

Island Exports.

WE are indebted to E. L. Lydiard, Esq., Customs Broker, for the following statement of exports from King's and Queen's Counties during the past five months to all ports, including those of other parts of Canada:—

Trade of Summerside During May.

At the port of Summerside during May, 1880, there were imported \$28,083 worth of goods from countries other than Canada, on which duty was paid to the amount of \$5,754.86. Last year the imports at Summerside during May were of the value of \$21,026, and the duty paid was \$4,506.52. So that the excess of this year amounts to: Value of goods, \$7,057; duty, \$1,248.34. As for the May exports from Summerside, they exhibit a gratifying increase of \$9,808,—the export of May last year being valued at \$32,688, and this year 42,496. The difference is accounted for by the two steamers which loaded at Summerside by Capt. Richards and R. T. Holman, respectively, with potatoes for the British market. This fact shows the value to a community of enterprising merchants.

Untruthful Reports.

THE untruthful reports recently set afloat by the Toronto Globe and the Ottawa Free Press, regarding the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, have resulted in the usual way. The Minister has been benefitted rather than injured by them. Other papers have shown how erroneous the statements were. The truth is known; and the people of the Upper Provinces are only the more disgusted with the party hacks, who, in the hope of damaging the Government, gave publicity to falsehoods of the grossest kind. Mr. Pope has, doubtless—like other men—his faults and weaknesses. But he has given proof of the possession of sterling qualities, and misrepresentation don't do him any harm.

Crop Prospects.

NOTWITHSTANDING the lateness of the spring there are in this Province, at this date, prospects of a very good crop. There will, almost certainly, be an extraordinary yield of hay. The meadows were not injured by the frost of last winter, and at present the grass is of more than average luxuriance. We may report, with certainty, that the acreage under wheat is larger than ever it has been here; while of oats, potatoes, etc., there is no lack. If favored by the weather and the markets, our farmers will prosper this year.

Some Penitentiary Statistics.

THERE are six penitentiaries in Canada—viz., Kingston, Halifax, St. John, St. Vincent de Paul, British Columbia, Manitoba. Last year the number of convicts was 1374; and the gross expenditure in connection with them was \$307,962.10, or about \$225 each.

Immigration to Canada.

IMMIGRATION to Canada was the greatest during the memorable years immediately following the famine in Ireland, and in 1847 the number reached 70,000. The figures for 1880 are not likely to reach this number, but unless a check occurs the figures will be the largest since that year. The greatest immigration since 1847 was 1873, when 41,000 selected Canada as their future home. From that year, however, the figures steadily declined till 1876, when the lowest point was reached, the figures for that year being 14,499. The effects of the causes which, about the same time, increased the immigration to the United States were felt in an equal, if not greater degree by Canada, and the tide again strongly set in, the figures for 1879 having risen to 30,717, and adding those who entered at inland ports, and not reported to the immigration agents, the total was about 40,000. Of this number about 28,000 settled in Ontario and 12,000 in Manitoba and the North West. For the first three months of 1880 the immigration into Ontario increased about 20 per cent., and the increase during April and May indicates an increase during the year of about 50 per

cent. The increase in the number of those who proceed to Manitoba and the North West has been much greater than the number for Ontario, and the estimate of 60,000 for the whole Dominion for 1880 will probably not be very much astray.

Supreme Court, Prince County.

SUMMERSIDE, June 11. Supreme Court is still in session here. The appeal cases are now being argued. There were quite a number on the docket, but many were dismissed for want of legal notice to the respondent. It is expected the term will end early to-morrow. A verdict was found for the defendant, by the jury, this morning, in the case of McCarrill vs. Fitzgerald. Reid vs. Cahill was called this forenoon. This was an action on account, and was settled before proceeding further. The last case before the jury was Crockett vs. Robinson,—an action to recover an instalment of the purchase money in an agreement between the parties for the sale of certain lands. A verdict was found for the plaintiff for the amount of the instalment and interest.

Bogus Diplomas.

For the past fifteen years Philadelphia has been the seat of a number of medical colleges that flooded the country with bogus diplomas. The Legislature tried to suppress the institutions but failed and they have been run on legal charters. Six months ago the city editor of the Record called the attention of the Attorney General to these concerns. The State had no evidence and the Attorney General no money with which to proceed. The Record advanced the funds upon a promise of reimbursement by the Legislature. A few days ago the matter culminated in proceedings that wipe out five bogus medical colleges, and in the arrest of John Buchanan, Dean of the American University, Philadelphia, and the Eclectic Medical College of Pennsylvania; he was also President of the National Eclectic Medical Association, which issued diplomas, and under the alias of James Murphy, D. D., he acted as Dean of the concern, issuing diplomas, at the Livingston University of America. Chas. Polk and John Siggins, members of the faculty, were also arrested. Six others of the faculty are still at large. The evidence against the prisoners was secured by Record's city editor, who, under assumed names, got three medical diplomas for \$75, and five degrees, viz., two of Doctor of Medicine, one of Doctor of Divinity, one of Doctor of Laws, and one of Doctor of Civil Laws, for \$150. Half a ton of bogus diplomas were captured in Buchanan's place, with a mass of correspondence.

Latest News Notes.

A little daughter of Mr. James Clayton, of Nashwaak, N. B., was instantly killed on the 10th by a loaded wagon running over her. The team belonged to her father.

Arrangements are being made at Petersburg, Ont., to secure the services of a scientific lecturer from New York to deliver an address upon the modern improvements in the manufacture of butter and cheese.

Mr. Wills, an Immigration Agent at Ottawa states that the 450 immigrants who arrived at Quebec by the "Polynesian," passed west on the 10th, having been engaged to work on the Pacific Railway at \$1.50 and \$1.75 per day.

The Princess Louise and Prince Leopold are expected to get back to Quebec to-day. Prince Leopold will return to England in July. He had desired to see more of the United States, and intended at first to go as far as San Francisco, but the Queen requires his presence, as he is of great service to her.

Emigration returns from the Mersey for May, show that 45 ships with 22,127 passengers, sailed for the United States, thirteen with 3,907 passengers to British North America; total number of emigrants, 29,992, of whom 7,926 were English, 6,330 Irish, 276 Scotch, and the remainder foreigners. As compared with May of last year, there is the enormous increase of 12,934.

The Lord Mayor of Dublin has telegraphed to the Mayor of every town in the United States and Canada as follows:—"I regret to say, funds are still needed for the relief of the distress in Ireland. In many districts the pinch is now equal to that of any previous time. The distress is much felt by small farmers, who dread workhouse relief, but can get nothing else until the crops come."

The New York Sun (Independent) thanks God that Grant was not nominated, but speaking of Garfield in connection with the Credit Mobilier business, says: "A perjurer, or a man who attempts subornation of perjury, is not fit to be President." The Sun contains an interview with General Belknap, who says that Garfield is the most corrupt man in America, and would steal "Heaven's livery to serve the Devil in."
