Rangers Edge Canadiens 4-3

NEW YORK, (AP)—New York Rangers staved off Montreal's blistering third period offensive Sunday night to defeat Canadiens 4-3 before 15,103 — the National Hockey League's largest crowd at Madison Square Garden this season.

Defenceman Jack Evans scored two of the winners' goals.

Trailing 4-1 going into the final 20 minutes, Montreal rallied as Maurice Richard scored at 3:44 and Bert Olmstead five minutes later. The inspired Canadiens then poured around the New York net, but the heads-up plan of goalie Johnny Evers and the frantically effective poke-checking of the Rangers kept them at bay.

Actually, it was the New Yorkers' three-goal surge in the second period which told the story. With the count knotted 1-1, Wally Hergeheimer, Paul Ronty and Evans drilled home successive markers within 11 minutes. Evans' first period tally which evened off Floyd Curry's score earlier in the session was the defenceman's first of the campaign.
