# Parade Handling Insults S Side

SUMMERSIDE — Town Police Chief S. D. A. Wannamaker termed the manner in which the Queen and Prince Philip were driven through the town Monday "a slap in the face of the town."

He said citizens were badly disappointed at not seeing the Queen because of the fact which the motorcycle travelled, after standing on the parade route for two hours.

He also criticized the fact that a Charlottetown police

vehicle was included in the motorcycle, saying it made it appear as though the people in the crowd were the "local police" and that the local police equipment was inadequate.

Another of the numerous points out that buildings along the route here had been cleared, while in Charlottetown spectators were allowed to perch atop buildings to view the proceedings.

## Lobster Season Along Strait Closes Oct. 13

HALIFAX (Special) — Officials at Maritime headquarters of the federal department of Fisheries have announced that the current lobster fishing season in the Northumberland Strait will close Tuesday, Oct. 13. No lobster can be fished or landed after that date.

The lobster fishing area in question extends from Zel River Bridge, Kent County, N.B., and extends along the coast to Berryman's Point, Cumberland County, N.S. It also includes strait waters off Prince County, P.E.I. from Victoria Harbor to North Point.
