

# S.D.U. Ready For Football Opener Saturday; Have Four New Men In Lineup

The Saint Dunstan's University football team with three weeks of daily practice sessions behind them and a long schedule of competition ahead will get their taste of intercollegiate opposition this Saturday afternoon when they meet Mount Allison University on the Saints gridiron.

For three weeks coach A. J. MacAdam has been putting his charges through their paces and when the boys in Red and White take to the field on Saturday they should be a well conditioned, fairly fast and evenly balanced team. MacAdam himself is confident that the S.D.U. footballers will make a good showing. Remembering however, that eight of his players are facing their second year of intercollegiate competition and that four of his men are playing on the senior team for the first time, he will not go out on a limb in talking about his team's chances in the intercollegiate schedule.

There's a good reason for his attitude. This year's intercollegiate schedule with teams from St. F. X., Mount A., Acadia and S.D.U. competing promises to provide fans with the best football seen here for quite a number of years.

St. F. X. and Acadia, who have been power-houses in Nova Scotia football, will be taking part in a league with the Saints for the first time. The colorful Xavarians have always been crowd pleasers and when the Saints meet them here on October 25 one of the biggest football crowds for several seasons will likely be on hand.

In past years Maritime intercollegiate competition has always been staged in two sections with P.E.I. and N.B. teams in one bracket and Nova Scotia squads in the other. This year, however, with only four Maritime Universities participating it was decided to form the one league.

The league will provide the teams with more football. Starting this Saturday the Saints will play for six consecutive Saturday's as they meet each of the other teams in a home and home series.

When they take to the field Saturday afternoon the Saints will show a stronger team than that which they fielded last year. They will be average in weight, they will have speed on the wings and they will be good tacklers.

The scrum will be practically intact from last season. All of last year's forwards have returned to College and only one of them will be missing from action Saturday. That will be Cy. MacIsaac who injured his elbow in practice.

MacIsaac's place will be taken by Charlie Cheverie, who formerly played in the backfield but who was shifted into the tail-up position when MacIsaac was side-lined.

Cheverie, who is one of the best tacklers in Maritime football should add plenty to the Saints' scrum. He runs well, has loads of fight and provides plenty of push but his greatest asset will likely be in his tackling. Clair "Copy" Callaghan, John Mullally, Max Callaghan, and Art Pendergast will be back in their usual positions. Ronnie McIvor, who played two years last season, will be back in the forward line.

The newcomers to the team are all backfield men and they will be taking the places of George Cameron, Jerry Clinton and Joe Mallette. The new men are Paul Jay, Allan MacDonald, Lloyd Gaudet and Jack Reardon. Also in the backfield for the first time but not a stranger to the team is Clarence MacDonald.

Although the positions have not been settled the backfield should look like this. Pete Dunphy will be picking quarter and Allan MacDonald flying. Phil Coyle and Clarence MacDonald will be inside halves while Paul Jay and Lloyd Gaudet will be the wings. Jack Reardon, the basketball star, will fill back.

Clarence MacDonald, who has spent most of his football days as a front-line scrum man, was

changed into a backfielder when Cheverie was taken up to the forward line.

In addition to the players mentioned above there are several other outstanding players on the campus who may be advanced to the senior team at any time during the season. These players include Joe Mullally, Aquinas Ryan, Bob Mooney and Gus Dorlas.

A rule change, which has been troubling the boys a bit this year, is the abolition of the two-man scrum. This rule was put into effect several years ago and served to speed up the game although its infringement often resulted in penalty kicks.

The return of the old rule of heeling the ball immediately after being tackled has confused the players somewhat and has resulted in several minor injuries to the Saints athletes in practise sessions.

### White Sox Player Charged With Rape

CHICAGO, Sept. 29 — (AP)—Jim Rivera 30-year-old Chicago White Sox outfielder, today was charged with raping a 22-year-old married woman and was released on \$3,000 bond.

The rookie ballplayer, who previously had served a five-year jail sentence on a similar charge, was ordered to appear in court Tuesday for a hearing.

Rivera was arrested Sunday in the White Sox clubhouse, following the game with St. Louis Browns.

The complainant, Mrs. Janet Gater, brunette wife of a soldier, told authorities she was raped Saturday night in her south side apartment.

Rivera admitted being intimate with Mrs. Gater but denied using force. He said she submitted willingly after inviting him to her apartment.

Police said Mrs. Gater told them she was walking her dog Saturday when Rivera introduced himself and offered to carry her packages. She said he accompanied her to her apartment, pushed his way in and refused to leave. Police said the woman told them the rape followed.

# Rumors Sugar Ray Through With Ring

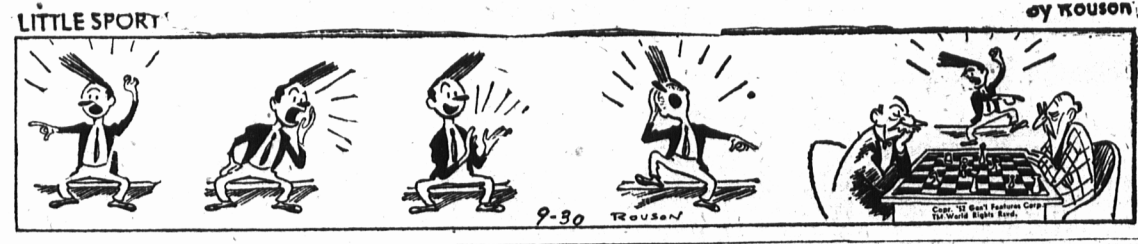

GUELPH, Ont., Sept. 29 — (CP)—New York Rangers, bolstered by the addition of a top-flight defenseman but weakened down the middle, rank as one of the question marks of the National Hockey League which opens its schedule next week.

