**A SUMMER HOLIDAY.**

Hearing a few days ago there was to be a picnic in Earncliffe, and feeling much in need of rest, I decided to take a day off from my arduous duties, and knowing it is not good for man to be alone I coaxed a lady friend to lay aside her crochet work and accompany me. Earncliffe, which we reached early in the afternoon, is one of the many very picturesque places on the Island the writer has had the pleasure of visiting during the present summer. It is divided into two localities—eastern and western—the latter being the part we are dealing with in this article. Here nearly all the farms front on the seashore, and a ride along this road on a pleasant summer's afternoon or evening affords much pleasure to those wearied with the dust and heat of city life.

Reaching the picnic ground, which is near the residence of Mr. John Tweedy, almost the first person we meet is an old friend, Mr. Fred McKee, whose bright smile and hearty hand-shake makes us feel at home at once. Mr. McKee, whose lobster and fruit canning factory is on the ground, is one of our rising young men. He takes a deep interest in all that concerns the welfare of our beloved Dominion, and is well posted on all things that pertain thereto. Being an eloquent platform speaker we expect to find him very much in evidence during the coming election contest.

But we are not left long to enjoy our friend's society, as there are calls for him elsewhere, so we wander down to the shore to enjoy the sea breeze that is so cool and refreshing just now. Looking northward across the water we see the prosperous village of Pownal, while Crown Point, Alexandria, and the harbor's mouth and South Shore respectfully come within range of our vision. Almost directly opposite from where we stand, and about six miles away, is Governor's Island, back of which St. Peter's Island looms up. We try to find out why those islands were so named, but no one knew, perhaps some of your readers can tell. Looking westward we see Point Prim with its lighthouse standing out clear and distinct. We are told that the light is not so bright as it used to be, because the country is now in the hands of pirates and wreckers, whose blighting influence brings the shadow of darkness over everything they touch. Following the coast line along, we next see Bellast, the birthplace of so many brilliant and talented men—one of whom will represent her in the next session of the Legislature, and will, it is expected, be the Premier of the incoming Conservative Government.

But my reverie is broken by an attack of " parched throat " and I seek my carriage to alleviate my sufferings with a mixture of lime-juice and ice-water I had left left there, but alas! to my surprise and sorrow I found that during my absence, it had evaporated—bottle and all—and when, on my way home a friend passed me trying to sing "The Girl I Left Behind Me" to the tune of "Little Brown Jug." I concluded he had been present during the progress of the evaporation process. But my feelings of grief over my loss were soon dispelled by a voice saying—come and exit, and soon we are at the tables that are laden with good things too numerous to mention and the celerity with which some of us got out side of those 'goody-goodies' was characteristic solely of those from whose minds have faded the recollection of their last meal.

Luncheon over we go for a breath of salt air, and for a couple of hours this merry party of youth and maidens enjoy a delightful sail over the placid waters of Orwell and Pownal bays that lave the Earncliffe shores. But the setting sun warns us it is time to go ashore and get ready for home; which we do, and are soon on our journey. Reaching the main road, I try, for the first and last time, the Earncliffe trick of driving with the reins around my neck. And then I forgot all about my gray hairs—for I am just as young as I used to be—for about five seconds. But, alas! there is never a rose without a thorn, for in an instant—apparently—the road opened and disgorged a dog; and my next recollection is having made a violent attempt, with the aid of a fair companion—to make my mark in Earncliffe with my head while my horse and carriage were having a tilt with Crabbe's combination fence.

Ere long we recover our equilibrium—and the horse—and once more resume the even tenor of our ways. Soon we are passing over the most delightful part of Earncliffe road, where it is lined on each side with tall, beautiful trees that almost meet overhead. And here the young people may take a quiet walk and enjoy the charms of nature and solitude—especially that kind of solitude that Pat thus described, " Begorra, it's nice to be alone—especially when you're wid yer sweet-heart."

As our horse emerges from this secluded spot he quickens his pace and soon we have left behind us many pleasant scenes and faces the recollection of which lingers in our memory for many a long day to come.
