

Shack Delivers Winner; Chicago Trims Canadiens

TORONTO (CP) — Eddie Shack's first goal of the season turned out to be the winner as Toronto Maple Leafs defeated Detroit Red Wings 3-2 in a National Hockey League game Wednesday night. The victory boosted the Leafs into a third-place tie while the loss was Detroit's fourth in a row.

Shack took a pass from Larry Jeffrey and cut in from his left-wing position to beat Detroit goalie Roger Crozier, putting the Leafs ahead 3-1.

Left winger Paul Henderson, who scored both Detroit goals, got his second of the night a minute and 53 seconds later to cut the margin to 3-2. But the Leafs held off the Red Wings from then on. The goals were Henderson's third and fourth of the season.

Other Toronto marks men were left winger John Brennan and defenceman Ken Dryden. Henderson's other goal came early in the third period.

The victory was Toronto's first of the season against a tie and a loss and moved the Leafs into a tie with the idle New York Rangers for third place.

Detroit remained two points behind fifth-place Boston Bruins.

STOPS CLOSE-IN SHOT
 Sawchuk replied with a fine stop on a close-in shot by Howe just before Brennan counted his first goal of the season by slapping Stenkowski's pass past Crozier from 10 feet out.

Douglas made it 2-0 late in the period with Stenkowski again setting up the goal, this time on a passout from the corner. Douglas scored with a 45-foot slap shot.

Henderson's first goal of the game, at 44 seconds of the third period, came when he swooped in to grab Norm Ullman's rebound and score. Shack made it 3-1 at 8:29 when he converted Jeffrey's pass. Henderson cut the margin to 3-2 by poking Howe's shot in from under Sawchuk's pads.

Another three game winner, Souris High pulled off the unexpected and defeated SDHS 14-7 in Souris to take a first place tie with the Saints. The two stand now at the top with identical 3-1 records.

Top credit for the win offensively goes to far throwing quarterback White who engineered both Souris majors in the fourth quarter on passes to Tom Mullaly. The first throw at the eight minute mark was a 55 yard pass to the halfback on the Saint five yard line; the second with one minute left to play in the game was a tie breaking gamble of fifteen yards again to Mullaly.

TORONTO (CP)—Peter Mahovlich had no illusions Wednesday night when he skated out against his older brother and Toronto Maple Leafs. The Detroit Red Wing rookie had done little during the current National Hockey League season to warrant much more than a passing glance.

Shy and reserved in his approach to the game, Peter is the first to admit he's got to start producing if he intends to stick in the big time.

Before the game, Brand X — a name tagged on the youngster during the Wings' training camp — accepted the fact that he faces demotion if he doesn't live up to NHL standards.

BROTHER CAN'T HELP
 The fact that his brother Frank—the 29-year-old Leaf veteran who now commands a salary of about \$35,000 plus bonuses—is his chief supporter doesn't have much bearing on Peter's future.

"I've got to start producing," says Peter.

At 20, he still has a year of junior hockey eligibility left and the jump to the NHL may be a little strenuous. After three games he hasn't scored a point, although he's been used only sparingly by coach Sid Abel.

He and Frank, both left wingers, have faced each other once on the ice, in an exhibition game this year at Kitchener, Ont. In that one Peter scored a goal and Frank suffered rib injuries that kept him out of action until the season opened last Saturday.

U.S. And Canada Expect To Run 1-2 In Tournament

MEXICO CITY (AP) — The United States, with perhaps its strongest team since 1960, is a slight favorite over Britain and Canada in the fifth Eisenhower Trophy golf tournament, starting Thursday.

Thirty-two countries have entered the four-day, 72-hole competition to determine the world amateur team championship, but no more than half a dozen are conceded a chance.

They are the U.S., led by two-time national champion Deane Beman of Bethesda, Md., defending titleholder Britain, Canada, runner up in the last two tournaments, South Africa and possibly Australia and Mexico.

The matches will be played over the 7,125-yard Club de Golf Mexico, which has a par 72.

GREENS ARE SLOW
 The course was hewn out of a natural forest 15 years ago over a lava bed from a now-dormant volcano. It has gun-barrel fairways lined with stately cedars and slow greens made tricky by creeping poana grass.

The British have been instructed by non-playing captain Joe Carr to use irons on some driving holes. But there's not much that can be done about the greens.
