

Local and Other Items.

DUST.—The dust nuisance prevailed to-day. Why can't the streets be watered, now?

AQUATIC.—The St. John Sea of the 9th inst., says: Over 100 dollars was subscribed in Pictou last week towards getting a four-oared boat for the Pictou four-oared crew.

THE P. E. ISLAND ELECTRIC COMPANY.—At a meeting of the directors of this Company, held last evening, Mr. Starr resigned the position of director, and Mr. John Kelly was elected in his stead.

SCOTT ACT.—Voting on the repeal of the Scott Act took place in Middlesex, Lambton and Oxford counties, in the province of Ontario, yesterday. The result will be found in our telegraphic columns.

WANT TWO TRAINS.—The Journal says that a requisition has been signed by the business men and others along the Cape Traverse railway, asking for two trains a day on that branch when the summer time table comes into effect.

Both are fillies. The first-mentioned one is a light bay, and the other a chestnut—both solid colors. The All Right foal is eligible for registration. Both show the good points of their parents, and will, we have no doubt, develop into something good and fast. Mr. McLeod has, we understand, already had an offer for one or both of them, but declined to sell.

Nationality—English, 17; Scotch, 16; Irish, 12; French, 1; German, 1; Swede, 1. Males, 27; Females, 22.

DROWNED HERSELF WHILE INSANE.—Says the Turo Guardian:—Mrs. Jacob Fenton, aged about 50 years, became insane a few days ago, and had been in the care of her husband and some friends, who were keeping a careful watch upon her. During Saturday night, when her husband and others were in the kitchen, she went to her bedroom, raised the window and jumped out. Her absence was noticed only a few minutes afterwards, and a search made, parties being out all night. Her lifeless body was found in the river about 5 o'clock on Sunday morning. The supposed cause of the state of her mind was depression created by the absence of a favorite son, whom she had expected home, but had failed to come.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

A Boisterous Meeting.

MONTREAL, May 9. The great meeting at the Club National, last evening, was the most boisterous affair ever known in the province of Quebec. It was packed with Government employees, and the Mercier faction accused the President of being a traitor to the cause by denouncing the present Government to an Empire correspondent. Mr. Lobeuf fought like a lion and carried the meeting, Mercier's adherents not daring to propose the motion of censure which they had prepared. The affair has created the greatest excitement throughout the Province, and Mercier's check here is looked upon as a very serious blow to the Ministry. Senator Thibedeau, the leading Liberal in the city, said to-day that Mercier was surrounded by a band of parasites and must be got rid of.

The Jesuit's Act Again.

TORONTO, May 9. Mr. Mowat was asked to-day by a reporter if it was true that he and Blake had requested Sir John Macdonald to submit the legality of the Jesuit's Act to the courts. He replied: "I have decided to say nothing whatever on the Jesuit question to anybody." Mowat has, however, become alarmed at the anti-French agitation regarding Ontario schools, and has appointed a commission to investigate educational matters in Essex, Prescott and Russell.

The Big Split in Montreal.

QUEBEC, May 9. Hon. Mr. Laurier was in town yesterday and had another long interview with Mercier over the big split in the party in Montreal caused by the Empire's interview with the President of the Club National. L'Electeur, the local Government organ, is getting alarmed and made a frantic appeal this morning to its friends to stand by Mercier in his present trials.

The Fisheries Protection Service.

OTTAWA, May 9. The Minister of Marine has decided to utilize the Stanley in the protection service this season. La Canadienne has already left Quebec for the Magdalen Islands. The remainder of the fleet will consist of the Vigilant, Dream and probably two special schooners, all of which will be in commission this month.

A Costly Blaze.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, May 9. The Bellaire goblet works at Findley, Ohio, were burned this morning. Loss, \$115,000; insurance, \$65,000. Some 300 men are thrown out of employment. The works are the largest of the kind in the world. They will be rebuilt at once.

Nomination for Compton.

COOKSHIRE, Que., May 9. Nomination for Compton to fill the vacant seat caused by the death of Hon. Mr. Pope, took place here to-day. Rufus Pope, son of the deceased, Conservative, and T. B. Munro, Grit, were nominated.

Dutiable Mail Matter.

OTTAWA, May 9. The Postmaster General has decided that hereafter all ports of entry shall be available for the entry of dutiable mail matter. Hitherto only a limited number were specified, and in many cases inconvenience resulted.

Royal Geographical Society.

OTTAWA, May 9. The Royal Society to-day elected Abbe Casgrain, President; Principal Grant, Vice-President; Dr. Selwyn, Treasurer, and Mr. Bourniet, Secretary.

Scott Act Elections.

TORONTO, May 9. Voting on the Scott Act in Oxford, Lambton and Middlesex to-day resulted in a failure of repeal in all three counties by large majorities.

Won't Take the Medal.

TORONTO, May 9. It is reported that Col. O'Brien, M. P., has refused to accept the Mail's alleged silver medal, as he regards it as only a newspaper advertisement fake.

Deceased Wife's Sister's Bill Rejected.

LONDON, May 9. The House of Lords to-day rejected the deceased wife's sister's bill. The Prince of Wales voted with the minority. The vote stood 147 to 120.
