Potato Appeal Cases Adjourned

By agreement between counsel the appeal cases of five Kings County men from decisions of the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board were adjourned till November 12, and will be heard in Charlottetown. Mr. Gordon MacMillan, counsel for the Potato Board, made the request in Supreme Court, Georgetown, yesterday, and it was granted by Mr. Justice M. R. MacGuigan, who was presiding.

Those appealing are Messrs. John A. MacInnis, Douglas Aitken, John Aitken, Charles W. Townsend and Letha Townshend. Representing the appellants is Mr. Melvin McQuaid, Souris. In court Mr. S. S. Hessian, representing the Crown in appeals heard, made a motion that Mr. John Miller MacDonald, Postal employee of Charlottetown, be appointed a commissioner for the taking of affidavits in Queens County. This was granted.

Other Appeals The appeal case of The Queen, respondent, versus John H. Rafuse, appellant, from a conviction before Stipendiary Magistrate Joseph MacDonald for a breach of the Exercise Act was heard with some new evidence offered by Cpl. Allan Johnson of the R. C. M. P., this city. Cpl. Johnson testified as to the relative position of the seized still and mash and the house of the accused. Evidence taken in the lower court and transcribed there was accepted. The case was adjourned for judgment until today.

Mrs. S. S. Hessian, Q. C., appeared for the Crown and Mrs. J. Lester O'Donnell for the appellant. In the appeal of Wallace B. White against a conviction for drunken driving before Magistrate Joseph MacDonald, Q. C., the Crown, represented by Mr. Hessian, asked for a reduction in the charge to make it one of reckless driving. Mr. J. A. MacDonald, appearing for the appellant, pleaded guilty to the lesser charge and the Court assessed a fine of \$50 or 30 days in jail with an allowance for counsel fees.

She was the winner of the senior calf class.

Guernseys

Nova Scotia Guernsey breeders had an edge on those from Prince Edward Island at the New Brunswick in the Maritime Winter Fair showing today but the competition was so close that nobody was able to establish any definite superiority in the classes completed before time ran out on the judge and showmen. The cows-in-milk classes and the progeny and senior herds and gets will be judged on Wednesday.

V. B. Leonard, Bridgetown and F. W. Saunders of Aylesford each had three red ribbons in this class. The N. S. Department of Agriculture had two, including the junior female championship, Harold Palmer was the Island's leading showman. He had one first, a second, and a couple of thirds a fourth and several other runner-up positions. He also had a championship ribbon on his sign board at the day's end.

The Coles' bull was grand champion here last year and was good enough to later be given honorable mention for all Canada. Today the two bulls that were placed over him in this class outstripped him in size but several veteran Guernsey breeders and showmen thought the superiority stopped there. The placing brought out some interesting ringside comment; however:

The senior and grand champion male was Mountain View Dexter, a top notch animal owned by the Dominion Department of Agriculture at Norton, N. B. The reserve senior was Brookhill, B. R. Music-maker owned by V. B. Leonard Bridgetown, N. S.

The reserve grand champion was the junior champion. He was Mountain Dale Fearless, owned by Walter G. Coulter and Sons Norton, N. B. College Bluenose Carol, a senior yearling heifer won the junior female championship for the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture, Wolfonia Fancy was reserve junior female champion for Wallace Stead of Princeport, Nova Scotia.

Dairy Display

Island cheddar cheese and the new Perfection Condensed Milk are two of the many products featured in the Prince Edward Island section of the dairy products display by the Maritime Federation of Agriculture at the Maritime Winter Fair. The display was arranged by Henry J. MacDonald, dairy superintendent for the Province and his assistant Earl Adams. Mr. MacDonald is in charge of the display for the week.

Newton and Son of Kingston and the Guernsey herds of Harold Palmer of Kensington and Ernest F. Coles and Son of Milton. R. A. Profit of Pictou had his herd entered in the fair but he has to leave them home when the man who was going to help him at the show had to make a last minute change of plans. Allison is a co-owner of Blackford Duke, a mature Holstein bull which is owned jointly by himself and Courtney B. Lusby of Amherst.

