PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

(Continued from page 2.)

shall be considered a sale within the meaning of this Act, and the persons giving, selling, bartering or dividing such intoxicating liquor to and amongst such members shall be considered a seller of intoxicating liquors within the meaning of this Act and be liable to the penalties thereof.

This amendment was also lost on a party vote.

An amendment moved by Mr. Peters was carried, providing in effect that nothing in the Act shall prevent the sale by wholesale where liquor is sold for consumption outside the province.

Mr. Shaw moved an amendment providing that the measure go into effect in December, 1900, instead of June, 1901, but it was voted down by the Government and its supporters.

The Speaker then took the chair and the bill was reported agreed to.

With the Speaker in the chair the amendments introduced by the Opposition were again submitted and again voted down. The House divided on the amendments as follows:

Yeas—Gordon, A. A. McLean, Shaw, J. A. McDonald, A. J. McDonald, Arsenault, McKinnon, Prowse, Birch, Kichham, DesRoches—11.

Nays—Farquharson, Peters, McMillan, McLean, Richards, McLaughlin, Forbes, McNutt, Rogers, Sinclair, Reid, Prowse, Pineau—13.

The bill was then agreed to, the whole House voting for it, and set down for third reading to-morrow.

The bill to incorporate the Mayfield Hall company was read a third time and passed.

Hon. Mr. Gordon presented a resolution praying that a humble address be presented to the Governor asking him to cause to be brought down information not already furnished regarding the weighing of coal, etc.

The resolution was seconded by Mr. Shaw, but was voted down by the Government and its supporters.

The House resumed committee with Mr. Forbes in the chair on the pauper scales. The report of the committee was adopted.

Mr. Peters moved the House into committee with Mr. Forbes in the chair on the bill for the further advancement of justice. Agreed to without amendment. Third reading to-morrow.

Mr. L. E. Prowse presented a petition against prohibition. Laid on the table. House then adjourned.

SATURDAY, June 9.

House met at 11:30.

Hon. Mr. Gordon rose to a question of privilege. Yesterday, said he, a member of this House stated that a Conservative had offered him \$250 to vote against the prohibition bill. It was a serious matter and should be investigated. He therefore moved the following resolution.

Resolved, That the House do now resolve itself into a committee of the whole, with power to send for persons, papers and records, and to examine witnesses on oath, to enquire into the allegations of Henry J. Pineau, member for Tignish in this Legislature, to the effect that the said H. J. Pineau was approached, on June 8th, 1900, by a Conservative who offered him the sum of \$250 if the said Henry J. Pineau would vote against the Prohibition Bill now before the Legislature.

Mr. Shaw seconded the motion.

Mr. Pineau reiterated his declaration of yesterday regarding the alleged offer.

Mr. A. A. McLean and Mr. J. A. McDonald spoke in support of an investigation.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson opposed to resolution. Mr. Pineau had never stipulated directly or indirectly for a determination of anything he had ever done for the Government.

Hon. Mr. Gordon pressed for an investigation. His information was that Mr. Pineau had offered to sell himself for

\$200, and he thought the parties concerned would have no objection to coming forward to prove it.

A vote was then taken on Mr. Gordon's motion, which was declared lost on division, the Government party voting against it in a body. Pineau, who said he had been approached, voted with the Government against the investigation.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Farquharson the bill taxing certain companies, associations and brewers was read a third time and passed. The opposition voted against the measure in a body.

Mr. Prowse then moved that the petition against prohibition tabled by him last night be received and read. The motion carried and the petition was read. There were about three hundred names attached to the petition.

On motion of Mr. A. Peters the bill amending the act for the better advancement of justice was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Mr. A. Peters the bill relating to unnecessary delay in the Court of Chancery was read a second time in committee with Mr. Forbes in the chair. The rule regarding third readings being suspended the bill was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Farquharson the prohibition bill was read a third time and unanimously adopted.

On the motion that the bill be read a third time, Mr. Reid spoke at some length in defence of his action in supporting the measure. He charged that the opposition sought to oppose the bill before the House.

The charge was indignantly denied by Hon. Mr. Gordon, Mr. Shaw, Mr. A. A. McLean, Mr. Birch and others, who pointed out that they only sought to improve the bill by making it apply to clubs wherein liquor is sold and drunk.

The House then took up consideration of the contingent accounts.

At two o'clock prorogation took place.

Local and Other Items.

KINDERGARTEN.—The closing of the Kindergarten takes place on Wednesday, June 27th.

SUEZ CANAL.—Last year 3,667 vessels passed through the Canal, as compared with 3,505 in 1898. The British numbered 2,310.

SMOKING CONCERT.—Last evening Lieut. A. G. Peake, No. 2 Co., 4th Regt, C. A., gave a smoking concert to his company in the Orderly Rooms. The 4th Regt. Band and Sergt. Instructor Sutherland were present. The toasts were drunk in cold water. During the evening music was discoursed by the band.

DIOCESAN SYNOD.—At the opening of the Synod at Halifax on Wednesday, a splendid address was delivered by Bishop Courtney. The report of the Board of Home Missions and other financial statements were subsequently submitted, showing an improved financial condition.

LECTURE LAST NIGHT.—Rev. D. F. Lockerby's lecture in Zion Church last evening was a rare opportunity, and those who took advantage of it benefited greatly. The lecturer's exposition of the fallacies of Ingersoll was presented in a logical and convincing manner. Premier Farquharson was chairman. Rev. Mr. Lockerby lectures again tonight, and those who are interested in this fascinating subject should hear him.

CITY COUNCIL.—The adjourned meeting of the City Council was held last evening. The Mayor was absent and Councillor Lyons was elected chairman. Considerable discussion on the curfew bell took place, and Councillor Brown gave notice that at the next meeting he would move that the curfew law be repealed. Mr. John Bolger was heard re the raising of the street near his house. A committee was appointed to report at next meeting. The dust question was brought up, and the City Surveyor was directed to do his utmost to remedy the inconvenience. In regard to music on the square, Councillor Tanton thought something should be done, referred to finance committee. Minor matters came up, including street extension and the placing of a light at the corner of Stewar and Pownall streets.

MR. FIELDING'S OPINION.

The Halifax Chronicle says that when the members of Parliament sang God Save the Queen in response to Mr. Bourassa's speech they displayed bad form and bad feeling. Mr. Fielding, who kept his seat during the cheers and singing, appears, according to the Chronicle, "in an extremely favorable light." It goes further and says: "There is not a thoughtful or decent-minded man or woman in Nova Scotia who will not think more of him for the information which the Herald and Star impart concerning his action. Mr. Fielding did just what might be expected of him."

Less than a dozen members of the house kept their seats on the occasion referred to. One of them, of course, was Mr. Bourassa. All who rose and joined in singing the national anthem are open to the censure of the Chronicle. We fancy there was some decent-minded persons among them, and that there are such also in the country at large, who regard it as rather indecent for a member of the government to keep his seat under such circumstances. Perhaps the Chronicle is correct, however, in declaring that "Mr. Fielding did just what might have been expected of him." It is not so many years since he headed a secession movement in Nova Scotia.—St. John Sun.
