BIRCH AND BUOTE FOR TIGNISH.

The Liberal-Conservative nominated their candidates at Alberton for the First of Prince on Saturday last. There was a large and enthusiastic gathering. In the absence of the President of the Association, Dr. P. C. Murphy, George R. Montgomery, Esq., was called to the chair, and ably presided over the convention.

For Councilman nobody was put in nomination against Mr. Birch, and he was declared the unanimous choice of the meeting amidst cheers. Mr. Birch acknowledged the approval of past services and the compliment paid him by renomination in an eloquent speech which was heartily approved.

The nominations were then made for Assemblyman, Messrs. F. J. Buote, S. T. Gallant, Lawrence Doyle and Wm P. Callaghan being put before the meeting. Mr. Doyle promptly withdrew and the other gentlemen went to a ballot, which was all but unanimous in Mr. Buote's favor.

Mr. Gallant, who had received the next greatest number of ballots, then moved to make the nomination unanimous, which was done amidst an outburst of cheering.

While Mr. Buote was being brought to the convention. Mr. Hackett, "fresh from the fray," as it was stated, made a most interesting speech, thanking the electors of the First District of Prince for their magnificent support, declaring that the fight made in the riding, taken all in all, was the most heroic in all Canada, and showing how such excellent candidates as Birch and Buote could not possibly be beaten on the 12th prox, if the party worked as enthusiastically as on the 7th inst.

Mr. Buote then entered the convention and was enthusiastically welcomed. Mr. Montgomery tendered him the nomination as Assemblyman, and he accepted it in a neat, polished and argumentative speech.

Messrs. W. P. Callaghan, H. B. Huestis and James E. Birch made some further appropriate remarks, when the convention broke up with cheers for Mr. Hackett and the candidates, Birch and Buote.

The First of Prince will avenger the Pineau job on the 12th, many honest Liberals helping on the good and necessary work.

ELECTORAL CONTEST IN WEST QUEEN'S.

Once again the sound of electoral strife arouses the electors of the first electoral district of Queen's County, and soon the drum will again sound calling the electors to the polls to condemn or condone the present Administration. Already the meetings have commenced and from those already held we can judge fairly correctly of the arguments which will be used by the respective parties as their claims for the suffrages of the electors.

The Liberal party are again holding out the same delusion they employed in 1896. Hon. Peter Sinclair, who is following the candidates from meeting to meeting, is again holding out the prospect, nay, the assurance, of a million and a half dollars indemnity from the Dominion Government in spite of the fact that Quebec, which has the government by the throat, is not likely to recognize our claims. But the intelligent electors will not again indulge in that blissful Utopia where taxation will be unknown when they see the national debt mounting up by leaps and bounds. The Conservatives were condemned by the Liberals in the recent election for having no policy, while they now present the unique spectacle of appealing to the country without an excuse or palliation for the corruption and misdeeds of the government or even a promise or policy for the future.

On the other hand, the Conservative candidates propose a definite policy of reform. They promise to abolish the Land Office which has long since survived its days of usefulness. They also propose, if elected, to reform the road system and sell the roads in the proper season of the year by public auction,—thus reducing the expenditure on roads to the lowest possible figure, preventing the squandering of the moneys now entrusted to supervisors, and at the same time maintaining an efficient service. The only plea put forward by the Liberal standard bearers is that we should not go against the Federal Government. But instead of the union of the local and federal parliaments being a blessing to this province it has proved a direct curse; for in the election contests there is so much mutual log-rolling that the country is loaded with debt and the members elected in too many cases are not the choice of the people. They expect, like their compatriots in Quebec, to mount again to power on the large boodle wave created during the recent election.
