

Duren Drysdale Are Ready For All-Star Game Today

 LOS ANGELES (AP)—Two of baseball's most spectacular strikeout artists, New York's Ryan Duren and Los Angeles' Don Drysdale, were nominated Sunday as the opening pitchers in today's 27th all-star game.
 Upwards of 60,000 spectators were expected to come to mammoth Los Angeles Coliseum for this first west coast production of the all-star show.
 The weather will be hot. A heat wave, which has set records for this time of the year, is expected to continue for a few more days, which means the thermometer should be around the 95-100 degree mark. The game will start at 4 p.m. (8 p.m. ADT).
 The Nationals ruled a strong 7-10 favorite to make it two in a row over the Americans, hampered by injuries to key players. The Americans hold an overall 15-11 lead in the series.

French Champ Is Trot Winner

WESTBURY, N.Y. (CP)—The French champion Jamin broke stride soon after the start but quickly recovered Saturday night to close with a terrific stretch drive and win the \$50,000 International Trot at Roosevelt Raceway.
 Italy's Tornese was beaten to the wire by half a length and the American hope, Trader Horn, was 2 1/2 lengths back in third position.
 The Canadian entry, Philip Frost, owned by Mrs. Jeanne Levesque of Montreal, led the field at the half-mile mark of the 1 1/2-mile inaugural of the event but broke stride about 400 yards later. He finished second to last in the field of eight.
 About 48,000 pacing fans packed the fashionable raceway on Long Island.
 The victory was worth \$25,000 to Mme. Olympe-Roderer.
 Norway's Jens Protector broke stride at the start and trailed all the way. Invacourt from Germany and Jamin also broke at the start but they recovered quickly.
 Jamin was never out of contention. His off-gate manoeuvre lasted for about half a dozen strides and he kept close to the leaders until his stretch bid.

 IT WILL NOT be a difficult task to remember when the track record of 2:04.3 but they were off to another engagement when to do is fix in his mind the date of the visit of Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip to Charlotteville and you have the exact day of the record-smashing.
 Yes, Queen Elizabeth and her Prince looked on as George Callbeck reined that sensational pacer, Mighty Lee, to the new record of 2:04.3 but they were off to another engagement when Mighty Lee stepped the second mile in 2:03.4 to give himself a new race record.
 CONDITIONS were perfect for the big day and the roars of the crowd seemed to sense he was giving a royal performance. And it was just that.
 Folks had an idea that they might see Newport Chief's mark of 2:05 go by the boards but they never for a moment dreamed that the record would take a licking in both dashes of the feature.
 But in our book the greatest thrill was seeing Mighty Lee shatter his own mark of 2:04.1. That was really something we had never expected to witness.
 We can't recall any horse coming down this way with a record such as Mighty Lee's and proceeding to lower his mark. Usually these kind of horses have seen their best days when we get a glimpse of them.
 But this isn't the case with Mighty Lee. He is a better horse today than ever and George Callbeck must be a happy man indeed. So are owners Willard MacDonald and Rankine MacLaine.
 WE HAVE the idea that this track record will stand for a long, long time. Perhaps, however, Mighty Lee will better it before this racing season is over but we certainly won't predict that. You just can't expect performances like that every time out.
 This Mighty Lee is the greatest piece of horseflesh that ever raced on a local track. In fact, when you take out Walter Dale, you can say the greatest performer that ever stepped on any Maritime track.
 RACE FANS saw quite a three-year-old filly the other afternoon in Senator Barbour's Vestia Wick.
 The youngster had no trouble whatever winning the single dash of the D pace and the reason she had no trouble was that she stepped the mile in a neat 2:13.
 Lorne Hennessey took the Wick to the front at the very start of the mile and there was no catching her the rest of the way.
 It looks like the general senior has a real find in Vestia Wick and this columnist is looking for the three-year-old to go on to much greater things this season.
 THAT WAS a tough loss suffered by Ray McCallum when his great trotter Sally Volstead met with the fatal accident prior to the start of the junior free-for-all Thursday afternoon.
 Sally was considered by the experts as one of the top trotters in the Maritimes and Ray had refused some attractive offers for her in the past.
 Sally was certainly the type of trotter that would cause other trotters plenty of trouble if they were striving to get home in front.
 Race fans and owners and drivers regret indeed the loss by the Marshfield owner.
 TONIGHT the City Softball League semi-finals swing into action at Victoria Park and you can expect to see a bumper crowd view the opener.
 The league decided to leave the playoffs in the capable hands of the president, Charles MacKenzie, and Charlie has come through with a semi-final lineup that should please everybody. Of course, chances are somebody will be beefing but the president isn't the least bit worried. He has lined things up as he thought best and he's ready to shoulder any criticism that comes. And Charlie has good broad shoulders. Things won't bother him one little bit.
 He has pitted first place Barry's Lions against third place Junior Basilica Youth Club. The other semi-finals are second place Rollaway Aces and fourth place BIS Shamrocks.
 This evening the Lions entertain the Juniors in the first of a best-of-seven series. Tuesday it will be Rollaway at home to the Shamrocks. The series also will be a best of seven.
 Both series should be great battles all the way and the fact that you finished higher up in the standing than your opponents won't mean a thing once the playoffs get underway.

Larry Doby Sent Down

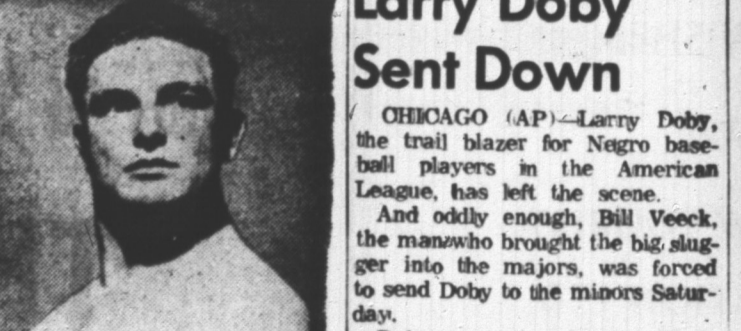
CHICAGO (AP)—Larry Doby, the trail blazer for Negro baseball players in the American League, has left the scene.
