OUT OF SEASON.—It is stated that the frost did considerable damage to tender garden plants in and about Crapaud last evening. Several frosts are also reported at New Glasgow and other sections of the Province.

THE WORLD'S FAIR is on the boom. The paid admissions on Thursday last were 127,272 and on Friday 103,639. The bureau of admissions is confident the daily average will soon reach the 200,000 mark.

IT SWEET EVERYTHING.—A destructive cyclone passed through Jefferson county, Kan., on Wednesday evening last. Not a house, barn or tree was left standing in its path. At least sixteen people were killed and many injured.

AN EYESORE.—Complaint is made that the ashbin on the north side of the Market House is used as a receptacle for every description of filth which creates a most objectionable smell. This morning the bin was upset and in a most disgraceful condition.

THE CAMPANIA CHAMPION.—Late advices from New York state that the Campania outdid any record the Paris ever made in her last trip across, doing 548 knots in a twenty-four hour day. The 2,864 knot course was made in five days and about one-fifth hours.

PICTOU CHARLOTTETOWN ROUTE.—The steamer Jacques Carrier was taken of the Charlottetown-Pictou route this morning. Consequently there was no steamer to Pictou to-day, nor will there be any until Friday afternoon, when the Northumberland will leave Pictou for this port.

DROWNED.—It is reported that a young man named Somers was drowned at Stanhope yesterday morning. He and another young man named McCully were out in a boat looking after some lobster traps, when a squall struck the boat and it upset. McCully managed to reach the shore, but Somers got entangled in the sails and went down.

PICNIC.—The Baptist Sabbath School of this city have engaged the steamer Southport for their annual picnic to be held at West River on Saturday, July 1st. Ample provision will be made for visitors who will take this opportunity of enjoying a day of country pleasure. Advertisement will appear in next issue.

THE EASTNET.—The steamer Eastnet, Captain Churchill, arrived here from Boston about five o'clock this morning with a general cargo, and left for Summerside about half-past ten. She will return from Summerside about daylight to-morrow morning, and after loading lobsters, oysters, pork, etc., she will proceed to Halifax, leaving at 4 o'clock.

A RARE CHANCE.—The auction sale of the dwelling house of Conductor Frank Kelly, which takes place at 12 o'clock to-morrow, offers a rare chance to any person desirous of dwelling house. The building is pleasantly situated and fitted up for a private boarding house at a small cost, should the purchaser desire, as there are three or four rooms in the upper portion that can be made ready at short notice. The house is in excellent repair, and heated throughout by hot air. The out buildings are also in good condition, and there is a large garden and yard in connection. THE POLINO.—The steamer Polino, of the Dubell Line, in command of Captain LeChance, arrived here from Montreal via Quebec, about eleven o'clock last night, with a general cargo. She sails this afternoon for St. John's, N.H., with live stock on deck and produce between decks. Passengers by this steamer have two days in St. John's, and may secure their tickets from the agents here.
 Another steamer of the Dubell Line, the Greenland, will leave Montreal to-morrow, and will be due here on Monday morning. She will take live stock and produce to St. John's. She also has good accommodation for passengers.

Suicide.
MONTREAL, June 28.
 When the steamer Lake Huron arrived in port yesterday from Liverpool her passengers reported that William J. Stewart, a wealthy ship broker of Liverpool, had committed suicide while almost within sight of Montreal. Mr. Stewart, had been ill and threatened to jump overboard several times, but a sharp watch was kept and he was prevented from carrying out his designs. Yesterday morning while the attendant was at breakfast the broker went to one of the closets and hanged himself.

Memorial Services for Admiral Tryon.
LONDON, June 28.
 Services were held yesterday in St Peter's Church in memory of Admiral Tryon. A crowd of naval and military men, and Lady Tryon and Mrs. Gladstone were present.

A Schooner Burned.

Blake Won't Resign.

 Mr. Trudeau, Deputy Minister of Railways and Canals, died yesterday after two days' illness.

LONDON, June 28.
 Admiral Markham telegraphs that Admiral Tryon's body has not been recovered.

Convent de Notre Dame.
 The closing exercises of the above-named institution, which took place on last evening, made up perhaps the best, the most refined, entertainment given in our city for some time. But when we remember the cause which called for last evening's entertainment, we venture to say that the audience was highly delighted with the several parts. The spacious hall of the Convent was handsomely decorated for the occasion, and in this respect, as well as in the selection of a programme, the most refined taste was manifested. It would be invidious to make any particular mention where all did so well. The opening number—an overture by piano, organ, harp and mandolin—was in itself a masterpiece and formed a fitting introduction to the rich treat which followed in the remainder of the programme. The choruses and instrumental duets, which interspersed the evening's entertainment, gave striking proofs of the high class of music which is taught in Notre Dame and of the proficiency of those in charge of that department. A very pleasing part, indeed, was the admirable manner in which the little girls went through their difficult drills, and the loud applause which they received showed that their efforts were appreciated. We cannot refrain from making special mention of the different French dialogues, in which the young ladies, taking part acquitted themselves so admirably, and won the attention of all by their perfect pronunciation. Towards the close of the evening graduating honors were conferred on Misses E. Brothers, B. McDonald, A. Dyle and C. McDonald, and the under-graduating medals were presented to Miss B. Coonan. The valedictory by Miss E. Brothers was well written and well read. At the close of the entertainment His Lordship the Bishop referred to the high class of education which was being taught in the Convent, and of the striking proof which the entertainment gave to his assertion. He also referred in feeling terms to the cause which called for such an entertainment—namely, the burning of the Mother House in Montreal, one of the grandest institutions in Canada, and a building that cost upwards of one and a half millions of dollars. After the address of the Bishop, the National Anthem was sung, when all left, highly pleased with the entertainment.
