CITY COUNCIL.

At the meeting of the City Council, held last evening,—

The petition of Messrs. Rattenbury for exemption from taxation for five years in respect to their proposed packing house and premises, was granted.

A letter from the executive committee of the Temperance Alliance asking for re-payment of the salary of Matthews, the prosecutor, was read and laid upon the table. In this connection it was shown that during March Warren had obtained no convictions under the Scott Act, while Matthews had obtained eight convictions out of fifteen prosecutions.

It was resolved to apply to the Legislature for power to authorize the School Trustees to issue \$38,000 worth of new debentures to retire those coming due.

A resolution was also passed asking the Council to apply to the Legislature for power to increase the tax on banks doing business in the city from \$50 to \$250 each; also to apply to the Legislature for power to tax bicycles \$2 each, and make regulations for the use of the same.

A resolution was passed authorizing application to the Legislature for an amendment to the Act of Incorporation, providing for the election of all the Councillors by all the electors of the city, and the payment to each Councillor of \$100 per annum.

Notice of a resolution to authorize the construction of a sewer on Queen Street, from the City Building to Queen's Wharf, was given by Councillor Hughes.

A committee, consisting of Councillors Hughes, Nicholson and Douse, was appointed to draw up a petition to present to the Legislature, embodying the resolutions passed and asking for a grant towards the Park Roadway.