The New Yorkers finished fifth and out of the play-offs last season and indications were they'd be greatly improved by the off-season acquisition of Leo Reise, blonde five-year man with Detroit Red Wings and one of the league's top rearguards.

Then came word from Port Arthur, Ont., that smoothie Edgar Laprade didn't fancy returning to the 70-game grind this fall and wanted to devote his time to his sporting goods store at the Lakehead. That left a big hole in Rangers' store of centre men.

Last week Don (Bones) Raleigh—speaks well for the work which Tom did and served as a reward for his efforts during the summer.

At the end of the season M.C.A. had as good an infield as any in the Province. Around the horn they lined up as follows: catcher, Arnold MacCallum; first base, Des Trainer; second, B. Hood; short, Lorne Hennessey; and third, Glen Matheson. Hennessey, who is a natural second baseman was converted into a shortstop and did a very creditable job. Matheson was taken from the outfield and turned into a third baseman and showed improvement in the hot corner as the season went along.

Matheson, who started the season with a burst and then tapered off, came on to lead the boys in the sticking department. Art Hughes, Ar-oid MacCallum, Lorne Hennessey and Irving MacKinnon also helped out at the plate.

A chap who played quite a prominent role in the team's success is Roy MacCabe. Roy who is well known in rifle shooting circles, was one of the fellows instrumental in the formation of the team last spring. Roy continued his work throughout the season as he took care of the manager's problems.

# Black, Reynolds Picked As Starting Pitchers In First Series Game

NEW YORK, Sept. 29 — (AP)—Reliever Joe Black of Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Yankees' Allie Reynolds will be the opposing pitchers Wednesday in the World Series opener at Ebbetts Field. Both are righthanders. Brooklyn manager Chuck Dressen followed up his week-end hints by selecting the 26-year-old Black (15-4), who worked in 56 games during the National League season. He will be the second relief pitcher to start a series opener.

After watching the Negro hurler warm up for about 10 minutes in a Yankee Stadium workout, Dressen turned to newspaper men and said, "That's my pitcher."

Manager Casey Stengel's announcement on Reynolds was almost automatic. The big Indian Chief (20-8) drew almost every important assignment during the season. He has been Stengel's opening choice in three of his four straight World Series.

Betting odds still favored the Yanks by a little better than 5 to 5. The Yanks were a 6-to-5 choice to win the opener behind the first of the 34-year-old Reynolds.

Dressen and Stengel also listed their second- and third-game hurlers. In the second game it will be Carl Erskine (14-6) for the Brooklyn against Vic Raschi (16-6). When they move to the Yankee park for the third game, it will be two left-handers, with Preacher Roe (11-2) for the Dodgers and Eddie Lopa (10-5), star of the 1951 series, for the Yanks.

MONTREAL, Sept. 29 — (CP)—Billy Ray whipped in four goals and Maurice Richard three Saturday night to lead Montreal Canadiens to an 11-4 victory over Syracuse Warriors of the American Hockey League in a wide-open exhibition game.

MONCTON, Sept. 29 — (CP)—Gloucester Juniors won the Maritime junior baseball championship by defeating Lewisville Cubs 1-0 in the third game of the series. The Bay team won the series opener here Saturday 2-1. They went down to an 8-2 defeat in the first game of a doubleheader Sunday afternoon and made a first inning run the third game winner.

There was some second-guessing of Dressen for naming his relief ace to start. Eddie Sawyer did the same thing with the 1950 Philadelphia Phillies, losing a 1-0 game with Jim Konstanty, who had worked 74 regular season games.

"I want to get all the work I can out of him," said Dressen. "If he wins, I can start him again. Anyway, I can use him on relief."

Asked what he would do for relief in case Black has trouble, Dressen said: "It'll be the ninth, and a certain kind of hitter (lefty) is up there, I'd go for Roe. Otherwise it probably would be Billy Loes or Johnny Rutherford."

Black has been a standout pitcher for the Dodgers. He probably will have little rest in this Series. He may even match the late Hugh Casey's performance of appearing in six of seven games in 1947—if it goes that long. The Associated Press picks the Yankees in six.

Outfielders Carl Furillo of the Dodgers and Gene Woodling of the Yanks were expected to shake off injuries in time to make the starting line-up. Furillo has a hand injury that bothers him, gripping a bat. Woodling has a strained leg muscle that kept him out of the line-up for a week.

There seems to be little doubt that both will start.

"I don't know by batting order yet," said Stengel who used 98 different combinations en route to a record-tying fourth straight pennant.

Black broke into organized ball in 1951 with a composite 11-12 record at Brooklyn's Montreal and St. Paul farms. Before joining the Dodgers he pitched winters in Cuba and Venezuela and summers with the Baltimore Elite Giants in the Negro League.

Informed he was to start, Black grinned and said, "Now I got to go home and pray."
