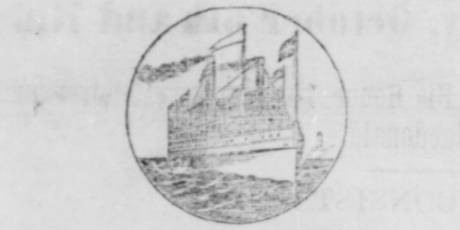

Gladstone Speaks.

HE DEFENDS HIS COURSE IN RESPECT TO IRELAND.

Mr. Gladstone, replying to a deputation of Irish women, who presented a memorial petition in favor of Home Rule, said: He must deny the statement that he had renounced his former attitude by supporting the proposal to restore an Irish parliament. He said he was thankful for the share he took in passing such Irish measures as had been made law during his public career. The whole character of the Irish controversy, he said, has altered. We do not now contemplate the dreadful alternative our fathers faced a century ago. It was necessary that the late government's Irish proposals should have been put forward in accordance with the desires of the Irish nation, and also to make it clear that the proposals stood within the limits of imperial honor, safety and welfare. These aims were completely attained and they have been sustained by the singular mildness and temperance of expression which he so far characterized the conduct of Irishmen at every stage of the agitation. (Cheers.) I am quite prepared to withdraw from public life if I could believe it were better for Ireland, but I am unable to arrive at this conclusion. England's interest is as much involved as Ireland's. On the lowest grounds of civil and military economy it is England's interest to change in some way the present civil government in Ireland, which costs British taxpayers yearly 16 shillings per head, while civil government in England and Scotland cost yearly but 8 shillings per head of population. On far higher grounds England ought to concede Ireland's request. England's character is concerned. There is a stain upon England in respect of her relations towards Ireland. I deny that the term separation, which opponents unscrupulously use to describe the meaning of the government's proposals, is correctly applied in this case. The promoters of the bill never thought of separation. They carried careful comparison of Grattan's parliament with the parliament bill proposed. The sphere within which Ireland desires free action, which is especially in the sphere of local government, would have been attained under our bill better far than it was possessed under the Grattan parliament. "I hope Ireland's triumph will come with promptitude, with cheerfulness and with joy, and I hope there will be no intervening period of gloom," were his closing words.

Reparation Demanded.

A BRITISH SUBJECT IMPRISONED IN THE UNITED STATES BY MISTAKE.

The Dominion Government is interesting itself in behalf of George Hatheway, a British subject, who, in 1882, was arrested at Big Horn City, Wyo., by United States authorities, as a deserter from the United States army. He had established himself in Wyoming in business, and was doing well when arrested for a deserter named Heath and thrown into prison, where he was subjected to all manner of indignities in order to make him confess. All remonstrances and pleas of innocence were useless, and there he lay until the commanding officer began to realize his mistake, and allowed him to depart, only to find, however, that his business was ruined and himself a pauper. The attention of the United States authorities at Washington has repeatedly been called to the fact in an informal way without any reparation being made. It will now assume the character of an international question between the British and United States governments, and it is believed here with satisfactory results. Hatheway belongs to one of the oldest and most influential families in the province of New Brunswick.

Robbers Take the Town.

A reign of terror prevails in Aylmer, Ont., which for the past month has suffered through several heavy robberies, perpetrated by an organized gang who had the authorities defiance. On Saturday the house of Mr. Gordon, a prominent lawyer, was entered and a cash box, which, for safe-keeping he had secreted in an empty stove, stolen. The box contained \$400 in cash and \$3,500 in promissory negotiable notes. Detectives have obtained a clue to the guilty parties, one of whom is
