Park Royal Observes Anniversary Sunday

Seventh anniversary services of Park Royal United Church will be observed this Sunday with Services at 11 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. It was seven years ago on the last Sunday in May that the congregation was officially made a Pastoral charge by the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island at a solemn ceremony held in the Sanctuary of Trinity Church.

Since then the congregation has gone on to share a healthy and vigorous ministry in spite of the problems of serving an area where large numbers are constantly on the move. In the year 1958 the Church Sanctuary was dedicated with some hall facilities incorporated into the basement. Rev. G.H. Christie played a large part in these initial steps.

In 1961 under the leadership of the first inducted minister, Rev. W. B. Crowe, a modern manse was erected. Again, as with the Church a large part of this work was carried on by the men and women in volunteer laity.

The present minister is the Rev. J.H. Tye, inducted in 1961. The most preacher for these Anniversary Services will be Rev. Douglas H. Gass. Mr. Gass is a native of New Glasgow, Nova Scotia. He attended Mount Allison University from where he graduated in 1931 and Pine Hill Divinity Hall in 1943.

His ministry has been carried on in Nova Scotia at Burlington, Salspring, Parrsboro, Truro and Sharon, S. John, Stellarton where he is presently serving. Mr. Gass has a brother, D. M. (Don) Gass, retired manager of Island Telephone Company living at Albert Carter, in the former Verna Webber of Trinity Church, Summerside.

He will be supplied by the Senior Choir and by guest soloists. Services under the direction of Leonard Jardine, and organist Miss Frances MacNutt.

His ministry has been well known through the Maritimes as they travel extensively to present services of song. Last year they sang in 32 services as well as two in the CFCY-TV.

It is expected that capacity congregations will celebrate the 7th Anniversary of the Congregation of Park Royal.

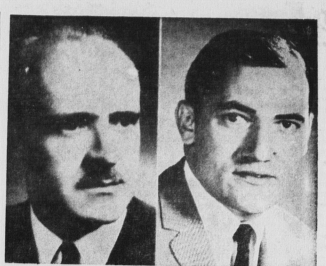
