The people of Dromore and vicinity were shocked and saddened on the evening of August 31 to hear of the death of Mrs. Catherine Callaghan. Although she had not enjoyed good health for the past few years her death was sudden and unexpected. She received the last rites of the Catholic Church from her pastor, Rev. T. P. Butler. Who was present at her bedside. Deceased was born in Pisquid, sixty-nine years ago, the daughter of the late John and Bessie Callaghan. In 1903 she was married to Francis J. Callaghan and moved to Dromore where she had resided since. Her husband predeceased her 18 years ago. She will be greatly missed in the community but it is in the home where her loss will be most keenly felt. Legless Veteran Enjoys Work, Play And Politics

By DON HOYT Canadian Press Staff Writer ST. STEPHEN, N.B. (CP)—Lorne Groom is 36 but his life's career began on Christmas Day, 1943, when an artillery shell blasted away his legs on an Italian battlefield.

During his long convalescence after surgery left him only four inches of hipbone in each leg. "I just sat down and figured out what I could and couldn't do," he said as he sat in his comfortable home in this St. Croix river border town. "It had happened and all I could do was make the best of it. The things that were impossibilities I just forgot about."

An optometrist, Groom commands popular respect in the political circles he joined on July three years ago. He carried Charlotte county's Progressive Conservative standard into the New Brunswick legislature in the party's 1952 victory that ended a 17-year Liberal domination of the constituency. SPURRED YOUTH MOVEMENT "I should have waited another four years," he mused. "I had to borrow money for everything I did."

"But I started out in 1952 as county chairman because I thought it was time some young fellows got interested in what was going on in the province." The Progressive Conservative party's emphasis on youth—the average age of a New Brunswick cabinet minister is 47—carried Groom to the presidency of the party association last year.

Everything about the young politician has a simple homespun quality that endears him to the fishermen and textile workers, merchants and businessmen who sent him to Fredericton. "I suppose anybody in this thing has a political philosophy," he said. "Mine is honesty toward people."

Logging Camp Cook Was First Settler In Kitimat

By BRUCE LEVETT Canadian Press Staff Writer KITMAT, B.C. (CP)—A roving railroad and logging camp cook splashed ashore on a remote inlet 400 miles north of Vancouver on April 15, 1951.

As Bob Jamieson of Ottawa stepped off the barge, Kitimat, sprawling, burgeoning aluminum town, was born.

RUGGED AT FIRST "We were eating that kind of menu for a couple of months," he said in recalling early days. "The first meal I tried to cook, the stove collapsed."

The first help he got came when he hired two Indians to help in the kitchen, which was still the pebbled beach. Today, he has 80 assistants—soup cooks, assistant chefs, butchers, bakers and pastry chefs. Where he used to make bread in a wash-tub, now he has an entire bakery. The kettle slung over the campfire has given way to 100-gallon

FORMER TEACHER

Lorne Groom was born near St. Stephen. After high school he studied at the provincial normal college and taught for two years before joining the army in 1940. He saw service as a lieutenant with the Carleton and York Regiments in England, Sicily and North Africa before his military career ended when an allied shell fell short of its mark during the battle of Dundee crossings.

Groom studied optometry in Ontario after the war and decided to return here to start a new life. In 1946 he married Lucille Lindsay of Montreal—a rosy-cheeked woman who refers affectionately to her husband as "daddy," "father" or "the old boy."

He was born in Kinkora in 1883, when he was ten years old he, with the rest of the family moved to Vernon River. Early in life, he entered the service of the C.N.R. He was overseas for two years in World War I. On his return he was again employed with the C.N.R. until his retirement seven years ago.

During his illness he was frequently visited by his pastor, Rev. Urban Gillis and the last Rites of the Roman Catholic Church were administered to him by Rt. Rev. Monsignor Maurice McDonald.

There are left to mourn the loss of a devoted husband and father, his wife formerly Laevonia Acorn; one son, Merrill and ten grandchildren, also one brother, Mark, Rumford, Maine, and three sisters: (Susan) Mrs. John McCarville, Charlottetown; (Catherine) Mrs. Walter Turner of Athol, Mass., and Clara, Boston.
