TORONTO (CP) — Canadian Breweries Ltd. had net profit in the year ended Oct. 31 of \$10,079,209, or \$3.04 a share, compared with \$11,317,457, or \$3.52 a share, in 1957.

Sales were \$281,445,406 compared with \$280,154,292.

E. P. Taylor, chairman, says in the annual report that sales would have approximated \$300,000,000 and net profit \$3.75 a share if it hadn't been for the seven-week summer strike in Ontario of employees of Brewers Warehousing Co. Ltd.
