FRANKFURT, Germany, Oct. 22—(AP)—Outright rejection of the Soviet bloc's latest "peace bid" and a race between East and West to rearm divided Germany appeared certain tonight.

Sunday was one of the coldest October days on record in the Southern Maritimes. Temperatures did not go above 40 degrees in many localities, and snow fell in Nova Scotia and Southern New Brunswick.

This evening skies were clear in all regions except Nova Scotia where it was still overcast. Monday will be sunny and cool in all the district.
