NOT GOOD ENOUGH

The defense in today's deal was normal—but it had to be better than that!

North dealer.
North-South vulnerable

♠	A 5 3	♣	J 9 6
♥	K J	♦	5 4
♠	A Q 4 3	♣	J 10 7 5
♥	Q J 7 6	♦	A 9 8 2

♠ 10 8 4 ♣ 7 2
♥ 5 3 ♦ 10 7 5
♠ 10 8 3 ♣ 6 5

The bidding:
North East South West
1 N T Pass 3 ♥ Pass
3 N T Pass 6 ♣ (final bid)

The diamond nine was West's choice of openings. Dummy's ace was played, and declarer then drew three rounds of trumps. East, like dummy, threw off a club.

Now South led his singleton club, and West properly ducked. (If he had put up the king, declarer could easily have set up a club trick.) East won with the club ace, and probably thinking that it couldn't hurt to make South use up his trumps if he had started with only one club, returned the club nine.

Naturally, South did ruff the club return, and after he had cashed one more trump, this was the six-card position: South had his original three spades, one trump and the K-6 of diamonds. West still had his four spades, one diamond and the club king. Dummy had been reduced to A-5 of spades, Q-4-2 of diamonds, and the club queen. East held his three spades and the J-10-7 of diamonds.

Now, timing his play carefully, South led the diamond six to the queen, and the diamond deuce to the king. West safely discarded a spade, but when South then cashed his last trump, West, to keep the high club, had to discard another spade. Now that dummy's club "threat" had done its part, it was discarded—and it was East's turn to be squeezed. Forced to hold the high diamond, he too had to give up spade protection, and South won the last three tricks with the ace, king and seven of spades.

If East, after taking his club ace, had returned a spade the story might have a different ending!

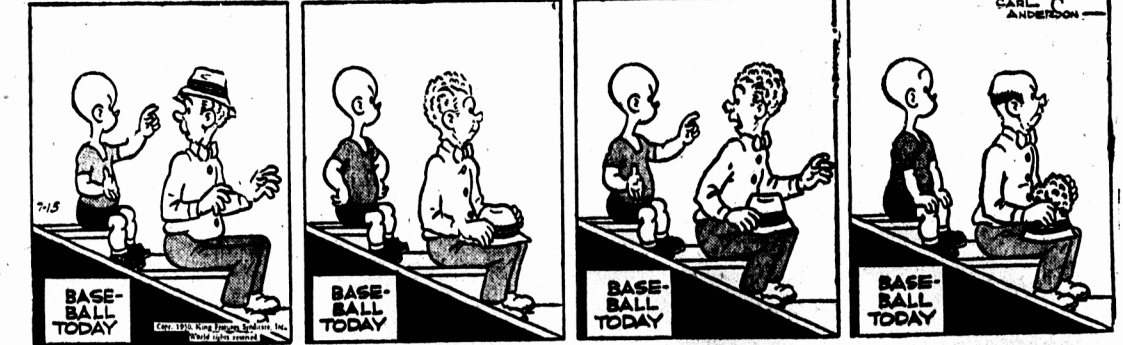

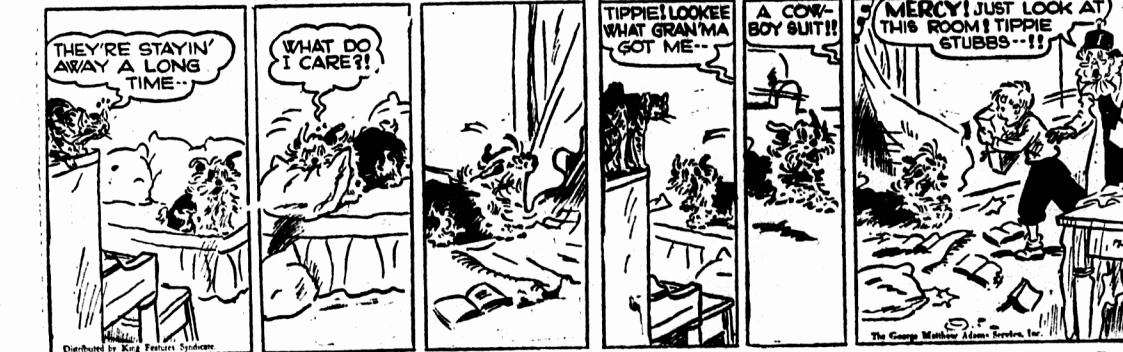
