W.K.S. Athletes Won Top Honors Saturday At Interscholastic Meet

West Kent School athletes won top honors in the boys' section of the annual Interscholastic Track and Field Championships held at Memorial Field on Saturday afternoon when they scored a total of 34 points. They were five points ahead of runner-up Prince Street who had 29.

Prince Street girls took first place in their part of the meet. They racked up a total of 32 points, eight better than their rivals from West Kent.

West Kent boys won the meet in the relay race, the final event of the day when they placed second and gained six points. Prince Street failed to get a placing in this event and Summerside, who could have won the meet had they won the relay, finished third. Summerside had a total of 27 points for the afternoon. Queen Square was fourth with 19 points and Prince of Wales College fifth with 16. Freetown and Georgetown each had nine points while North Rustico and Montague had one point apiece.

In the girls' meet Prince Street had 32 points. West Kent with 24 was second. Freetown girls had 10 points, Summerside nine, Rustico eight, and Georgetown seven. Mel Campbell of Summerside and Donnie MacLeod of Prince Street, tied for top individual honors with 10 points. Donnie's brother David was second with eight points. Campbell finished first in the shot put and first in the 100 yards open. Donnie MacLeod was first in the 75-yard dash for 14-year-old boys and top man in the high jump.

Barbara Whitlock was high point winner in the girls' meet with 10. Audrey MacEchern of Freetown was second with six. Miss Whitlock was first in the 100 yard dash for 14-year-old girls and first in the open 100 yard meet. Miss MacEchern was first in the 13-year-old girls' dash and third in the open 100.

The meet was featured by keen competition from the first event to the last. Each school had a large cheering section rooting for their athletes and the noise could be heard all over the park. Run off in excellent weather the meet was smoothly conducted by meet director Brigadier Bill Reid and his capable staff of assistants.

Holman's In 5-2 Win Over Abbies To Tie Intermediate Finals

Holman's Intermediates climbed back into the limelight of the Provincial baseball play-off picture yesterday afternoon by defeating the Abbies 5-2 on rain-swept Memorial Field. The Summerside win ties up the series with each team having won two games and one contest ending in a draw.

Alan Stewart, the Dalhousie dental student, hurled his second series victory as he turned back the Abbies for four hits, all singles. Donnie MacLean went the distance for the Abbies and gave up only six hits, five singles and one triple.

Holman's went into an early 2-0 lead in the first inning. Abbies scored once in the second and both teams scored one run in the fourth to make the score 3-2. Holman's scored once more in the fifth and added their final run in the seventh.

Nearly half the game was played under rain. The rain started in the second inning and lasted in the form of intermittent showers until the sixth when umpire Jack Schurman called a halt for about 20 minutes. The weather cleared for the seventh frame but the eighth and ninth were played in the wet.

Holman's two runs in the first inning came as the result of one hit, a walk, a fly ball, two errors and an infield out. MacKenzie, who got a scratch single down the third base line and Stewart who walked, scored the runs.

Centrefielder Glen Matheson scored both the Abbies runs. The first time Ryan bunted him home and the second time he scored on MacLean's long fly to centre.

Big Bob Barlow of Summerside socked a triple to lead off the fifth inning. The ball got by Merlin MacKenzie in the outfield and Barlow went into third standing up. He scored on Joe Hunter's infield out.

Syl Bernard scored Holman's final run. The little second baseman got to first on a fielder's choice and stole second. He went to third when an attempted pick-off failed and scored on Hank Landry's long single between third and short.

Stewart and MacLean turned in masterful performances on the pitcher's mound. Stewart walked four batters and struck out a like number. He was in trouble on several occasions but bore down in the pinches to gain the victory. He left nine Abbies on the base-paths.

Only two of Holman's five runs were earned. Donnie MacLean walked only two men and struck out five. Errors by his mates figured in four of the five runs scored against him.

Abbies threatened to score in the first, second and fourth innings but failed. They threatened again in the eighth but Stewart snuffed out the rally. In the sixth with one man on, Charlie Ryan socked a Stewart pitch into left field but "Moose" Carson made a spectacular catch to retire the side.

