## Potato Crop Almost Satisfactorily Complete

Island potato growers have harvested 90 to 95 per cent of the best potato crop in the last few years, but the price is poor at about one cent per pound on the producer, E.D. Reid, Charlottetown, who last grower and seed shipper, said yesterday.

Several other estimates suggested 87 to 88 per cent of the crop has been harvested.

Mr. Reid said that production here of the province is on a par with last year, but the crop in West Prince much better as it was hit hard by blight last year.

There was a fusarium root problem two years ago, but it is expected growers will likely hold their own.
