HOLY WEEK.

Services in the Churches—Special Music for Easter.

In St. Dunstan's Cathedral, the service of Tenebra will be held at seven o'clock on the evenings of Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday. The services on Thursday and Friday mornings will begin at eight o'clock, and on Saturday morning at half past seven. The service on Good Friday will be as usual. The blessing of the Holy Oils will take place on Thursday, and the blessing of the fount on Saturday. On Easter Sunday the choir of the Cathedral will be assisted by Mr. Vinnicombes orchestra.

In St. Paul's church there will be service every morning and evening, this week, except on Saturday, at 11 a. m., and 7.30 p. m. The subject of the address each evening will be "The Mystery of the Cross," the Mystery of Humiliation being the theme for this evening. On Good Friday there will be a special service in the morning at which there will be a collection for the Jews. In the evening a meditation will be held on the Life of Christ, illustrated by Commander Cheyne. On Easter Sunday there will be communion at 8.30 and 11; special services at 11 and 7; children's service at 3. There will be special music on Easter day.

At St. Peter's Cathedral the services will be: Holy Communion, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday at 7.55 a. m. and Thursday at 7.45 and at 8.30 a. m. Children's service every day during week at 5 p. m. and evening every evening at 7.30 o'clock. Good Friday at 10 a. m., children's service; 1.30 to 4.30 p. m. Meditation on The Seven Words from the Cross; 7.30 "The Sacrifice of the Cross".

MORE BAD NEWS.—A Moncton despatch says: Another letter has been received from one of the Monctonians who recently went to Vancouver. It repeats the previous warnings about going to the coast, says many men are working for their grub, and there are hundreds of idle men, while every day there are seven or eight hundreds of new arrivals. Only one of the dozen or so of Monctonians who went to the coast this spring has been able to obtain employment. Herbert Humphry, who sold his property here and took away with him considerable money, was held up the first night after his arrival in Vancouver and robbed of \$100.

A man from Utah and a man from Illinois were prominent in the introduction of war resolutions in Congress yesterday. Having interior constituencies, far beyond the possible fire zone, their fighting spirit had nothing to check it.

Ottawa society, which is worried and before the world in connection with certain kleptomaniac operations of its trusted members, may take some comfort out of the fact that it is not singular in misfortune. New York also suffers, and at functions attended by the very elect of the famous four hundred, articles of value belonging to host or guest have disappeared in a manner that leaves no doubt that they were—to speak vulgarly—stolen. What is more awful, is that there seems to be no way of preventing such unhappy incidents, that, from the use made of them, tend to strengthen in the rude public the vulgar belief that one man is just as bad as another when he is not watched.

The two ironclads belonging to the United States government, the Kearsage and Kentucky, which were launched last week, are the two largest warships owned by that nation, although much smaller than many British ironclads.

They have a displacement of 11,500 tons and are expected to show a speed of 16 knots. They will no doubt be powerful vessels when ready for sea.
