MEETING POSTPONED.—There was only a small number present at the meeting of the Charlottetown Driving Park and Exhibition Association in the Philharmonic hall last evening, and it was decided to adjourn until Friday evening next, January 19th at 8 o'clock.

AWARDED THE CONTRACT.—It is announced that Mr. Hebert, the Canadian sculptor, has been awarded the contract for the bronze statue which the Federal Parliament has decided to erect to the memory of the late Sir John A. Macdonald. There were forty competitors.

AN ISLANDER ELEGANT.—It is pleasing to hear that Mr. R. A. Anderson, formerly of his Province, has been elected Mayor of Vancouver, B. C. The choice is an excellent one, and Vancouver is to be congratulated. Vancouver is evidently a live town and knows how to appreciate and honor a good man.

CHURCH IMPROVEMENTS.—The Guardian reports that the Ladies' Aid Society, in connection with the Presbyterian Church at Stanley Bridge, has furnished the new church building with two handsome chandeliers, with Rochester lamps, at a cost of \$35, and Rev. T. F. Fullerton has provided the same church with a fine pulpit bible.

ENTERTAINMENT AND BASKET SOCIAL.—There will be an entertainment and basket social in the Cornwall Chinese Factory on Tuesday evening next at 7.30 o'clock, if fine, and if not on Friday night. A small admission fee of ten cents will be charged, but ladies with baskets will be admitted free. Proceeds in aid of the Cornwall Methodist Church.

THE SHATFORD CASE.—St. John despatch of the 12th says: Judge Tuck gave judgment in the Shatford case this afternoon. He strongly censured Mrs. Shatford for her conduct, and said she was guilty of gross impropriety. Mr. Shatford failed to substantiate the charges against her husband. The Judge, therefore gave judgment in his favor.

SCOTT ACT FIVE.—Peter Gallant, of the Queen's Arms, appeared before H. V. Palmer and Samuel McFar, J. P.'s, yesterday afternoon, charged with violating the Scott Act. Two witnesses were examined, both of whom had purchased intoxicants on Gallant's premises. Gallant was accordingly fined \$50 and costs or two months imprisonment. He took the mouth.

ROMAN CATHOLIC MARRIAGE.—The decrees on the laws of marriage were read in all Roman Catholic churches on Sunday. By the laws of the Church, Roman Catholics in the province must be married in the presence of their pastor. If two Roman Catholics are married by a Protestant clergyman, their marriage is null and void, and both become excommunicated. In the case of a Roman Catholic getting married to a Protestant by a Protestant minister, the marriage is valid, but the Roman Catholic party to the contract incurs excommunication.—Montreal Witness.

A CONTRAST WORTH NOTING.—Hon. David A. Wells, in the Forum, after describing the distress prevalent in the United States, draws the following picture by way of contrast: "In the Dominion of Canada, for example, separated from us territorially on the north by an imaginary line, there has been no panic, no unusual demand for money, no stoppage of industries, no restriction of trade, no increased rate of interest, in short, nothing beyond the ordinary course of events, except so far as these events may have been influenced by contiguity to what may be termed a financial cyclone, whose pathway of destruction was contiguous, but not within its own territory."

NEWS OF THE WORLD.

There are 52 prisoners charged with murder in Cook County, Ill. jail.

A commission has been appointed by the government of Cape Colony to enquire into the leprosy question.

During the Mexican war the United States put 90,100 men in the field, of whom 7,780 died of wounds or disease.

The loss from rinderpest alone to the agricultural wealth of India this year exceeds 45,000,000 sterling. The disease among cattle is increasing yearly.

At San Francisco, the Chinese have torn down the government registration notices and put in their places a warning to their countrymen not to register.

Imagine a household numbering 6,000 persons, and no woman allowed in any part in the management. Such is the case at Dolma Bati, palace of the Sultan.

The Sultan of Turkey has conferred the grand cross of the Imperial Order of the Medjidie upon Mr. Maxim, the inventor of the quick-firing gun bearing his name.

Sims Reeves, England's famous tenor, receives \$7.50 per hour for teaching at the London Guildhall School. This is in addition to the fees he receives from pupils.

The authorities of Dublin University, Ireland, have announced that hereafter the junior fellowship of the university will be open to students of both sexes on the same conditions.

While the Emperor of Japan was proceeding to his winter palace recently, landlords attacked the procession. They secured a quantity of valuables. They also kidnapped several Imperial officers.

The estimate of population of Mecca is about 69,000, while the number of pilgrims that massed together there last year from all parts of the Mohammedan world was variously estimated at from 200,000 to 300,000.

A proposal to hold in St. Petersburg, in 1903, an international exhibition to celebrate the 200th anniversary of the founding of the capital has met with much approval, and it is probable such an exhibition will be held.

Autograph letters on the religious situation were exchanged by the Pope and the Czar. The disposition on the part of Russia and the Vatican to re-establish a religious entente is apparently firmer than ever.

Canon Farrar says that the present statistics show that the birth rate in the richer districts of Kensington, London, are 20 per 1,000 every year, while the number of births in the poorest districts of Fulham are 48 per 1,000.

Letters from Castelnuovo, Sicily, say order is restored there at terrible cost. The troops literally bombarded the town. Dozens were killed and scores wounded. Five hundred persons are in prison awaiting trial by military tribunals.

The cold weather continues in Europe. On Saturday traffic in London's suburbs was hindered by four inches of snow. Many sheep and cattle were frozen to death in Ireland. Navigation on the Thames and Mersey is suspended.

Mr. George W. Smally, the well-known London correspondent of The New York Tribune, says that the upheavals and disturbances in Switzerland are more Socialist than Anarchist, and more Agrarian than Socialist. It is gratifying to find a writer of distinction willing to confess a knowledge of the difference between the terms.

The complaint of General Briamont, the Belgian expert in fortifications, that Turkey had been deterred by Russian influence from properly fortifying the entrance to the Black Sea, has been corroborated by the Wiedemann. This journal says that in view of the final success of Russia against the Sultan to stop building forts on the land side.

The Consistory, which meets at Rome in March, will provide for six new Cardinals, namely, Mgr. Jacobini, the Papal Nuncio at Lisbon; Mgr. Nascimben, secretary of the Consistorial Congregation; Mgr. Satali, the Papal Delegate to the United States; Mgr. Fausti, the Papal Auditor; Mgr. Salvini, secretary of the Congregation of Councils; and Father Stemmler, the Jesuit.

The charge that France is instigating the Sicilian troubles with money and arms is raising uneasiness in official circles at Berlin. Sicilian papers charge that the movement in the island is directed from Marseilles, where a band of Sicilian malcontents are stationed. The situation is considered a menace to the Triple Alliance. The Sicilian trouble is arising much interest at the Vatican.

Walter F. Cogrove, 18 years old, deaf and dumb from childhood, living near Marengo, Ind., died recently. During the last few days of his illness he astonished his relatives by talking freely, although incoherently. Young Cogrove during his life was an intense Bible student, and could write off hand many chapters in the Bible if requested to do so. He always contemplated spending his life as a missionary among those afflicted like himself.

Texas is the latest part of the United States to report discoveries of gold. Since the collapse in silver last year, greater attention has been given to mining for the more precious metal, and from all auriferous sections come reports of increased activity. California had an output of \$13,000,000 in 1893, an increase of \$2,000,000 over the record of 1892, and the indications are that in 1894 much of the decline in silver production will be made up for by the larger gold output. There is not always as much profit in digging gold as there is in working silver deposits; but there is no uncertainty as to the market. It was a variable market that wrought the mischief to silver.
