

Inquiry Report Heard Today

OTTAWA (CP)—The report of the judicial inquiry into the Victor Spencer security case will be made public today, it was announced Monday after a cabinet meeting.

The report by Mr. Justice Dalton Wells of the Ontario Supreme Court, is expected to support the government's contention that Spencer acted as a Soviet agent while he was working as a clerk in the Vancouver post office.

and has never been identified. Spencer was dismissed from the civil service last New Year's Eve without pension or the right to appeal. The dismissal sparked a debate in Parliament and opposition MPs accused the government of violating Spencer's fundamental rights as an individual.

Mr. Justice Wells was specifically asked to report on the manner in which Spencer was dismissed by cabinet order.

Two Russian diplomats were expelled from Canada in May, 1965, for recruiting two Canadian agents.

Spencer, who died a few days before the inquiry opened, reportedly was one of the agents involved. The second man approached by the Soviets, reported the incident to the RCMP

3. The British would pull down the 58-year-old wall which separates the so-called neutral zone between Gibraltar and Spanish territory, provided the Spanish quit their strict control of traffic flowing from the rock into their land.

4. The Spanish would be given facilities to use the British airport in the neutral zone, but with no rights to share in its control.

Gibraltar May Be A Province

LONDON (AP)—The British government is reported to have proposed turning Britain's colony of Gibraltar into a province, as part of new live-and-let-live arrangements with Spain.

But diplomatic officials, reporting this, stressed Spain's claim to sovereignty over the historic rock remains unacceptable to the British.

In secret exchanges with Spain on Gibraltar's disputed future, the British have put forward a series of proposals portrayed as a compromise offer. Informants outlined these highlights of the British plan:

1. To rid the rock of the stigma of colonialism it would be regarded as a sort of British province. Its ruling authority would be more like a council of aldermen under a mayor

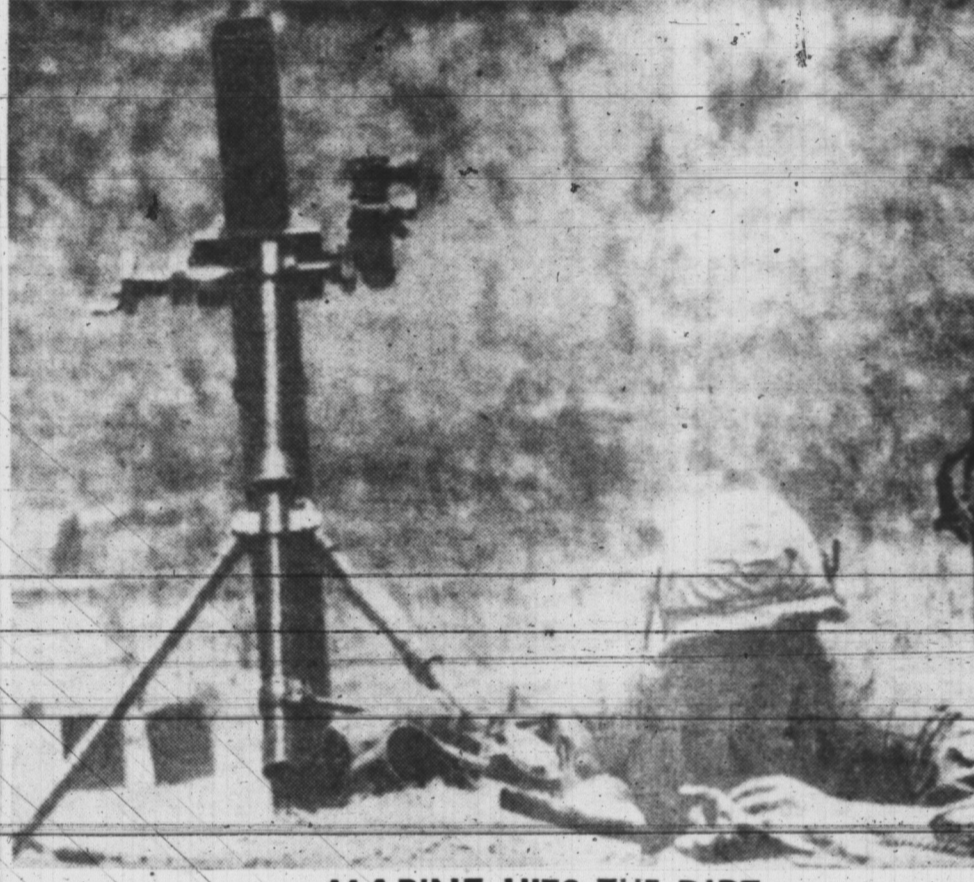

Says Practices Make War Near Unwinnable

NEW YORK (AP)—Historian Arthur Schlesinger Jr. says that increased "Americanization" of the war in Viet Nam can make that conflict virtually unwinnable.

"The more we Americanize the war—by increasing our military presence, by summoning Saigon leaders, like vassals, to conferences in an American state, by transforming the local war in Viet Nam into a global test between America and China—the more we make the war unwinnable," Schlesinger says in the current issue of Look magazine.

Kahn urges the deployment of a stable Saigon government and a minimizing of the non-military role of the U.S. military.

Kissinger says that military action is needed to defeat the Viet Cong in Nam, the primary issue of political and psychological war.

Baldwin takes the view that the United States must in South Viet Nam by the 11th hour.

He urges a declaration of national emergency by the president to mobilize the reserves of 500,000 by the end of the year and increase the call as necessary.

He also calls for a quarantine to stop the passage of arms from the North to the South.

Morgenthau, dissenting from present U.S. policies, says: "We should never have been involved in this war, but we are deeply involved in it. The aim of our policy should be to avoid getting more involved in it and to encourage ourselves from it while using our losses."

Morgenthau says that the commitment the United States had to Viet Nam has been made because the people of the United States now prefer an end to the war rather than an end to the Viet Cong, and because the government "is hardly the government of the name."

Others were Prof. Hans Morgenthau, of the University of Chicago; Prof. Henry Kissinger, of Harvard; Hanson Baldwin, New York Times military editor; and physicist Herman Kahn.

"The bitter fact is that the war in Viet Nam can never be won as a war of attrition against Asians," Schlesinger says.

He urges that the United States encourage a civilian government, making sure that the regime "represents the significant political forces in the country and is capable both of rallying the army and carrying out programs of social reform."

He also urges the reconvening of the Geneva conference, limiting American forces in Viet Nam to their present number, a tapering-off of the bombings with the Soviet Union, France, China and other interested countries about the neutralization under international guarantee for all of Southeast Asia.
