THE EASTERN.—The steamer Eastern arrived from Halifax, via Summerside, at an early hour this morning, bringing a good general freight. She will leave for Halifax direct this afternoon with a cargo consisting mainly of pork, oats, lobsters and potatoes.

PUBLIC MISSIONARY MEETING.—Tomorrow evening, at 8 o'clock, a public missionary meeting will be held in the basement of the First Methodist Church.

DAMAGE BY LIGHTNING.—A heavy thunder, lightning and rain storm swept over the western counties of Nova Scotia on Monday evening last. The dwelling house of Andrew McNutt, at Liverpool, was struck by lightning and partially demolished.

A GREAT POTATO CROP.—The potato crop along the Saint John river was never better, so say the farmers. They have begun digging, and the potatoes are large and very free from rust. A gentleman who came down in the Olivette yesterday said there were 125 barrels taken in at McTowan's wharf, St. John's, about 40 at Upper Gagetown, and about sixty at Oranmore. The May Queen brought down nearly 400 barrels on Monday.—St. John Sun.
