WAR OFFICE HAS RECEIVED NEWS

Concerning Gen. Buller's Latest Battle

But No Bulletins Yet Posted.

BOERS ATTACKED A SMALL BRITISH FORCE

But Were Driven Back at the Bayonet's Point

LOST 20 KILLED AND 50 WOUNDED.

Heavy firing heard near Frere and along the Tugela River.—Boers seem to be vacating their positions.—People in London hopeful of good news.—Satisfactory despatches said to have been received.—Exchange of shells at Modder River.

SPECIAL DESPATCH TO THE EXAMINER.

BRITISH ENTRENCHMENTS.

MODDER RIVER, Jan. 16.—There was a brisk exchange of shells this morning, the Boers returning our fire for the first time in several days.

The British entrenchments are being continually strengthened and extended. The permanent railway bridge is almost completed.

BULLER'S MOVEMENTS.

LONDON, Jan. 17.—The Exchange and Telegraph has received a despatch, dated Tuesday, January 16th, from Pietermaritzburg. It contains no news from the front, but heavy firing was heard today in the direction of Frere.

It is probable that General Buller is engaging the enemy.

A rumor is current here that a portion of the British force is near Ladysmith.

A despatch to the Daily Mail from Pietermaritzburg, dated Tuesday, says: "There was very heavy firing to the north yesterday.

"I believe that the Boers are contesting General Buller's passage of the Tugela.

"Our howitzers were evidently busy, as the firing is described as the heaviest yet heard in Natal."

news that the Dutch forces had been broken up by dissension after the severe repulse at Laismith, and had begun to retire from the Tugela, taking their guns with them, the Free Staters going westward, and the Boers northward, and that General Buller, discovering from his scouts that the Upper Tugela district was pretty much upset, had set Warren's column in motion for the immediate relief of Ladysmith.

This theory failed to account either for the inscrutable silence that has been maintained since Thursday or for the complete abandonment by the Dutch of their defensive line of great strength with Tugela in flood and few drifts where a passage could be effected; and every burgher ordered out. But while the public is in the dark there is every reason for saying that the War Office has not only received news from General Buller, which it is keeping secret, but that the news has been of the most satisfactory nature.

BOERS REPULSED.

OLAKSTROM, Jan. 16.—The Boers this morning attempted to rush the hill held by a company of Yorkshires and New Zealanders. They were repulsed, at the point of the bayonet.

The Boers had 21 men killed and about 50 wounded.

The hill commands the tract of country east of the main position held by the Boers, and they had determined to make an attempt to seize the heights. They advanced cautiously, directing their fire at a small wall held by the Yorkshires and compelling the latter to keep close under cover. When the Boers rushed the wall the Yorkshires fixed bayonets and charged.

Just at that moment Capt. Madlocks, with a small party of New Zealanders came up, and the combined forces leaped over the wall and charged straight for the enemy who fled followed by a withering fire at close range.

The Boers literally tumbled over each other in their hurry to escape but the persistent fire of the British inflicted a heavy loss.

Desultory firing continued for some time but the attack was an utter failure and the Boers retreated to the shelter of the small kopjes at the base of the hill.

Reciprocity Defeated.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—The reciprocity treaties with France, the Argentine and the British West Indies, submitted at the opening of congress, have been practically killed by the opposition of the interests unfavorably affected, and the venerable John A. Kasson, who negotiated them, has gone south for a prolonged absence, on account of indisposition, partly caused by the grip and partly by his disappointment.

Dissatisfied Dutch

CAPE TOWN, Jan. 16.—A high civic official lately returned from Victoria West, and Premier Berga, who has two of the most dissatisfied districts in the Colony, states that the Dutch are very much excited, but the strong military force, absence of organization, lack of ammunition and difficulty of communication, prevent active disloyalty.

Servian Ministry Resigns.

VIENNA, Jan. 15.—The Neue Freie Presse says the Servian ministry has resigned owing to the King Alexander, insisting on granting amnesty to all the political prisoners convicted of high treason against his father, former King Milan.

Plague at Rio

RIO JANEIRO, Jan. 16.—The bubonic plague is officially declared to be only sporadic in this city. All the vehicles stopped running today and serious complications are expected.
