And in the Toronto Daily Star appeared recently a little poem that might well be considered a guarantee for the future of Canadian poetry—a tribute to King George V by Peggy Jones, aged ten years:

Oh, far-flung Empire! Bow thine head! Our King, beloved of all, is dead. And every heart is filled with sorrow unexpressed, For a wise and kindly monarch has forever gone to rest.

A children's hobbies show was held this month in the Bronx division of the Department of Parks in New York.

Exhibits shown by children from all public playgrounds in the Bronx, were numerous and varied and included books of baseball player's autographs, model houses, airplanes, ships, coins and stamps, aquariums of tropical fish, puppet theaters with marionettes, drawings, photographs, minerals, match boxes and bridge tables.

A recent article, by Rex Hunter, about "Odd Tastes in Hobbies," suggests that to evolve a genuinely new hobby is a very difficult thing. Amongst the extremely rare, though not unique, hobbies mentioned are the collecting of keys of unusual shape and historical associations, the collecting of relics from shipwrecks; one man, an archaeologist, has a collection of fourteen hundred lamps which trace the romance of lighting from ancient times to the present.

The article goes on to say that if a prize were offered for the world's strangest hobby, William Candy of Cheltenham, England, would surely have a good chance of winning it. He is a mender of eggshells. And new from all parts of the world collectors bring him the damaged eggshells, of rare or extinct birds, some valued as high as \$5,000, and he repairs them perfectly.

What began as a boyhood hobby has ended in an occupation which brought Mr. Candy safely through the depression.

The Opera Guild of Toronto has recently been formed for the purpose of definitely establishing grand opera in Toronto. Members of the Opera Guild plan to build up a permanent organization and repertoire by producing one or two new operas each year.

The Music Department of the New York Public Library is endeavoring to obtain the facilities for making a collection of photographs of musical manuscripts patterned after the collection in the Vienna State Library.

The fact that the manuscripts are reproduced on very thin films means that it will be possible to keep a collection of thousands of such films in a very small space. But it remains for Canada to recall the good Queen's birthday 117 years ago in a national public holiday still bearing her name. In the United Kingdom and other dominions and colonies the anniversary of her birthday May 24, has been merged with the observance of Empire Day.

Thirty-five years after Victoria's death, and with her great-grandson Edward VIII on the throne, Canada still keeps Victoria Day. Empire Day ceremonies are held in Canadian schools, generally a day or two previously. The "Queen's Birthday" is a day of festivity and delectable joy, set this year for Monday, May 25, the actual anniversary coming on Sunday.

Incidentally the idea of an Empire Day is ascribed to a Canadian, Mrs. Clementina Fessenden, a member of the Wentworth Historical Association of Hamilton suggested school patriotic ceremonies, exemplifying British history. Her effort had the approval of Queen Victoria. The first celebration of Empire Day in Canada was in 1899. Through the effort of the late Earl of Meath, observance of Empire Day spread rapidly. It was adopted in the United Kingdom in 1902.

Born at Kensington Palace, London, May 24, 1819, daughter of Edward, Duke of Kent, son of George III of Great Britain, and his wife, the daughter of William II of Prussia, Alexandrina Victoria was eminently of royal blood, though her prospects at birth of becoming Queen were not very bright. Her uncle, afterwards George IV, was Regent.

He died in 1830 and was succeeded by his brother, William IV. In the fate of Kings when William died in 1837 his 18-year-old niece Victoria was the sole surviving child of the four elder sons of George III. Thus the crown devolved on her.

Queen Victoria's reign—the longest in British history—saw wide development and colonization of the Empire and great extension of power on land and sea. The Queen became Empress of India. From a group of scattered colonies, sparsely settled and restless, there grew the Dominion of Canada, a strong confederation under the British flag. The far-flung provinces were knit in nationhood and the distant coast bound by ribbons of steel.

The Queen died Jan 22, 1901. Her son reigned in her stead. Edward VII was the first to bear the additional and more imperial title of King of the British Dominions Beyond the Seas, King . . .

Currencies

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, May 22—Majority of leading currencies held firm in reaction to United States funds during today's dealings on the foreign exchange market. The franc, however, went against the general trend. Dominion funds gained 5-16 per cent at 99 11-16 cents, pounds sterling improved 9-16 cent to \$4.97 9-16 while French francs were off 1-16 point at 6.58 7-16 cents.
