Canadian Bacon
Escalloped Potatoes
Green Beans with Celery
Prune Loaf Cake
Coffee Tea Milk

All measurements are level; recipes proportioned to serve 4-6.
Prune Loaf Cake: Stir 1/2 c. shortening until creamy. Gradually work in 1 c. sugar and cream until blended, with 2 slightly beaten eggs.

Sift together 1 1/2 c. already-sifted enriched flour, 1/2 tsp. double-acting baking powder, 1 tsp. baking soda, 1-3 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. cinnamon, 1/2 tsp. each ground clove and nutmeg. Add alternately with 1/2 c. orange juice to the first mixture. Stir in 1 c. cooked medium-chopped drained prunes. Beat until well mixed.

Transfer to an oiled, shallow 7" x 11" cake pan. Bake 40 min. in a moderate oven, 350 degrees F. until brown and firm, when a toothpick inserted in the centre comes out clean. Cool.

Frost with orange confectioner's icing.

SUGGESTION OF THE CHEF
To give green beans a new flavor, try this method.
Shred 1 lb. fresh green beans. Add 1 c. sliced celery.

Place in a saucepan. Add 1" boiling water and 1/2 tsp. salt. Simmer-boil about 20 min., or until the vegetables are fork-tender and the water almost evaporated. Season with pepper and 1 tsp. butter or margarine.
