Universities May Reveal Financial Offer Stand

OTTAWA (CP) — The national organization of Canada's universities may make known this week its stand on Prime Minister St. Laurent's proposal to double federal aid to universities.

The 35-member National Conference of Canadian Universities opens a three-day forum here Monday. The subject: "Canada's crisis in higher education." The centre of the crisis appears to be the problem of getting more money to meet a huge influx of students that is expected to nearly double university enrolments within 10 years.

Mr. St. Laurent will address conference delegates Monday night at a dinner. It is expected he will elaborate on his announcement made in an Oct. 7 speech at Sherbrooke University, that he will ask Parliament to boost federal university grants from \$8,000,000 to \$16,000,000 a year.

He has asked the NCCU to take over distribution of the money, now paid directly to universities from the federal treasury. Although heads of many NCCU member universities have lauded the announced increase, the conference itself has not yet decided whether to accept the job of distribution.

DILEMMA IN QUEBEC
Universities in Quebec have not yet announced a decision in the political dilemma which confronts them: whether to accept the federal money in the face of strong opposition from the provincial government.

Premier Duplessis holds that federal aid to education is an invasion of provincial rights. Quebec universities, after accepting federal grants for one year when they were begun five years ago, have collected no federal grants since.

Mr. St. Laurent has said the increased grants from Ottawa would be made available to Quebec universities, whether or not the money is accepted. He has expressed confidence the NCCU will take over the task of distributing the money.

The three-day forum, closed to the general public, will wind up Wednesday with a morning-long session on university financing. The discussion will centre on papers presented by President N.A. M. MacKenzie of the University of British Columbia, Rev. H. J. Somers, President of St. Francis Xavier University at Antigonish, N. S., and Principal F. Cyril James of McGill.

Other subjects for the first two days include the training of engineers and technicians, the problems of getting university teachers, and the role of universities in developing human resources.

FINANCING DOMINANT
Dr. Claude T. Bissell, president of Carleton College here and chairman of the conference program committee, said in an interview that the financial question will be dominant.

"It is crucial, and all of the other problems are interwoven with it," he said.

Universities would be unable to handle the expected big increases in enrolments without "vast increases" in facilities and teaching staff. The necessary professors could not be obtained without big increases in present salary levels.

Dr. Bissell said tuition fees, on the average, cover a little less than 30 per cent of university costs. Recent increases in tuition fees had been in line with cost increases and their proportion of over-all costs had remained fairly constant.

If big new sources of university income could be opened up, he said, it might be possible to reduce tuition fees and thus ease the problem of financing scholarships and bursaries.

One of the conference topics will be the failures and misfits among undergraduates — an important factor in the efforts of universities to make the best possible use of their over-strained facilities.

The conference will discuss whether university entrance tests are adequate, enough to weed out misfits, whether university teaching the social pattern of campus life and inspiration, and whether ing gives students enough stimulus so complex that students lose sight of their academic goals.

Howe Considering Visit To Russia
OTTAWA (CP)—Trade Minister Howe said Monday he is "always reconsidering" whether he should visit the Soviet Union.

He was asked by reporters at a press conference whether he would reconsider his reported plan to visit Moscow, in view of Russia's behavior in the current international situation.

An official invitation was conveyed to him earlier this year by Soviet Fisheries Minister A. A. Ishkov.

Mr. Howe said the only commitment he made was to "consider" making the visit if he was returned to office at the next general election. He did not make any definite promise.

RUN ON FOODSTUFFS
PARIS (AP)—The French grocers' syndicate appealed to housewives Saturday not to buy more than required for immediate needs and said there might be delay in replenishing stocks because of supply difficulties. A statement said some consumers had been buying large stocks of food "indiscriminately" because of anxiety about the international situation. There have been runs on sugar, cooking oil, coffee and canned goods in particular.
