IRISH RELIEF.—By a collection in St. Patrick's Church, Fort Augustus, the amount of one hundred and sixty-two dollars was realized for the relief of the Irish Famine sufferers.

THE auction sale, by A. McNeill, Auctioneer, of Saskatchewan Seed Wheat at the Grain Show, next Tuesday, as advertised, offers farmers a rare chance to improve their wheat crop. Col. At the public meeting held at Kelly's Cross on Monday, the 23rd inst., the following resolution was moved by John Bradley, Esq., and seconded by F. Malone, Esq., and carried unanimously:—

Whereas, The present Government, during the short time they have been in power, have, by pursuing a system of economy, lessened the number of officials, reduced the salaries of the heads of the several departments of the public service, and greatly reduced the taxation of the country, thereby carrying out, as far as is consistent with the efficiency of the public service, the reforms promised them at last general election.

And Whereas, We heartily approve of and evidence the general policy of the Government during the last year, and have every confidence in them, thinking they will continue to administer the affairs of the Province in the same prudent and economical manner in the future as they have done in the past.

And Whereas, The Hon. W. Campbell, whose conduct as our representative meets with our approval, has accepted the office of Superintendent of Public Works, which renders his seat vacant in the House of Assembly.

Therefore, Resolved, That in the opinion of this meeting, the Hon. W. Campbell is again entitled to our confidence and support, and we regard any opposition to Mr. Campbell's re-election, at the present time, as mischievous and detrimental to the best interests of the district.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

OTTAWA, March 17.

The Senate will probably adjourn on Friday until the 30th.

The Governor-General and suite visited the Hullion mines yesterday and witnessed blasting operations.

The St. George, St. Andrew's, Caledonia and other Societies will take part in the funeral procession of Hon. Mr. Holton, at Montreal to-day. The pall-bearers will be Mackenzie, Blake, Huntington, Chief Justice Dorion, Judge Cross, Joseph Mackay, Henry Stairs and Thomas Workman. The procession will form at two o'clock at the residence of the deceased on Sherbrooke street, and proceed to the Church of the Messiah, of which he was a member. The funeral services will be conducted by Dr. Corder, after which the interment will take place in Mount Royal Cemetery. Last evening, addresses of condolence were passed by the Montreal Board of Trade and Club National. Among others who went to Montreal to attend the funeral are Sir A. J. Smith, Hon. J. Burpee, Hon. Mr. Anglin, and Messrs. Snowball, C. Burpee, King and Rogers.

Mr. Gillmore who has been ill of cold in the lungs is much better.

LONDON, March 17.

Thomas Bell the English scientist is dead. A Cabul despatch says that it is creditably reported that Abdul Rahman Ran, accompanied by the Ameer of Bidakshan and two Russian officers, arrived in the early part of March at Jaktopol, a military station of Balkh.

The Governor of Turkestan demurred to receiving him, but his objections were over ruled by Abdul Rahman's troops.

A Shanghai despatch of the 16th states that the Pekin authorities have condemned Chung-how, late Ambassador to Russia, to death. He was originally suspended on pretence that he had returned without imperial permission.

His stipulations with Russia are considered prejudicial to the dignity of China.

The decision carries with it grave complications between China and Russia, for the Czar certainly will resent the severe punishment of the envoy.

The Chinese army are being armed with modern weapons, and foreign drill masters are instructing Chinese soldiers. The defenses on the coasts are being strengthened, and preparations made for calling out irregular volunteers who are only mustered in the greatest crisis of the State.