Standard Bred Horses

Pixie Girl, owned by R. S. Humphrey of Kensington is the champion standard bred mare at the Maritime Winter Fair. A beautifully turned animal, Pixie Girl catches the eye of horse fanciers every time she shows and there is a reason. She is a daughter of Monana, the grand old mare that won more championships for Mr. Humphrey in her years than he can remember easily. Pixie Girl is sired by Abner T. Clegg and was one of the three animals who got the sire class that won that event for Mr. Humphrey this afternoon. The others were Thelma Clegg, her dam is Lorraine Abbe, and a young foal Monana Clegg, also sired by the Clegg stallion Monana Clegg took the foal class and she and Pixie combined to win the progeny of dam class for the offspring of Monana that has shown and won so many times here in past years. Monana is carrying another Clegg colt as at present, Mr. Humphrey told the Guardian here this afternoon.

George A. Callbeck showed second and third prize progeny. One was out of the Clegg. The other was the progeny of Guy Anne Bow Tie and Ann Clegg made up the progeny of Guy Ann that showed here. Fourth place in the progeny class went to James E. MacNeill, Spring Valley, the Maritime pinto to king.

Anne Clegg and her foal won the mare with foal at the class for Mr. Callbeck. Second place went to James E. MacNeill with Lorraine Abbe and her foal. Mr. MacNeill's foal placed third in the foal class. Mr. Callbeck's foal Airy Ann was second.

Jeanes Pride owned by Dr. J. Akins and H. O. Downey of Fredericton, N.B., won the Willard Kelly Memorial Trophy for the champion standard bred stallion of the show. Mr. Kelly had often the same championship in past

P.E.I. Fishermen's Ass'n Area Meeting Yesterday

The first area meeting of the P. E. I. Fishermen's Association was held at Murray Harbour yesterday afternoon with the president, Mr. John McNeill, presiding. Present also were Mr. Charles Richards, secretary of the Provincial Association, and Rev. W. Simpson, of the extension department of St. Dunstan's University.

The conservation of lobsters was the main topic of the round table discussion. To open the subject, Mr. Richards stated that some fishermen thought that the increase in size limit did not help conservation materially, but also that the officials of the Department of Industries thought that it was a major factor. This elicited many comments from those present who seemed to agree that fishing at present was no worse than heretofore. However, the topic gave rise to another question of equal importance, that of poaching and the taking of small lobsters, both of which were doing harm to the industry. It was thought that a stricter enforcement of the law throughout the province might go far in eliminating many of these abuses. It was also thought that the closing of factories in a closed area might also assist in the same way.

Discussion on another topic, that of radio broadcasts, was also instructive respecting the time and cost necessary to prepare such a program. It was considered that a fishermen's forum, similar to that of the farm forum, should be inaugurated and established on a specific night so that groups might assemble to discuss the questions proposed. There was great need, the president said, to organize the fishermen. It was pointed out that being a primary producer and unorganized, the fishermen, like the farmer, lacks the collective bargaining power so necessary in modern day economic set-up where all other organizations are highly organized, including those who deal directly with the primary producer. It was not practical, Mr. Richards said, for a small association to speak with authority for the fishermen as a whole unless the greatest percentage were members of the association, and he considered that the enlisting of more members should be the first object of the association. Other matters, insurance, appointment of delegates to the annual meeting and resolutions, were left in abeyance to continue the discussion of the main subjects on the agenda.

The many friends of Mrs. Norman MacDonald, Whim Road, are pleased to know she is making a satisfactory recovery after her recent illness.

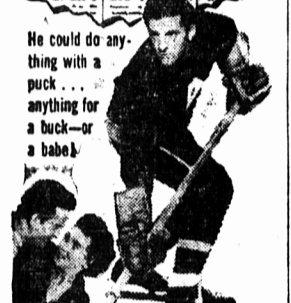
