No Change In Grain Market Outlook

OTTAWA, (CP) - Trade Min-
 ister Howe indicated Tuesday that
 prospects for marketing western
 Canada's grain surpluses have not
 changed since March 30.
 He was replying to a Commons
 question by John Diefenbaker (PC-
 Prince Albert) as to whether west-
 ern farmers can expect to dispose
 of their surpluses before the next
 crop year starts Aug. 1.
 Mr. Howe said that events since
 March 30 have confirmed the view
 he took then. At that time, he
 informed the House that prairie
 producers would market around
 600,000,000 bushels of grain in the
 1953-54 crop year which ends next
 July 31. He estimated that 410-
 000,000 bushels had been marketed
 from last Aug. 1 to March 30.

SEARCH ABANDONED

MANILA (AP) - U.S. naval head-
 quarters at Sangley Point today
 called off the search for the miss-
 ing 6,312-ton Japanese merchant
 ship Tatsuwa Maru. Planes from
 the carriers Boxer and Philippine
 Sea searched 5,000 square miles
 west of Manila starting Thursday
 night after the Tatsuwa radioed
 that four holds were flooded. U.S.
 Air Force planes from Clark field
 rescued seven survivors. The ship
 carried a crew of 50.

Thoughts For Our Time

 OBLIGATION TO OPEN DOOR TO OTHERS

During the past week my name
 has been associated in the press
 with the problem of immigration.
 I would like to clarify what I
 think to be the Christian attitude
 toward this problem, which is in-
 cumbent upon Canadians.
 Whether we admit it or not,
 outside our own country we are
 looked upon as arch-conserva-
 tives. We are supposed to be
 wary of taking chances. Ameri-
 cans, who see the vast geo-
 graphical sweep of Canada, who
 are very aware of the almost un-
 limited national resources which
 we possess, are sometimes sur-
 prised that we allow foreign
 capital to exploit it and other
 nations to profit so much from
 our national wealth.

We have witnessed a great
 exodus from Canada to the
 United States and an influx of
 very many successful Americans
 into our midst. So frequently
 we hear it asked why people
 leave this land of opportunity.
 We are, perhaps, of the mentality
 of those who are led, rather than
 those who lead.

A striking illustration of this is
 the national humiliation which
 Canadians have felt for so many
 years over the St. Lawrence
 Parkway. We threatened or
 promised to go it alone. We
 didn't. We waited. We don't
 seem convinced that we can act
 and achieve and develop on our
 own. This is an unbecoming
 attitude on the part of a people
 who, beyond our own shores, are
 looked upon as potentially great.

We can be arch-conservative
 toward the problem of immigra-
 tion also. It seems to me that
 this country is both under-
 developed and underpopulated.
 I am fairly sure that these
 features of our nation are in-
 timately connected. It seems
 that there is a manifest destiny
 for Canada, a destiny which the
 urgencies of the present world
 picture make all the more clear.
 There are areas in the world
 which are overpopulated. Now
 instead of talking about birth
 control and such things, it seems
 far more logical, not to say far
 more human, to admit of another
 solution, a solution which, if I

These people are possessed by
 a culture and a heritage which
 cannot but enrich our own.

In final analysis, however, the
 compelling reason for immigra-
 tion from a Christian point of
 view is neither the economic ad-
 vantage of ourselves or others,
 nor is it the political rights which
 we would share with others. It
 is the fact that under God we
 are all brothers, and, to turn
 away brothers who are in desper-
 ate plight and whom we have
 the means and opportunity to
 succor is, religiously speaking,
 an inadmissible act. Selfishness
 is never a nice thing and it be-
 comes more grievous when it is
 raised above the personal to the
 national level. Who is my neigh-
 bor, my friend, my brother? The
 Gospel has ringing answers to
 these questions.

It is a truism today to state
 that the welfare of one nation
 depends upon that of others. Iso-
 lationism is passe in political
 life; it is increasingly realized
 that it is passe also in the eco-
 nomic life of nations. There
 seems to me to be present in the
 world today a situation which
 can bear much fruit if it is in-
 tegrated into a form of life
 which since its inception has been
 openly anti-isolationist, viz., a
 well-led Christian life.

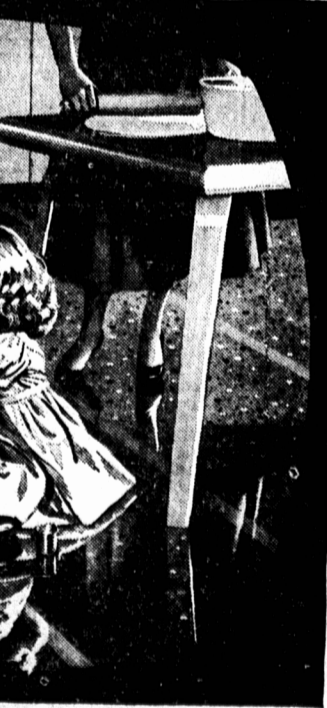
This is why Christianity is so
 human. It humanizes or should
 humanize, whatever it touches. If we
 have the attitude of Christian anti-
 isolationism we have the key to
 the solution of the immigration
 problem. There really are no for-
 eigners to a Christian; there are
 only brothers. There should be,
 from a Christian point of view,
 no native lands nor foreign lands.
 Everyone should be able to live
 in a so-called foreign land as if
 it were his native land. Christian
 Canadians should give this oppor-
 tunity to their immigrant
 brothers.
