

Lesage Will Offer Solution To Quebec Liberal Squabble

QUEBEC (CP) — Opposition Leader Jean Lesage said here he will propose a solution to a squabble which has divided the Quebec Liberal party.

One group would restrict his powers at the head of the Quebec Liberal Federation while the other wants him to maintain them.

Mr. Lesage did not say what his proposal, to be presented at the federation annual meeting in Montreal Nov. 18-20, will propose.

He did say that it dealt with party structures and the question of the Liberal party finances.

One group, headed by Eric Kierans, is asking that a seven-man management committee be set up to share leadership with Mr. Lesage and that the wall of secrecy be at least partially removed from party financing.

The management committee concept has been approved by the constitution committee of the federation and is to be submitted to a vote at the Montreal meeting.

However, the issue of the finances is a bone of contention between Mr. Kierans and the three-man faction which officially opposes him.

Mr. Lesage said at the end of a Liberal caucus called to discuss the intra-party split that the proposal he will make deals mainly with party structures—on which the opposing parties are agreed—and that the section of financing is "only a tiny portion, on paper."

Asked if his proposal is the same as compromise which Mr. Kierans had said earlier he would accept, Mr. Lesage replied only that "it is the Lesage formula."

Mr. Kierans had said earlier that the afternoon session of the caucus would be aimed at finding out whether the compromise proposal was acceptable to the parties which opposed him.

His only statement on leaving the meeting was "no comment."

Mr. Kierans, campaigning at the head of a three-man slate which hopes to take over the Quebec Liberal-Federation executive, had asked that a five-man finance committee be formed and that it be required to report on the party finances to a management committee, a proposed body which would direct the federation on a full-time basis.

Mr. Kierans' opponents had been against the suggested finance committee.

Headed by Jean Tetreault, a notary from Missisquoi, Que., this group had maintained that if a finance committee is set up, it should be informed only about party expenditures and not the income or balance.

SHOULD KNOW ALL FACTS

Mr. Kierans had said the finance committee should know everything—balance, revenues and expenditures—and that it should report on all aspects.

ITALIANS Vote Aid

ROME (CP) — The government in an emergency session early has approved a program to help restore the flood-stricken areas of Italy. It included immediate aid of more than \$74,000,000 and a planned gasoline tax increase.

Premier Aldo Moro and his cabinet met for 11 hours to discuss initial relief measures.

There were fears the cost of rehabilitation and reconstruction would push the country back into recession from which it had been moving forward.

Politicians said the five-year development plan now before Parliament will have to be modified as a result of the disaster.

One-third of Italy lay unproductive and many of the area's 6,000,000 inhabitants left destitute by the floods that struck last Friday.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

Your right-hand opponent deals and bids One Notrump, both sides vulnerable. What would you bid now with each of the following five hands?

- ♠KJ98 ♠10 ♦KJ4 ♣AJ85
- ♠AQ85 ♠Q96 ♣AJ9 ♣KJ2
- ♠AJ10974 ♠9 ♣AQ862 ♣7
- ♠QJ75 ♠KQJ965 ♣4 ♣AJ
- ♠4 ♠AQ82 ♣KJ95 ♣AJ74

1. Pass. It is too dangerous to compete against a notrump bid with this type of hand, since the opener presumably has 16 to 18 high-card points and strength in all suits. An overall of two spades could result in a severe penalty if your left-hand opponent had spade length high cards. A double of one notrump would be equally dangerous because of the possibility that partner might respond two hearts.

Standing by itself, the hand has all the values necessary for an opening bid, but once the notrump bid comes in, the best thing to do is keep quiet.

2. Double. Since we have a notrump bid of our own, fortified by the knowledge that our strength lies over the opening bidder, we should clearly double. There are not many high cards left for the next two characters, but the hope is that partner will have most of them and be able to pass for a penalty. If partner responds with two of any suit, a pass becomes auto-

Indian Home Minister Resigns After Riots

NEW DELHI (Reuters) — Home Minister Gulzarilal Nanda has resigned after being criticized for weakness in dealing with Monday's violent rioting in which eight persons died.

Authoritative sources said Defence Minister Y. B. Chavan, who flew back to the capital from Bombay on the orders of Prime Minister Indira Gandhi, would replace Nanda.

The sources added that Mrs. Gandhi herself would take over Chavan's defence portfolio. The criticism of Nanda came from within his own Congress party.

Hundreds of thousands of Hindus demonstrated Monday against the killing of cows, which they worship as a symbol of motherhood and fertility. The eight deaths occurred after the Hindus, attempting to storm the Parliament buildings, were beaten off as the police opened fire and tossed tear gas bombs into the huge crowd.

700 ARRESTED

Police have arrested about 750 persons since the outbreak of rioting, arson and destruction. Among these were more than 500 Hindu holy men who led the demonstrators.