Syl Bernard led the Summerside attack by collecting two hits in four tries and scoring two runs. Willowy Irv MacKinnon got two singles in five tries for the Abbies. Carson's catch of Ryan's drive and two running catches by Glen Matheson were the pick of the outfield plays. Charlie Ryan made two great picks of low throws; and Syl Bernard gathered in Gus Flynn's hard grounder for the best infield effort. Buck Whitlock threw out Schurman at the plate in the eighth for another smart play.

Walter Lawlor Elected To Succeed Bryce Love At Saturday's Meeting

HALIFAX, Sept. 23 (CP) — Delegates to the 28th annual meeting of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association Saturday elected Walter Lawlor of Charlottetown president for 1951-52. Lawlor, a star with Charlottetown Abbies in the old Big Four League of 1933-35, replaces Bryce Love of New Glasgow, who retired after serving two terms as president.

During the four-hour session, the delegates also:

- Made official a by-law permitting a club to pick up a goalkeeper of the same or lower classification provided no spare goalie is carried by the club and the regular custodian is out for the balance of the season.
 - Defeated a motion to appoint a protest committee of three, leaving it as constituted at present — the officers of the association.
 - Changed a motion requiring all clubs in the major series to pay five per cent of the gross gate to the association, making it one per cent in semi-finals and 10 in the finals.
 - Defeated a proposal to permit junior clubs to strengthen by the addition of four players from within their own league for branch playdowns.
 - Voted grants to major, senior, junior A and junior B champions during the season.
 - Voted to appoint Hugh Gillis of Halifax to conduct referee schools in the various sections of the Maritimes.
- More than 60 delegates attended the session and named two new officers. Fred Fox of Lunenburg was elected fourth vice-president of the association and Charlie Campbell of Sydney took over as secretary-registrar, replacing Gene Connolly, who stepped down after serving six years in the job. Mr. Connolly was unanimously named honorary vice-president without voting power.
- Other officers elected were: First vice-president, J.P. MacDougall, Amherst; second vice-president, Shaun MacDonald, Sydney; and third vice-president, Bert Yerxa, Sussex.
- Judge J. Elliott Hudson of Halifax appealed for the establishment of a school for referees to promote uniformity and also to develop local officials. Majority of the delegates thought cost of such a project would be too high but it was finally agreed to appoint Mr. Gillis to conduct schools in various centers over a three-week period, after first attending a school in Montreal or Toronto.
- Maritime major champions will receive a grant of \$500, junior A champions \$100, junior B titlists \$100 and seniors \$200. Under the initial proposal, only the majors and junior A's were considered but delegates decided the other categories deserved some consideration.

Jenny Kalmuck And Lucky Number In Dead Heat Saturday

Lucky Number and Jenny Kalmuck raced to a dead heat in the second dash of their race for trotters and pacers after Lucky Number had won the first dash at the Provincial Exhibition track on Saturday night.

There were only two of the highlights of a great night's racing as the good sized crowd of fans on hand witnessed thrilling track duels from the first heat to the final.

Lucky Number, driven by Willard Kelly, came up fast from third position in the stretch to come to the wire at the same time as Jenny Kalmuck in the sixth race. Chocolate Dip led the field until the three quarter mark when Jenny went into the lead. The dead heat raced in Charlottetown during the Home Week in 1948 between Quick Lick and Professor Clegg.

Dale B, a pacing bay gelding driven by Claude O'Brien came pacing down the home stretch in the last dash of the night to beat out Prince Budlong just in front of the wire. Prince Budlong, after getting away to a slow start, went to the lead and stayed there to the stretch but could not beat off Dale B's drive.

Josedale Clipper won the first dash of the pacers race. The Clipper came onto the stretch in third position to overtake Time Table and Prince Budlong.

Willard Kelly drove Milldale to win the first heat of the night. Milldale went to front at the first turn and stayed there to the wire. Dan McElwain pulled the biggest upset of the night when he went away in tenth position and came home ahead of Milldale and the rest of the field in the next race.

Anne's Boy was the only double heat winner as he won the third and seventh races. George Calbeck drove the sleek bay gelding to front running wins both dashes.

Willard Kelly was the biggest winner as he drove three first place horses. The daily double on Lucky Number and Anne's Boy paid \$31.70.
