

Reviews Activities Of P.E.I. Women's Institutes

Following are excerpts from report of Mrs. Mayla Manning, director of women's work and I.H. Girls Club activities, submitted at the annual meeting yesterday of the P. E. Island Women's Institute:

The past year brings to a close another outstanding year of accomplishment for the Women's Institute in our province. Not only the membership and financial standing are most encouraging; but the spirit of co-operation, the ambition and perseverance displayed among our rural women is most commendable. These are the foundations upon which this successful organization has been built.

Our Institute has spent \$32,201 on community projects, during the past year, double the amount spent four years ago; but it is still too small a proportion of their total receipts.

Among the many and varied improvements for schools is the following list: painting, wiring for electricity, inlaid linoleum on floors, water fountains, science cabinets. Other schools have procured rhythm band equipment, books of knowledge, radios, record players, organs and pianos in one progressive and strictly rural district the sum of \$908.00 was spent on the school alone.

Venetian blinds, \$63.50; school pump, \$40.00; building material and carpenters \$374.00; playground equipment \$107.50; sanitary closets \$270.00; the remaining \$53.00 was spent on smaller items. Can you imagine the amount of work and planning entailed, in a small rural district like Conway with a membership of twelve? Can you also visualize the pride and respect which such an example of effort must instill into the growing youth of this community. As children grow older think how greatly their pride of ownership is influenced by such improvements.

RURAL BEAUTIFICATION

In the Rural Beautification Contest our schools have measured up splendidly. The following is a list of the winners for each county: Prince County, Baltic; Queens County, Mt. Albion; Kings County, Souris West. A total of \$21,914.48 was spent for school improvements by our Institutes in 1955-56 an increase of one thousand dollars over the previous year.

Public Institutions such as, the county hospitals, orphanages, the Provincial Sanatorium, the Tyne Valley Health Centre, continue to receive financial help. A total of \$2,228.18 was donated to these institutions.

HEALTH AND WELFARE

The amount given to Health and Welfare organizations has increased. In 1955 \$4,955.00 was donated. In 1956 figure is \$5,534.00. Donations were given to the following: Red Cross, T. B. League, Cancer Society, Canadian Institute for the Blind and Salvation Army. Women's Institutes continue to sponsor: Blood Donor Clinics, Courses in First Aid and Home Nursing and swimming classes in their community. Several Institutes financed the Dental Clinics for their school. These clinics are of great value.

to isolated rural districts and should be given more support. The interest in Musical Festival Work and Dramatics has shown considerable improvement; yet it is still much below the standard which we are hoping for. This is due no doubt to the lack of regular musical instruction in so many rural districts, and definitely no great improvement will be made until such time as a supervisor of music is made available.

The Women's Institutes group memberships in both these organizations should be greatly increased. The amount spent this year in Cultural Activities shows an increase of almost a thousand dollars. \$3,344.42 was voted by Women's Institutes for 1955.

HANDICRAFT EXHIBITION

The sixth Provincial Handicraft Exhibit was again managed by the Women's Institute staff, and assistance from nearby Institutes was greatly appreciated. This is a busy time and each year our entries have increased. It takes at least a month to receive table display for judging and return the different entries. The food display for 1955 was the largest and the best that we have ever received. In the classes for home sewing the quality of workmanship has improved. We feel a great deal of this is due to the presence of the Handicraft Van and the work and encouragement given by the instructors in so many districts.

The same may be said of the handicraft exhibits displayed at the county exhibitions, where we have had the pleasure of judging so much fine work. County exhibitions were held at five centres, and the judging at four of these was done by the Women's Institute staff, assisted by Mrs. Willard Prowse and at Dundas by Miss Heather MacLean.

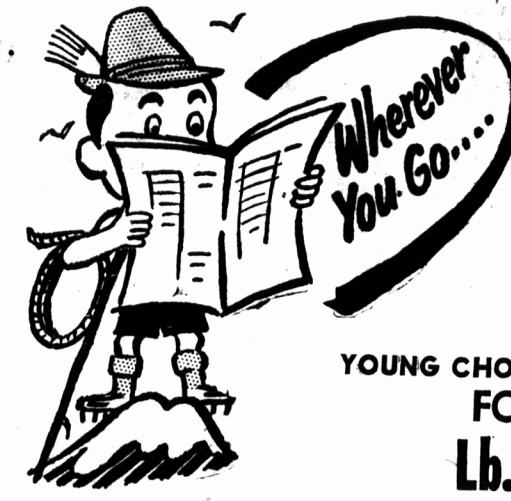
