Skerry, was set for Oct. 29.

In the case against Mr. Skerry, evidence was given by three Crown witnesses.

Cd. Donald Bartlett of the Summerside Division, RCMP; Joseph Robert Edson Coffin of MacNeil's Mills and Kenneth Wilson of Inverness were called by crown prosecutor George MacMasters. The latter pair, both 18 years of age, testified to purchasing liquor at the home of Cecil Skerry and MacNeil's Mills on the evening of Sept. 24 but that they paid Mrs. Skerry \$8 for the two pints received.

Joseph Frederick Christophy of Tinian Island was called to a charge of theft of a beer valued at \$1.80, the property of Alfred Perry of St. John's and was remanded for hearing Nov. 12.

The accused elected trial by magistrate.

Joseph Leigh Bernard of Nova Scotia was given a 30-day sentence in Prince County court when he pleaded guilty to a charge of taking a motor vehicle without the owner's permission.

Boyd Allister Crozier of North Bay was fined \$10 and costs for failing to yield the right of way when entering the highway. William Charles G. Richards was fined \$10 and costs after the fish and game protection act.

Raymond Joseph Brown of Richmond was fined \$10 and costs for passing over a solid line the subscription campaign to be held Nov. 10 to 28.

Joseph Adrian DesRoche of Lunenburg was given a valid licence for driving without a valid licence.

Water Authority' On Pollution Recommended For Charlottetown

A "water authority" to be established by the province "at an early date" to determine acceptable pollution limits of waters, has been recommended by the water pollution advisory committee for the Charlottetown area.

The report of the committee, representing Charlottetown, Parkdale, Sherwood, the metropolitan committee and the provincial department of health, was made available Tuesday.

It is recommended that the water authority have powers similar to such bodies in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. It is stated that "until such an authority is established, progress can only be achieved in pollution control" by voluntary agreement of the various municipalities involved.

Also recommended is that industrial wastes by-law, limiting the strength of wastes accepted into the various sewer systems, be enacted at an early date "in the meantime," it is pointed out, "the various municipalities concerned should encourage existing industries, as mentioned in the Richards' Report, to contribute extensively to the Charlottetown Harbor pollution by voluntarily assisting in the abatement of the problem."

The Richards' firm carried out a pollution survey of the harbor and submitted its recommendations to the water pollution advisory committee a year ago.

The Richards' firm found that there is "significant water pollution along Charlottetown water front from Victoria Park northwards to the Riverside and Ellieburn Hospitals."

NO EVIDENCE
The firm pointed out, however,

that there was no evidence of serious pollution of the harbor as a whole and said the most serious areas of pollution are the pockets of water in the Hillsboro estuary which are found by the west embankment of the Hillsboro Bridge approaches.

The report added "The Parkdale sewer outlet and the wastes from Canada Packers Limited plant cause extensive pollution and nuisance in these areas."

Recommended as remedial action was "a new interceptor sewer and force main should be laid commencing at Parkdale outfall sewer near the racetrack and leading to the south end of the 60-inch outfall sewer at HMCS Queen Charlotte."

"New automatic sewage pumping stations should replace the existing out-dated manual operated Dorchester Street and Fitzroy Street sewage pumping stations."

"A new chlorination and comminuting station should be constructed to treat the sanitary wastes prior to discharge to the 60-inch outfall sewer."

"Government agencies and private firms directing raw sewage into the water in the dock area should be required to cease this practice within a given time limit."

"Separate sanitary and storm sewers should be constructed in the future."

Also recommended by the Richards' firm was that "an industrial wastes by-law regulating the strength of wastes accepted into the sewer systems" be made.

FAIR, REASONABLE
The Charlottetown area pollution advisory committee says a

tion advisory committee says "in general, the recommendations of the Richards' firm appear to be fair and reasonable."

The committee feels that "further study of some of the detailed proposals will be required by the local authorities before implementing." It recommends that "until the Richards' report is implemented in full, all improvements or extensions to the various systems concerned be in accordance with the general intent of the Richards' report."

"The committee feels that "from the esthetic standpoint, the area of the waterfront from the Parkdale Outfall to the Pownall Street Outfall should receive first consideration."

Charges Against Former Mayor Are Dismissed

BRACEBRIDGE, Ont. (CP)—Charges of municipal corruption and conspiracy against Mrs. Wanda Miller, a former Graydenburgh, Ont., mayor, were dismissed here in judgment handed down by Magistrate Albert Marck after a preliminary hearing last week.

Mrs. Miller was charged with accepting 150 shares of Northern Ontario Natural Gas company stock for obtaining the company's franchise in Graydenburgh in 1956, with obtaining an application by Consumers' Gas Company of Toronto and with conspiring with NONG President Ralph K. Farris.

Mrs. Miller was the third former Ontario mayor to be cleared of the charges in connection with NONG stock. A fourth former mayor, Wilbur Cramp of Orillia, has been committed for trial in Ontario Supreme court sitting in Barrie next month.

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British Tariffs May Hit Lumber From Canada

LONDON (CP)—British's extra 15-per-cent tariff may hurt Canadian exports of lumber, Canadian authorities said here in a campaign being launched to encourage Britain to turn more to timber - built housing means overcoming a housing shortage.

But these Canadian-designed houses require the use of treated or finished lumber. The Canadian industry had hoped that if the idea caught on, a big new British market would be opened for Canadian dressed lumber.

Now the British government has imposed the 15-per-cent surcharge on these imports as well as on newspaper, veneers and plywood and such other forest products and paper and paper board.

The British Timber Trade Federation has urged the government to rescind the extra duty on plywood and planned softwood products and authorities here are hopeful the administration may make some modifications in the tax law.

ODDS ON REDS IN MOON RACE

LONDON (Reuters) — William Hill's, which claims to be the biggest of the British and legal bookmakers, makes the Russians 100-to-1 favorites to be the first man on the moon.

The odds are against the Russians landing a man on the moon before 1971 and the Americans are quoted at 100-to-1.

All other countries are offered at 2,000-1.

A Hill's spokesman said: "It's a two-horse race."

Hill's moon race book was officially opened Monday night.

Hill's which made a \$48,000 (\$14,000 profit) the British general election Oct. 15, described a gamble on the moon race as "a very good bet, it may very well happen."
