Three Convicted In Impaired Cases

Fines of \$100 and costs were imposed on three persons convicted in Queen County Magistrate's Court yesterday of impaired driving before Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC.

The accused were Henry Edward Gallant, Stanley Bridge, John Samuel Rose, Bristol, and John Willard Arsenault, York Point.

John Earl MacLeod and Barry Curtis MacLeod of Brighton Shore and Pamela Aigne (Mrs. Laurie MacDonald) of 9½ Upper Queen Street, were charged with break entry and theft at MacDonald's Grocery near Mayfield June 21.

The two MacLeod brothers were remanded until July 2 to Queen's County Jail while Mrs. MacDonald was remanded to July 5 for preliminary hearing with bail to stand. She was represented by John P. Nicholson.

James Wayne Darte of 61 Rochford Street was charged with unlawfully causing the death of James Joseph Robison by criminal negligence and his case was adjourned to July 5 for preliminary hearing. Counsel for the accused is John P. Nicholson.

Charles Earl Lund of 71½ Dorchester Street, was charged with intent to mislead and cause a peace officer to enter upon investigation when reporting that an offence had been committed when it had not. The accused had his case adjourned to July 5 for election.

Charged with theft under \$50, Eric Lionel Lowther of Cornwall pleaded not guilty and was remanded to July 16 to fix a date for trial with bail to stand. Lowther is represented by John Nicholson.

For passing on a solid white line, Richard Edward Rush of 65 Rochford Street had his case adjourned to July 2 for trial.

A reprimand was given by the Howard Murray of Brighton when he was convicted on a charge of operating a motor vehicle without 1965 registration. The accused was represented by Gordon Tweedy.

A resident from Covehead and another from Grandview pleaded guilty to charges of illegal possession of liquor and each was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days.

A charge of intoxication against a resident of Bristol brought a fine of \$20 and costs or 15 days.

Conference Agenda Not Received Here

Premier Walter R. Shaw said yesterday the province has not yet received a detailed agenda of the federal-provincial conference beginning July 19 at Ottawa.

He said, however, that some of the main items likely to be discussed are off-shore mineral rights, transportation, tax committee studies, the war on poverty, federal-provincial finance arrangements and Bill C-129 which would allow for increases in Atlantic Province freight rates.

The premier said he will lead by the students the province's delegation to the conference and it is likely that Provincial Treasurer Alban Farmer, Welfare and Labor Minister Dr. Hubert MacNeill and Health Minister Henry Wedge will attend.

"If the agenda is broadened to include vital matters of education and welfare," the premier said, "it may be necessary to add to this province's delegation."

Injured Man Not Serious

SUMMERSIDE — The condition of Gerald W. Anthony Inglis, RCAF Station Summerside, who was sent to Prince County Hospital following an accident Sunday at St. Eleanora Corner, is reported as "not serious."

City Motorist Is Fined \$125

Arthur George Fleigher of Charlottetown was fined \$125 and costs on an impaired driving charge in city police court yesterday.

Magistrate A. J. Haslam, QC, fined Harry McGee, Charlottetown, \$50 and costs or 30 days for disorderly conduct.

Guy Vernon Ford, city, charged with driving without due care and attention (speeding) was fined \$30 and costs or 10 days.

Clarence Wood, Covehead, charged with driving without due care and attention was remanded until July 3, bail set at \$50.

Edward Callaghan, city, arraigned on a charge of false pretences was remanded until July 5, bail set at \$100.

An accused charged with unlawful possession of liquor was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days.

An accused charged with being drunk and disorderly was further remanded until June 29.

Robert B. Ellis, Stanhope, charged with a red traffic light violation failed to appear.

There were four drunk and incapable. One accused was given 10 days, a second 20 days suspended, a third was fined \$20 and costs or 20 days, and the fourth accused was remanded until June 30.

Lobster Catches Show Decrease

Statistics released yesterday by Fisheries Minister Leo Rosier show that only 1,434,681 pounds of lobsters were landed in the province in May of this year, compared to 1,717,424 pounds in May of last year.

Dollar value of lobsters landed last May was \$2,511,760, compared to a value of \$3,224,913 in May of 1964.

While lobster catches were reported high in the western part of the province in May, it appears that the South Kings and North Kings districts dropped behind catches of a year ago.

Last month, North Kings lobstermen landed 370,000 pounds, valued at \$661,000, while in May of last year lobstermen in the same district landed 615,000 pounds valued at \$1,146,000.

In South Kings last month, lobstermen landed 135,000 pounds valued at \$229,999, while in May of 1964 they landed 343,000 pounds valued at \$630,000.

The season in district 7B opened this year May 8 and while it normally closes June 30, an extension to July 16 has been granted.

Symposium Delegates To Visit Island

Delegates to the International Seaweed Symposium in Halifax in August will visit this province Aug. 21 to 24, and will be billeted in the National Park area.

About 50 persons from many countries of the world are expected to attend the symposium, scheduled for Aug. 25 to 28.

Many Civil Servants To Get Holiday

The government has decided to let civil servants have Friday off, where possible, so that they can have a long weekend during the July 1 holiday.

However, those who have Friday off are to lose one day from their annual vacation period.

Not all civil servants will get a holiday Friday, as some government offices must remain open; for example, the registry office.

Keith Barrett, Belmont Lot 16, has been re-appointed as director for the Maritime on the Canadian Shorthorn Breeders Association. He was re-elected at the annual meeting of the Maritime Shorthorn Breeders' Association held at Truro last week.

The Maritime Shorthorn breeders will make a serious attempt to have a test station on record of performance established for bulls. This problem was one of the main topics of discussion at the meeting.

There will be receipt and despatch of mails to mainland points only, and street mail boxes will be emptied only in the evening.

Drought Raises Fears For Strawberry Crop

Premier Shaw said yesterday drought conditions in the province will not become serious if there is rain without delay, but a lot of rain is needed to catch up on the water level supply.

He said grain and potato crops appear to be doing well, although the weather is affecting the hay crop, with meadows thin and hay growth retarded.

"We realize," the premier said, "that our farmers are anxious about the situation and we trust that conditions won't reach the stage suffered in other sections of Canada."

Department of agriculture officials, however, are worried about the province's strawberry crop, fearing that lack of rain could result in very small berries.

Meanwhile Monday, representatives of the RCMP, civil defense and the forestry division of the department of agriculture were meeting to discuss the readiness of fire fighting resources in the case of forest fire outbreaks. The fire hazard in the province is high and the group is seeing that all precautions for fire prevention are being taken.

The pilot, B. A. Whaley of Trenton, Ont., was killed. The remainder of the air show was cancelled. Thirty minutes before the accident, Whaley's 15-year-old son, Randy, had flown the same gyroplane.

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
