## Big Game Today

THIS afternoon at Washington, the American and National Leagues clash in the 32nd all-star classic. The American League holds a 5-14 edge over their rivals from the senior circuit, but the odds favor the National League to close the gap this afternoon. Of late, the National League has been showing much greater class than they did a few years back and it shouldn't be too long before Warren Giles is in front in all-star scramble.

ALTHOUGH really nothing is at stake, these all-star games have become so popular that only the world series eclipses them in the matter of interest. In fact, the players, realizing the said fan interest, decided in 1950 to have two games each season instead of one. Since sixty per cent of the gate and the TV-radio rights go into the pension player fund, the players figured they could make the fund grow twice as fast. The second game in 1962 is scheduled for Chicago's Wrigley Field on Monday, July 30.

Last year the first contest was at San Francisco's new Civic Center Park where players and fans nearly blew it. That was an extra inning affair with the National League emerging victors 5-4 in the tenth. A few weeks later they went at it again at Boston's Fenway Park but rain halted things after nine innings with the score tied 1-1.

## Big Crowd Expected

IT is expected that Washington Park will be jammed for this classic this afternoon. In 1961 the teams met at Cleveland and the American League were the victors by a 4-3 score. They drew 69,321 customers that afternoon and that figure still stands as an all-time high. The following year at Braves Field in Boston the National League avenged their defeat of the previous year but this time only 25,336 fans showed up — an all-time low. That was the year that a young man by the name of Joe Donaghy failed to hit in five tries and committed an error which paved the way for the National's 4-3 victory.

IT was the next year at Washington's Griffith Stadium that the National League not only lost the ball game 6-3 but the services of two outstanding pitchers. Jerome "Dizzy" Dean and the great attractions ever to hit a baseball, received a broken toe in the third inning when Earl Averil smashed a liner off his shoe. In the sixth, Van Ligon's home run damaged muscles in his right arm.

Ole Diz tried to get back into action too. He was never able to regain his great median. His arm lost its supremacy over the bat and he was out of the game after one at-bat. Mungo was treated by the best but his thunder was gone and he no longer returned opposing batters.

## Ted Comes Through

ANOTHER great star, Ted Williams, came out the hero in the 1941 classic at Briggs Stadium in Detroit. This was the year that the Splendid Splinter hit an amazing 406. There was two out in the ninth and the National League led 5-4. Two American League batters were base when Ted strode to the plate. He caught hold of one of Claude Passeau's pitches and belted it out of the ball park and the Amerks won 7-5. In the same game, Arky Vaughan of the Nationals had a grand slam.

When the teams met in 1950 at Comiskey Park, the American League held a 15-4 margin but things started that year very poor for the seniors. The National League led 1-0 in the first to give the Nationals a 4-3 win. The next three years the Nationals kept winning. In 1954 the American League copied the decision and the Nationals were back in the lead. In 1955 and 1956, it was then a 15-10 margin. In 1957 at St. Louis and in 1958 at Baltimore the Amerks were the conquerors and it was 15-10. In 1959 the doubleheader was held at each team's home. The Nationals made it 16-11. In 1960 at Kansas City and New York the Nationals won both contests and in 1961 at San Francisco the senior circuit won 11-10. It was 14-10 in the final game of the 13 tie at Boston in the second game didn't allow anything.

## Don Drysdale, Jim Bunning To Start in All-Star Tilt

WASHINGTON (AP) — Don Drysdale of Los Angeles, top winner of the majors, will face Jim Bunning of Detroit in a battle of flame-throwing right-handers when the favored National League meets the American League today in the 32nd All-Star baseball game.

President Kennedy will be among the 45,015 spectators in the new District of Columbia Stadium. Drysdale, a 15-game winner for the league-leading Dodgers, will be followed by Cincinnati's Bob Purkey (14-2) and San Francisco's Juan Marchica (12-5) or Milwaukee's Bob Shaw (9-6), according to the plans of manager Fred Hutchinson of the National League champion Reds.

Ralph Houk of New York Yankees will be the manager of Bunning (9-4) with Camilo Pascual (12-5), Minnesota's clever curve-ball ace. The third pitcher will be followed by Cincinnati's Bob Purkey (14-2) and San Francisco's Juan Marchica (12-5) or Milwaukee's Bob Shaw (9-6), according to the plans of manager Fred Hutchinson of the National League champion Reds.
