OCEAN LINERS TIED UP.—It is rumoured that several large steamers, including the Oceanic and Lucania, are blocked at Liverpool, owing to the seamen's strike. The strike apparently has no serious effect on the shipping industry, and it will be several days, however, before matters can come to a head.

DROUGHT GROWS SERIOUS.—A Perth Ont., despatch says: The drought and extremely warm weather which has prevailed through the whole of August, with the exception of a shower early last week, is getting to be a serious matter in this district. Wells are running dry, pastures are burning up, and the corn and root crops are suffering greatly. It is stated that it is seriously affecting the milk supply for cheese factories. In Western Ontario the drought has been of longer duration, and its effects have been far more serious there.

Another Liberal Warns the Government.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Sept 7.—W W B McInnes, M P, speaking at a Labour day celebration at Nanaimo, severely criticized the Laurier Government for the violation of its pledges to the people of the West. Pledges which had been made personally to him by the Premier were disregarded, and had, with others, warned the Government, but to no avail. He would now do only the honorable thing left for him, resign.
