

# Sea Now Pond To Get New Enclosed Harbor

The construction of an enclosed harbor at Sea Cove Pond was announced last night by Dr. O. H. Phillips at a public meeting in Tignish attended by the Hon. Leon Balcer, minister of transport, and members of the provincial government.

Construction of the new harbor, to be located in a fishing community about three miles from North Cape, is estimated to cost \$102,000 with the work to get underway in August this coming year.

During the course of a strong plea for the relocation of Dr. Phillips the federal minister of transport referred to Prince Edward Island as a tourist paradise. The devaluation of the Canadian dollar, he said, will result in a tremendous increase in the tourist industry and will also allow products of the farm and fisheries to better compete on the world market.

Giving assurance that a cause-way would definitely be built to reassert the fishermen of Tignish that they and fisheries would not be affected by the causeway.

Federal grants have been increased from \$8,000,000 under the Liberal government to \$14,000,000 under the Conservative government. Dr. Phillips stated, Hospital Insurance, of which the federal government pays 60 per cent, two-

## ARDA Plan Is Discussed

Federal and provincial government representatives met in the Provincial Building yesterday to discuss the Agricultural Rehabilitation and Development Act, under which the province can receive financial assistance to carry out development projects, particularly in relation to agriculture, forestry, water conservation and recreation.

Agriculture Minister Andrew MacLae, who is acting premier, said that the federal government will pay the cost of approved projects under the ARDA program. "It means," he said, "that the province can get twice as much done with provincial money appropriated for the rehabilitation program."

Federal representatives attending the meeting were Cliff Retson and Walter Packman. It has been indicated that ARDA programs will tie in with the province's resources development program.

## 2 Quebec City Girls Finance Scooter Holiday By Painting

SUMMERSIDE — Two Quebec City students, Louise Morris and Yolande Laberge, 17 and 18, returned last Sunday at 3 o'clock and arrived in Summerside Tuesday night, two days and 600 miles later.

The two girls who travelled to P.E.I. for a short vacation Quebec City their total finances were five dollars. Both being students in Beaux Arts school in Quebec City, the girls painted about 20 scooters of the way and sold them to interested buyers at an average price of less than five dollars each.

The girls stated they had travelled some 600 miles and the only mechanical difficulties encountered was a balky starter. The weather was their chief problem—one on occasion they were thoroughly soaked in a rain shower. They slept in homes of people who invited them in during their trip, and spent one night in Fredericton, N.B. in the Salvation Army home.

The farthest the two girls covered in a single day was a 210 miles; considered good for a motor scooter. "At one time" we called in at a garage and asked the attendant for 60 cents of gas and he heard of our trip. He filled up the tank on his own.

This is the first visit to Prince Edward Island for both girls and each stated it was the fairest province they had visited thus far. "I like the water all around," said Miss Morisset.

Miss Laberge has a sister, Mrs. Gerard Bennett, E.A. Street, Summerside, where the girls are staying. They plan to return to Quebec today.

## Serious Forest Fire Rages 90 Miles North Of Moncton

A large forest fire in the Tracadie area of northeastern New Brunswick appeared to be under control today after consuming 32,000 acres of ash, fir, spruce and pine since Tuesday.

D. A. Wolstenholme, director of the provincial fire department, said a night flight over the area, said the fire was "kept in check" Wednesday night. It was under control but if we get a good day Thursday we should be able to contain the fire in a couple of days."

Rangers on the scene were more optimistic. District Forester Ross Montgomery said he thought the situation was under control although a large amount of smoke could make it dangerous again. The improvement resulted from decreases in wind and humidity.

Montgomery reported the fire burning mostly in patches without making headway.

P.E.I. firefighters in the province, previously causing concern, were well in hand and second only to the Tracadie outbreak.

Three other fires in the north side of Tabusiac Hill. Although the fire started near a handiicap for the 300 firefighters, they had been equipped.

The area 90 miles north of Moncton is mostly leased Crown land. Early in the blaze a quantity of pit props used to shore up mines were destroyed.

## Widage Commissioners Urging Tax Exemption

As inspection of the new Sherwood fire hall and a reception in its rooms, a lobster dinner prepared by the Sherwood WI and a meeting in the Sherwood hall made a busy schedule for P.E.I. village commissioners at their semi-annual meeting last night.

The group was unanimous in that it felt the equipment used for municipal purposes should not be liable to the provincial sales tax. It was pointed out that the 4 per cent tax on such for sewerage purposes could have been spent on a great deal more pipe. One of the main points in this resolution was the fact that the municipalities were not profit making groups but were out to improve their communities.

The group will request that Hon. J. D. Stewart, minister of municipal affairs establish within the new department a service division consisting of either a full or part time professional staff for the purpose of advising the various municipalities in the province in the following areas of administration: finance, water and sanitary sewer services, engineering, and surveying services, legal services and industrial and commercial location and development.

ROAD SAID DUMP  
A resolution was passed protesting the condition of the road between Richmond and O'Leary corner. It was stated that this stretch of main highway has been used as a dump area, with the drains containing a great deal of refuse and the frames of old cars. As a solution the group suggested the government provide a large dump in the area about a half-mile of the highway with garbage trucks to collect from where it is located.

The per-capita grant from the province which has been increased by \$1, from \$3.75 to \$4.75, it was reported. The group has requested that something be done in regard to the sale of illegal liquor, which is sold in and around the municipalities all across the Island.

Of the 17 municipalities on the Island, 11 were represented at the meeting. The exact date of its annual meeting was not known, however it will be some time in the latter part of November.
