Coroner's Jury Attaches No Blame To Driver In Fatality

"That Mrs. Ewen Gillis died as a result of an accident, that no blame is attached on the part of Alexander MacRae, and that the accident occurred on the Trans Canada Highway at Orwell on the evening of December 1, 1956," was the verdict of the jury, in finding the death of the late Mrs. Gillis at City Hall, Charlotte, last evening, Mr. J.P. Nicholson represented the Crown and Dr. C.A. Coady was coroner.

A total of ten witnesses were called to give evidence. They included the driver of the car involved in the fatality, Mr. Alexander MacRae, and Wood Island's North; four passengers in his car, Messrs. CHRISTMAS SUPPLIES

MONTREAL (CP) - Christmas trees for persons spending the holiday beyond the tree-line were on an RCAF North Star which left Thursday with 7 1/2 tons of Christmas supplies for the far northern outposts. The plane will use Resolute Bay, Baffinland as a base to drop the festive season supplies to 10 Arctic settlements as far north as Alert, a weather station 400 miles from the North Pole.

Heavy Docket Yesterday In Magistrate's Court

At the request of the Crown the case of a Mount Stewart resident charged with having care and control of a motor vehicle whilst intoxicated was adjourned yesterday until next Friday by Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet in Queens County Magistrate's court Mr. John P. Nicholson represented the Crown in all cases.

Evidence in this case was submitted by Cst. Holloway of the Charlottetown detachment of the RCMP, and the accused, Cst. Holloway told of trailing a car from the vicinity of Belvedere to a point on the Anderson road, which leads off the main highway a about one-quarter of a mile east of the intersection at Mount Stewart. This car, the constable asserted, was travelling at a very high speed. Pulling up behind the car, which had stopped on the Anderson Road, he observed the driver and the accused switching positions in the vehicle. When he reached the vehicle the accused was behind the wheel in an apparently intoxicated state. He removed the key which was in the "off" position, arrested the driver, and drove the accused to his residence.

The accused admitted that he was in the vehicle, and had switched places with the driver, but denied that he had at any time the intention to drive the vehicle. Questioned further by his attorney, Mr. J.O.C. Campbell, Q.C. he stated that the owner had been driving the vehicle each time he had entered it that day. From the evidence submitted, Mr. Campbell contended that there was no case, since his client did not "mount the vehicle for the purpose of setting it in motion."

A party from Rustico, charged with public mischief, elected to be tried by Magistrate, pleaded guilty, and received a two year suspended sentence. Attorney Allison Gilles represented the defendant.

A resident of Charlottetown charged with taking a vehicle without the owner's consent was found guilty as charged and fined \$100 and costs. A similar charge against another city resident involving the same vehicle was dismissed. Preliminary hearings on additional charges of public mischief against the same two parties will be heard Wednesday, December 19th. A third charge, that of criminal negligence, against the first party only will be heard at this date also. Mr. Allison Gilles represented the defendants in each case.

A number of cases involving traffic violations were heard at this sitting of the court. A resident of Scotchfort was fined \$10 and costs for allowing an unlicensed party to drive a motor vehicle. my Cleaners
NOTEBOOK

Old stories die hard, and it's as true of the dry cleaning business as it is of any other.

The other day I had to shake my head and tell one of our customers: I wish I had a dollar for every time someone has come into the office with a sorry looking mess over their suit or dress—the result of trying to remove ink stains with milk. I wonder who ever started that silly story.

Milk will not remove ink stains satisfactorily, and the stain from the milk will likely be harder to get out than the ink.

Ink stains are getting harder all the time to remove. It used to be that inks were more or less all the same, and although they were made to be permanent, an expert spotter in a dry cleaning plant could sometimes take ink out completely. But with new inks coming on to the market made from different ingredients, the problem is now more complicated.

Ball point pens have added to the problem. You should never, never try to take out a stain from a ball point pen with water. Application of water will "harden" the stain and it will be impossible to remove.

As with all stains, and plain old dirt itself, the inky garment should be brought in to be cleaned as soon as possible. When you bring it in, it will help if you can remember the brand of ink that was supplied.
