

# Davies Fires Back Reply To The Disgruntled Folks

**CHANGES SMALL**

After the Olympics "we got together again and made only one alteration and that was to increase the number of our men going to Perth to 13 from 11." This eventually was increased to 15.

# Banff's Baking 68 Olympics

CALGARY (CP)—Staging the 1968 Winter Olympics at Banff, Alta., would be a long way from growing Canada with a top-notch sports training centre, says Hans Maciel of Calgary.

Maciel, a sometime semi-pro Olympic player in Germany, is vice-president of the Calgary Olympic Development Association which is Banff's bid for the 1968 games.

The question of what use would be made of the Olympic facilities after the games is a factor in who wins the nomination, Maciel said in an interview. Japan, Norway, France and Switzerland are others bidding for the games.

"Our plans call for the use of the Banff School of Fine Arts as the Olympic Village, and expansion of the school will be pushed forward to provide facilities large enough to handle 2,000 athletes.

"There is no question about the use of these facilities after the games.

"But we also plan an Olympic centre across the town from the school. It would include a 100-000-seat hockey arena, a speed skating, a figure-skating facility, a practice rink, an administration building, a press centre and an electronic counting and present centre.

**HOPES FOR GRANT**

Maciel said that if a national physical fitness grant were provided to establish a permanent training camp or sports centre at Banff, the use of the facilities after the games would be solved in satisfaction of the International Olympic Committee.

Funds to operate the centre could be derived from renting the facilities for short periods to professional teams, perhaps for hockey or football training camps. Then there would be revenue from exhibition games staged at the site.
